

Gentlemen.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present for your consideration and adoption the Branch's 29th Annual Report and Balance Sheet.

The season has been one of consolidation for the Branch with the "bedding down" of the new Board of Control structure which is a major change in concept for the Association and is being eagerly watched by other sections of the movement. Suffice to say that the Branch has decided to continue for the coming season with the experiment and, at the end of the season, decide on any necessary constitutional changes to establish the structure on a permanent basis.

The Branch administration has continued to function from Surf House and I would record our thanks to the Office Staff and, in particular, Carole Wilson who took care of the bulk of Sydney Branch work up to July when she resigned. Also to Joan and Henry who have been

of great assistance to the Branch. The life saving activities of the Branch have been co-ordinated under the Superintendent, John Dewey, and the new Board of Control. This incorporates all activities, including the Mobile Services under Alan Morris.

We can record that no lives were lost due to drowning whilst patrols were on duty the 1977-78 season.

The Branch enjoyed again this season the continuance of the Wales Rescue Helicopter. It has been operative for the whole of the year and, in co-operation with the Police & Ambulance as well as the Clubs in Manly-Warringah and Sydney Branch, has been able to give switt attention to persons in distress or danger both inland as well as on the

To our sponsors The Bank Of NSW, who provided the sum of over \$80,000 to enable the service to function, we would record our thanks and appreciation.

To 2SM and Channel T.E.N., who assisted with the provision of equipment and training aids for the Helicopter Rescue Service, we would also say thanks for your support.

The Branch radio network has been expanded and the JRB and the Helicopter are linked to both Branches' radio rooms by UHF radio. This was made possible, in the main, by support from the Department of Sport and Recreation. This installation will enable the Branch to futher experiment with radios to ensure that eventually we will have the most appropriate system to cover our needs at a cost we as an Association can afford. To further improve the radio service, the Sydney radio room will next season operate from the Seals Club, where the height of the mast will improve the reception for the Club

Two Branch Clubs, Garie and Era, both in the Royal National Park, each received a Capital Assistance Grant of \$10,000 through the Department of Sport and Recreation for the improvement of their premises at the beach.

The Department Of Sport and Recreation, through the Minister, Mr Ken Booth, and his Officers, has continued to encourage and support not only this Branch, but all Branches in N.S.W. and the State Centre, and their support, through grants and the use of facilities, is appreciated by all.

The Federal Government Gear Grant continued this season and Clubs in the Sydney Branch benefitted to the extent of approx. \$6000. To the Federal Government, as well as local authorities who support surf life saving, we would also record our thanks. This particularly applies to the

Waverley, Randwick and Sutherland Shire Councils who assist to such a large extent with the provision of the Jet Rescue Boat Service.

A Branch the size of Sydney has naturally a great deal of contact with our higher bodies as well as neighbouring Branches and I would express our thanks to the Officers of the National Council, the NSW State Centre and our neighbouring Branches for their continued co-

In competition, the Branch, its Clubs and members have continued to distinguish themselves. The Branch team convincingly won the Inter-Branch Competition held this year at Teagardens - Hawks Nest.

At the Metropolitan Titles held at South Maroubra, Sydney retained the 2SM Inter-Branch Challenge Trophy from Manly-Warringah with the Cronulla Club holding the trophy on behalf of the Branch, for the season by being the highest point scoring Club.

North Cronulla led the charge at the Australian Championships by taking out the Premiership R & R and, along with other Clubs, taking home an impressive array of medals from both the State and Australian Championships.

Over the years the Branch has continued to enjoy sponsorship from Companies large and small within the community as well as the help of Service Clubs. The majority of these are mentioned in the report in relation to specific activities, but we would record our appreciation to the AMATIL Company for their support of the patrol screen project, which represents our major income for administrative purposes; also, to the Kyle Bay Lions Club, who this year ran the Jet Ski Classic and whose donation of \$4,000 will greatly assist with the promulgation of the new manual which was released following the National Seminar at Tallebudgera, Qld, in August.

To ensure that the new Manual is known to all members in Sydney Branch, the Branch sent five members to this five-day seminar at a total cost to the Branch of \$1,000. Sydney Branch will be subsidising the initial issue of Manuals to the extent of a further \$1,000. We will in addition be holding three weekend seminars for club members and Board of Control Officials, to which the Branch will be allocating the \$4,000 received from Kyle Bay Lions Club.

The changing face of surf life saving, the introduction of new awards, the diversification of our activities and our further involvement in community services make it imperative that "the word" is spread as quickly and efficiently as possible and more than justify the expenditure involved.

As well as ensuring that members stay abreast of local developments, the Branch sponsored Warren Rennie and Frank Osborne to the World Congress on Life Saving, held in Los Angeles in May this year. Over 50 Delegates from Australia attended this very important event.

After the end of the season, the Sydney Coast was hit by a series of storms which badly damaged the beaches. This was a particular plight for the Cronulla Club, as the NSW Government had spent many thousands of dollars in seeding the beach.

Further storms were experienced in June and still more damage resulted. This time, high winds moved the Era Clubhouse about six feet and caused damage which will necessitate the rebuilding of the Clubhouse. Era still have the Capital Assistance Grant and hopefully, additional assistance can be arranged.

In addition to these storms, severe erosion has occurred on our beaches.

Rescues were down on last season and, since no lives were lost due to drowning whilst the patrols were on the beach, it must be regarded in the light of "prevention is better than cure". One would hope that the continuing programme of teaching surfing awareness to our new members in the senior body, the members of the Junior Association and the general public will help to minimise the number of rescues necessary.

The new Manual stresses heavily this section of our work and all members, young and old, should be involved.

Rescues for the season are detailed below and it should be noted that those listed under "Resuscitation - Fatal" were not as a result of immer-

sion in the surf, but from other causes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The Sydney Branch Board of Control has had a year of achievement. The Branch gave permission last September to try out their structure project which had been mooted for the previous two years. All of the Life Saving sections now meet on a regular basis together, and all differences, mode of operation and future innovations are thoroughly discussed. The sections involved are, Board of Examiners, Helicopter, Jet Rescue Boat and Radio. Between all these sections there has been nothing but harmony and a will to get on with the job.

Examinations

These have again been carried out throughout the Branch in an efficient manner. The number of awards may not be as high as in previous years, but the number of examinations has increased. The examining sections conducted examinations on all of the Branch beaches for Awards, and at the Caringbah Community Clinic, Coogee S.L.S.C. and North Bondi S.L.S.C. for the Resuscitation and Advanced Resuscitation Certificate.

Carnivals

Sydney Branch had a busy season in the way of carnivals. A craft carnival was scheduled for Maroubra, but due to inclement weather, this has been postponed to October, 1978. Each district held their respective Inter-Club carnivals at which Board Officials were in charge, as well as attending the Australian Championships at Kingscliff and the Inter-Branch Championships at Tea Gardens.

Meetings

The Board of Control Executive has met on eleven occasions, and four general meetings were held at which guest speakers were invited to deliver a lecture, followed by discussion and questions. A special evening was held at Caringbah Clinic on Advanced Resuscitation and all these meetings were well attended. The interest shown by rank and file members of Clubs was outstanding. Sections of the Mobile Services division had their regular committee meetings and they, in turn reported through their executive members.

I would thank the Brighton - le - Sands Amateur Fishermans Club

for facilities made available for meetings.

The Board conducted the Annual Gear Inspection in September and October which was preceded several weeks before by a Gear Stewards conference. A carnival organisers and several Chief Instructors meetings were held throughout the year.

Future

By the time of the Branch Annual Meeting, a training programme will be well and truly under way on the introduction of the new procedures as outlined in the new Manual. This program follows the visit of five Board members to Tallebudgera in Queensland for five days to be shown and participate in these procedures. The Branch, under the control of the Board, has hired the Institute of Management's complex at Little Bay for three weekends, at which 96 members from Clubs and the the Board of Control will be shown the new procedures and the latest methods in teaching them.

It is indeed an ambitious project and it is one is which every active Life Saver within the Branch eventually will be involved, and to this end, a sum of approximately \$6000.00 has been allocated. To the Branch and to our Donors go the thanks of all involved.

Conclusion

The past season has been interesting, difficult, rewarding (22 new members joined the Board - a record) and instructive. And I fell if each and every member co-operates just that little bit extra, 1978-79 will be

one of the best years.

The Board of Control extends thanks to all who have assisted in its operation this year, especially the Branch Executive under the leadership of President Bill Marshall, Secretary John Vaughan and Treasurer Bill Kingston for the many hours helping to solve our problems. To the Executive Officers of the Board, members of the Examining Section, and all the members now involved with the Board, thanks for a job well done. The Board's appreciation is extended to all Club Officials, and members who have assisted us in the many aspects of our work.

POWER CRAFT PANEL REPORT

Our 1977-78 season commenced earlier with all three Sydney Branch Craft taking part in the North Cronulla "Life Saving '77" Seminar at Patonga in September, and the presence of J.R.B. 3 at the State Centre Congress '77 two weeks later.

For the first time, the No. 4 District had its own craft, this being a new Smith-type craft, purchased by Waverley Council and controlled in conjunction with the Branch. However, due to an unusual amount of mechanical problems, the craft spent more time out of the water than it did in. The crew, through still undaunted, are keen and looking

forward to backing up next season.

On Tuesday, 27th December 1977, both J.R.B. 4 and J.R.B. 3 were involved in a dramatic rescue off Maroubra. Both craft put to sea at the request of the Police at 6.30 pm to assist a twenty-one foot sailing craft which had been caught some one and half miles off the coast by a 50 to 60 knot southerly buster. Both crews craft performed well. From the time the message was received at Maroubra, where both craft were re-fueling, to the time they were passing Malabar Heads, took only seven minutes, thus linking speed and efficiency with Vigilance and Service. The culmination of four and half years of hard work and meetings

The culmination of four and half years of hard work and meetings paid off for J.R.B. 3. This group, like J.R.B. 2, has now become a complete rescue unit, with their own ramp, Power Boat Shed, Land Rover towing vehicle and craft. J.R.B. 3 also shares the distinction of having a person who has achieved the big three; Helicopter crewman, J.R.B. No.1 operator and I.R.B. driver as their Boat Captain, Andy Tuite, a fully mobile and competent Life Saver.

J.R.B. 2 has been having mechanical problems, subsequently, it too has lost many valuable hours through being out of the water. However, through the persistence of Captain, Bob Green, and his crew, the craft was operational towards the end of the season.

The crew would express their thanks to Total where that company supplied fuel for their craft.

The advent of U.H.F. Radio has made the Jet Boat's job much easier and the crews appreciate the financial help given by the Dept. of Sport and Recreation.

Earlier in the season we hosted two New Zealand Power Boat operators who come over to see our operations and before the start of the 1978-79 season, two Sydney Branch Power Craft Operators will be part of the N.S.W. State Team to tour New Zealand. These members are Paull Parsons, J.R.B. 3 and Peter Squire J.R.B. 4. The tour is designed to exchange information, and hopefully they can bring back some ideas.

WALES HELICOPTER RESCUE SERVICE

THE Fifth season of operation of Sydney's Wales Helicopter Rescue Service in 1977-78 has proved the most outstanding in the history of this unique Surf Life Saving Association community service.

Its varied rescue and support missions have brought great credit to the SLSA as the organising authority.

Over the past 12 months the Wales helicopter completed 208 res-

Over the past 12 months the Wales helicopter completed 208 responses to requests for assistance, comprising:

26 rescues

62 medical/first aid attention

120 search and other missions.

Missions ranged from rescues in heavy seas to rescues from cliffs and bush areas, searches for lost boats and missing fisherman, urgent medical evacuations from as far as Newcastle, Goulburn and Katoomba and support for ground units during bush fires.

Since the end of the SLSA's statistical year, the helicopter and its crew's assistance to a 12 year - old boy who fell over a cliff at Bondi captured wide media coverage — showing the type of aid provided in many other missions which did not have such media coverage.

The operation of the helicopter has been made possible by continued magnificent sponsorship from the Bank of New South Wales.

The Bank's donation to the SLSA to provide the Service has been aided by further assistance from Radio Station 2SM, television Channel TEN and the Department of Sport & Recreation.

The helicopter rescue crewman, all volunteers from Sydney and Manly-Warringah Branch surf clubs, are a highly trained group of rescue personnel. Their ability under such a variety of situations, knowledge of first aid and resuscitation, and diplomacy for the SLSA in co-ordinating with Police, Ambulance, Hospital and many other community emergency groups has brought great credit upon the Association.

Members of the rescue crew delivered talks to 42 community groups such as Lions, Apex, Rotary, View, etc, during the season to further spread knowledge of the SLSA's activities to the community at a

personal level.

After a year's trial with "Dr Sue", 10 volunteer doctors have been recruited to fly rostered patrols with the Wales helicopter, allowing the Service to render the best possible assistance in medical emergencies. With the medical equipment carried in the helicopter to support its rescue and radio aids, the Service has become a virtual flying intensive care unit.

Fulltime pilot Alan Edwards' skill with safe flying in rescue situations has again been matched by his assistance with the Service's coordination with various groups to allow efficient co-operation for the community's benefit.

Rescue crew chief, Bob Ford, Medical director, Dr Sue Rowley, First aid training officer, John Park, and Manly-Warringah Branch liaison officer, Mark Fraser, have all contributed to the success of the Service.

The Wales helicopter is on duty every weekend and public holiday during the year, plus every day during the summer school holidays.

A telephone pager link has allowed the helicopter, and various SLSA mobile units, to respond to mid-week calls for assistance. The Wales helicopter is Sydney's only fully equipped and readily available rescue/medical support helicopter.

Appreciation is extended to the SLSA radio officers at "Sydney surf rescue" (Maroubra) and "Warringah surf rescue" (Long Reef) for their back-up support - in particular to the Long Reef group who remained on duty over the winter to support the helicopter operation.

The appreciation of all involved with the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service is extended to its sponsors, the many SLSA personnel, and members of emergency authorities and community groups who have lent support to this SLSA operation. In only five seasons it has shown its great potential as a vital community service.

I.R.B. SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The introduction of Inflatable Rescue Boats into Sydney Branch has gained momentum during the past season and we now have a total of nine Clubs with I.R.B.'s together with the 'Dory' Rescue Boat of Burning Palms.

It is pleasing to record the training and progress of many of the Clubs who have just acquired I.R.B.'s Their winter training has provided their Club with a nucleus of qualified Drivers who can impart instruction and thus further expand their I.R.B. team.

Like all other equipment that relies on mechanical contrivances, electricity and petrol to operate, they can fail at the most inopportune time and therefore maintenance by Club I.R.B. personnel is extremely important.

A Sydney Branch Outboard Motor Training School was conducted with this in mind at Johnson Outboard Marine during January.

We are indeed grateful to Outboard Marine for providing the facility and personnel for this highly successful course.

The Branch was honoured as the venue for the Johnson Zodiac N.S.W. Advanced I.R.B. Training School held at North Cronulla on Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th May, 1978 and was attended by members from Garie, Cronulla, North Cronulla, Elouera, Wanda, Maroubra,

Coogee and Bondi. The School was an outstanding success and gave invaluable information in driving and rescue techniques.

We also record our appreciation to Total Australia for providing fuel to Clubs.

During the season a grant from the Anonymous Donor's fund enabled the development of waterproof container and system for a radio to be used in an I.R.B. Our thanks are extended to our Donor for help with this vital piece of equipment.

It is important that each Club with an I.R.B. appoints an I.R.B. Captain for the forthcoming season to ensure that proper progress is made in co-ordinating their I.R.B. into the Club's Surf Patrol activities.

Clubs must conduct a continual training programme to introduce new members into I.R.B. activities and to cater for drop-outs.

I wish every Club success in their I.R.B. operations in the follow-

RADIO OFFICER'S REPORT

I have much pleasure in submitting the following report for the Branch Emergency Services Radio Network, as it was a season of activity and general advancement.

Sydney Branch now has a team of operators who are experienced in rescue control, and who show attention to detail - the Branch can be very proud of this team, which totals 18 persons and included our first lady radio operator, Carole Wilson, from "Surf House".

There were four occassions during the season that the rostered operator failed to arrive for duty; this situation is a vast improvement over past years and hopefully can be completely eliminated.

The new Operations Room has been constructed at no cost to the Branch, by the Maroubra Seals Club Limited and is situated on the upper floor level of the Seals Club and has a complete view of the Maroubra beach area.

A noticeable improvement in AM radio performance is also anticipated, with the antenna now at an elevation of some 50 metres.

On March 11, 1978 our Base and Branch power boats had their U.H.F. radio system installed and is now operational. Although the season was virtually finished, all crew members and operators have expressed total satisfaction with the system's range clarity and interference performance.

I am amazed that some Clubs still do not have a Radio Room and one Club did not have an elected Radio Officer last season.

Once again, repairs were quickly and capably done by Nat Cohen at Bondi, who said that on occasions repairs were required only because of neglect and cost Clubs and Power Boat Groups unnecessary time and expenses.

During the season, money was made available by the Anonymous Donor's Fund to assist Harry Brown to develop a radio suitable for use in I.R.B.'s It is pleasing to report that the project has turned out very successful and through Harry's efforts, a water-proof radio will be available to I.R.B.'s.

The Radio division received a great deal of help from many areas during the year and I would like to record my appreciation to the following individuals and companies, for assistance to the Clubs and the Branches.

FINANCE

As can be seen by the Financial Reports, the Treasury Department has had a busy year. The work of the Treasurer is demanding, as we handle a great sum of "public moneys".

Bill Kingston has been assisted by Kevin Quinn, particularly in ensuring that our equipment is adequately covered by insurance, and by the Finance Committee who met on many occasions to iron out the "nitty gritty" of financial matters.

Bill reported as follows . . .

"I am pleased to report that the Branch remains in a sound financial position. Details of the Branch finances are set out elsewhere in the Income and Expenditure Accounts and the Balance Sheet.

The present financial well being of the Sydney Branch is a result of the foresight of past officers, who negotiated the Beach Advertising rights to Amatil. The significance of this arrangement should not be overlooked as it is not so long ago that we were not so fortunate. These comments are made, minful of the fact that Clubs are searching for sponsorships by way of advertising and care should be taken not to damage our present arrangement.

The area of lifesaving education is receiving an Injection of Branch funds for the assistance of the clubs to be brought up to date with the latest lifesaving methods. Several thousand dollars have been allocated to educational areas ie: Seminars over three weekends for the benefit of the clubs. Warren Rennie and Frank Osborne, two of the Branch's top educational men, were assisted financially to attend the World Life-Saving Congress held recently. Projectors, video equipment etc have also been purchased and \$1000.00 has been allocated to assist the Clubs obtain the new Manual. Other direct assistance included a subsidy from Branch funds for the Public Risk Insurance coverage and a subsidy for the new exam fees charged by National Council.

The Branch was assisted also by the Government Grants, Radio Station 2SM, The Channel 10 Telecasters and the Kyle Bay Lions Club and Champion Spark Plugs. Our thanks are extended to these organisations

Our sincere thanks are also extended to all those mentioned earlier in the report for their continued assistance in financing Branch activities.

Kevin Quinn held the office of Assistant Treasurer this year and was tireless in his efforts. Kevin arranged all insurance matters as well as assisting in all other areas of the treasury.

My appreciation is extended to the finance committee and Branch Officers for the assistance and co-operation made available to me during the past season."

National Council organised a Seminar of representatives in this field from all States and Jim and the Secretary, John Vaughan, attended on behalf of the State and Sydney Branch.

REGISTRAR

As well as recording awards gained by the Branch's Clubs, Jim Connolly was responsible for the Carnival draws for the Branch.

Jim reported to the Branch -

"I am pleased to report that the number of awards gained by examination has increased by 29 from 1976-77 season. (Details are in the Table of Awards).

One area of particular improvement is the gaining of S.L.S.A. awards by schools, public utilities and various associations. In the 1976-77 season the awards gained by these organisations was 16. In this season in was 119.

While it was disappointing to note that the number of Bronze Medallions gained fell by 54 from the previous season, it was pleasing to see that the number of Besuscitation Certificates rose by 43

see that the number of Resuscitation Certificates rose by 43.

The Board of Examiners Certificates gained, rose from 6 to 23 this season. This is an obvious reflection of the enthusiasm engendered by the restructuring of the Board of Examiners. I hope that this enthusiasm and attractiveness to new members continues, as a strong and effective Board is vital for Surf Life Saving.

I would like to extend my gratitude to all Surf Club carnival organisers and other officials who assisted throughout the year. My contratulations are extended to Coogee S.L.S.C. for gaining the most awards by examination this season."

Finally, I must thank the Officers for an enjoyable year as Secretary. For whatever reason, they seemed to have clicked, with good results for the Branch. Also to my family without whose tolerance and support, I could not have undertaken the season's activities.
