#### MINUTES OF A MEETING OF SYDNEY CLUBS HELD ON TUESDAY, 4TH OCTOBER, 1949, FOLLOWING THE MONTHLY MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION

#### CHAIRMAN:

The Association President, Judge Curlewis, occupied the Chair.

FORMATION OF BRANCH: The Chairman stated that the business before the meeting was to establish a Branch of the Association, in furtherance of the recent reorganisation and the formation of a National Council and a New South Wales Branch. He then called on the Hon. Gen. Secretary of the Association to inform the meeting of the proposed procedure. The Hon. Gen. Secretary stated that his proposal was that the same procedure be adopted as was done re the National Council and the State Centre, namely that the basic points for the Constitution for a Branch be decided and then the Constitution drafted in accordance with the decisions.

#### This proposal was adopted.

The Hon. Gen. Secretary then submitted a schedule listing the main items to be considered and they were discussed and agreed upon as follows:-

#### NAME OF BRANCH.

The Sydney Branch of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia.

#### BOUNDARIES

From Barrenjoey on the North to Bald Hill on the South.

MEMBERSHIP. Any recognised S.L.S. Club operating on a Surf Beach within these boundaries.

**REPRESENTATION OF CLUBS ON BRANCH.** Clubs to be represented by President and two delegates.

#### AFFILIATION FEES AND CAPITATION FEES. Affiliation fees to be £2, 2, 0 per Club and Capitation Fees 1/2 per

Affiliation fees to be  $\pounds 2. 2. 0.$  per Club, and Capitation Fees 1/- per active and active reserve member.

#### OFFICERS.

Officers of the Branch to be:-

Patron, Vice Patrons, President, Deputy President, Vice Presidents (Limited to 12), Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Assistant Treasurer, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Assistant Secretary, Hon. Registrar, Hon. Assistant Registrar, Hon. Publicity Officer, Hon. Branch Superintendent, Hon. Deputy Superintendent, Hon. Secretary, Board of Examiners, Hon. District Supervisors and Hon. Auditors. Gear Inspectors.

To be held at November meeting of Branch, the present officers and Executive of Head Centre to carry on till that date; nominations for office to be by letter or by entry on nomination board at Association room and to close on Wednesday 25th October, 1949.

#### LIFE MEMBERS.

Present Life Members of the Association, previously nominated from Sydney to be eligible to vote at Branch meetings.

#### REPRESENTATIVES OF BRANCH ON NEW SOUTH WALES STATE CENTRE.

The election of six Branch representatives on the State Centre was deferred till the November meeting, and nominations were called for six representatives to attend the Branch meeting on 22nd October. Nine nominations were received, and as a result of a ballot, the following were appointed:-

# FOREWORD

This is a significant Annual Report. It is now three decades since the National Council was formed, replacing the previous Head Centre organisation, which heralded the emergence of Sydney Branch as an entity of the S.L.S.A.

To mark this occasion, and as a humble tribute, we have included in the following pages a list of Officers, who, over these years made their contribution in maintaining the high traditions of this Branch.

The intervening years have witnessed dramatic and revolutionary changes with many resultant improvements.

Obviously space does not permit much elaboration of these aspects, however a short list would include the:-

- \* Advancement to more efficient Surf Life Saving techniques and the introduction of motorised rescue facilities.
  \* Increased promotion and activity in the fields of Administration, Education, Instruction, Advisory and Medical Panels, which has brought about closer involvement with the Community and Members of the S.L.S.A.
- \* Upsurge of Life Saving and Administration Seminars at National, State, Branch and even Club level, which has contributed to the progress within the Association.
- \* Development of overseas tours by both Instructional and Competitive teams.
- \* Greatly increased financial support and sponsorship by Governmental, Commercial and Community organisations which has effectively relieved members of the onerous exercise of fundraising.
- \* Advent of World Life Saving.

Obviously none of these would have been possible without the administering and negotiating talents of various Officers and the support of ordinary Members.

Next season Clubs in N.S.W. face the task of introducing into the system the "Policy on Rescue Operations", which was initially discussed at a special meeting of Sydney Branch and recently endorsed by State Centre. This document, which sets our Life Saving standards for many years to come, dictates policy on such subjects as maximum utilisation of motorised rescue facilities, extension of patrolling hours, patrol uniforms, competitors' obligation to patrol and an annual proficiency test of Active Members, all matters that will be challenging to Clubs and Life Savers entering the 1980's. An earnest appeal is made to all Officers and Members, both Association and Club, to display the necessary patience and tolerance in implementing this new policy into our Movement.

Historically, progress is not made without change and more specifically promptness and the effective understanding in implementing a successful change is clearly dependent on the streamlining of communications and education to the required source. However, in the case of change alone it may be wise and timely for our Association to consolidate its ideas in particular areas before contemplating further alterations, certainly not with the intention of stifling progress or research, but to simply monitor the innovations that have been introduced and allow a fair and reasonable testing period to assess the effects.

It is also imperative and equally wise, amidst all the changes, some of which appear to have a highly 'professional' outlook to adopt a clear and considerate attitude on our **requirements** and just as importantly our **limitations** for providing Vigilance and Service to the Community and the surfing public.

We, in Administration must always be aware and appreciate that the vast workforce, the men on the beach, comprise potential highly efficient 'amateurs' upon whose shoulders we burden the responsibility of performing and upholding the 'Voluntary' ideals of this Association.

The Board of Control restructure has now undergone a successful two season trial and the final draft will face constitutional acceptance at the forthcoming Annual meeting.

It is indeed pleasing to record that the recent directive by the National Superintendent, to all State Centres and Branches, to restructure their examining boards basically incorporates the scheme currently operated by Sydney Branch.

The new format of administration allows a greater opportunity for people to participate in the Board's activities and hopefully, will realise an increase in membership. The Life Saving statistics shown in the report lists rescues, awards and membership of affiliated Clubs and no doubt due to the efficiency of the various surveillance units it is once again possible to quote 'No lives lost while patrols were on duty'.

On behalf of the Branch may I convey congratulations to Clubs and Members on their efforts in maintaining this fine record. While the rescue efficiency is commendable some criticism is warranted in respect to the relative amount of awards gained by particular Clubs. There appear to be figures that are not entirely flattering and serious thought should be given to improving this situation in the coming season.

An analysis of recent past statistics indicates a trend from an award peak three years ago and shows a disturbing 23% decline in the totals of both Bronze Medallion and Instructors Certificates with a slight 7% rise in Qualifying Certificates. The former figures run contrary to a marginal 1% increase in Active Membership.

Competitively the Branch once again had an excellent year, annexing a winning double – Champion Branch and Handicap Competition – at the Inter-Branch Titles and gaining a majority of representatives in the State Team that won Championship Honours at Trigg Island Beach Western Australia.

I am sure readers will appreciate the significant role Sydney Branch continues to play, as a pulse beat in "Life Saving today" and which has provided our Secretary with much to write about.

The radio service, in conjunction with the newly developed waterproof radios for IRB's, showed its strength in the "Disaster" exercise held on Botany Bay on July 12, 1979, which included our IRB's, JRB's and the Wales helicopter.

The flagship of the Mobile Services, the Wales Helicopter, was on duty throughout the year, assisting not only in Surf Rescue work, but also others who were in need of quick attention and transport. Thanks again go to the Bank of New South Wales for supplying the \$109,000 to keep the helicopter in the air and also to 2UE and Channel TEN who also contributed to the service.

Our pilot, Alan Edwards, resigned to join the Police Air Wing as the chief pilot of their new helicopter and the Branch records its thanks to Alan for his dedication to the service whilst he was with us and wish him well in his new position.

Our new pilot is Peter Howe and the service also now has a permanent crewman, Bob Ford, so that the service can be fully manned seven days a week.

The Service's Director, Ian Badham, was in charge of activities which now has improved capabilities, due to the acquisition of a rescue winch, made possible by a grant of \$17,000 from the Department of Sport & Recreation, through the Minister, Mr. Ken Booth. The continued support of the Minister and his Department is appreciated by Branches and Clubs throughout the State. This especially applies to the Burning Palms and Era Clubs, who received Capital Assistance Grants to help with the building of their Clubhouses.

The Australian Government supports the Surf Association and this is reflected in the assistance given to Clubs through the \$ for \$ Gear Grant. Sydney Clubs and the Branch received \$11,179.62 during the 1978-79 season from this grant.

One of these grants, combined with the assistance of the Randwick Council, enabled JRB3 to be replaced. Local Councils assist the Clubs, but at Branch level, the support of the Randwick, Waverley and Sutherland Councils enable the Jet Boat fleet to be active and available for rescue work on the coast.

#### Fellow members -

Whilst the Association has been going since 1907, the Sydney Branch was founded in 1949 when the Association structure was changed and it is my pleasure to present for your consideration, our 30th Annual Report, covering 72 years of operation by Clubs in the Sydney area.

The season has been a busy one with the introduction of the new Manual of Instruction and Examination. It took a lot of hard work to ensure that the "word" was spread. The Seminars held at Little Bay were undoubtedly the main contributing factor which enabled our Clubs to get into action quickly with the new procedures and the money spent was well worth it.

The new structure of the Board of Control continued to work well and has been adopted in general terms by other bodies in the Association. The Constitution is currently being reviewed to bring it into line with the experimental structure of the Board and should be adopted prior to the new season.

The Branch administration has functioned from Surf House and our thanks must go to the Office Staff and, in particular, to Kerry McKenzie, who handles most of the Sydney Branch work. Thanks also to Ernie, Joan and Henry for their co-operation and assistance.

Life saving is naturally to the forefront in our activities and we can again record that no lives were lost whilst our patrols were on duty. These activities are co-ordinated by the Superintendent, John Dewey, and his Officers of the Board of Control, and cover all aspects, including helicopter, power boats and IRB's, as well as our more traditional techniques.

To enable the mobile services to function more efficiently, the Branch introduced a UHF network, covering the helicopter and Power Boats. This has worked well and will probably be extended.

The activities of the radio network were co-ordinated by John Wardall with the service operating out of the Seals Club at Maroubra, with the UHF aerial on top of the Hotel Charles at Bronte, linked by land-line, and the AM aerial on top of the Seals Club.

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The new JRB3 was launched by Mrs. Barbara Newman, Mayoress of Randwick, on June 10, 1979, and coincided with the opening of the JRB boatshed facility at Malabar.

Our contact with higher bodies in the Association and our neighbouring Branches has been maintained at a cordial level and our thanks go to the Officers of the National Council, the NSW State Centre and our near Branches, for the level of co-operation which exists.

On the competition scene, the Australian premiership and pointscore eluded our Clubs and congratulations go to the Kirra Club and the Southport Club for taking out these events. However, our Clubs brought back from Perth an impressive array of medals, particularly in the swimming events.

In addition, Sydney members featured in winning the Interstate Competition as members of the NSW Team.

At the State Championships, Sydney competitors gained places in every swimming event, except the Junior Iron Man, in fact winning 10 of the 15 events. Of the 49 events held, Sydney Clubs were unplaced in only nine.

This season, the Branch Team again won the Interbranch Championship, which was held at Terrigal in the Central Coast Branch. The Team also took out the Handicap Trophy, completing a great double on the day.

The Metropolitan Championships were held this year at

Queenscliff with Sydney defeating the Manly-Warringah Branch to retain the 2SM Challenge Trophy. The highest pointscorer for Sydney was the Wanda Club and they hold the trophy for the season.

We have again been fortunate in having sponsors to support our activities and these are mainly mentioned in the report in relation to specific sections. We would, however, again thank the Amatil Company who support our patrol screen project and thus help all sections of the Branch.

Last season, this was spent mainly in educating or re-educating our members. The Branch Clubs were active in teaching surf awareness and resuscitation to the community. Through the Queens Silver Jubilee Appeal, funds have been made available to the NSW State Centre to enlarge this segment of our work and Sydney Branch members will be involved in a project to take training to the Western Suburbs.

Probably the event which happened this season which will have the most significant effect on future seasons, was the adoption by the Branches of the "Policy on Rescue Operations" which will take us into the 80's, with additional responsibilities as far as how, where, and when we patrol. NSW State Centre will be issuing a precis of this to each life saver in the State so that each one will know his future role.

Rescues were about the same as last season and with the public education programmes to be maintained this season, it is hoped that rescues will continue to be maintained at a minimum. Rescues for the season are listed below:

# AWARDS

This season saw the introduction of several new awards, mainly in the mobile services and radio areas. To provide for these, nominations were called from Superintendents for persons who would be qualified by experience to receive them in the initial season. Future seasons will be by examination and the 156 awards gained in this fashion tend to inflate our annual award figures. Our normal awards were down and this has been attributed to the slow start due to the introduction of the new Manual. Clubs will, however, have to ensure that they have the members trained for next season, not only to maintain the patrols, but to extend both the hours and scope of the patrols in line with adopted policy on rescue operations.

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

# AWARDS

# SURF LIFE SANING BOARD OF CONTROL

#### SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT

The Sydney Branch Surf Life Saving Board of Control has now completed the first full year under the new structure, and from comments passed on, it seems to be very successful.

Several changes have been made and the final draft for the Constitution has now been passed on to the Branch for ratification at the Annual General Meeting. All the sections have co-operated to the fullest and in this alone, we have achieved a very efficient Life Saving unit. The Board is now open to members who may only have an interest in a certain field e.g. Carnivals, Jet Rescue Boats, Examinations etc, and all classifications are covered from competition members, to Helicopter Examiners, which places all the facets of Life Saving within the Branch basically under the control of the Board Executive.

#### MEETINGS

The Board of Control Executive met on ten occasions and five general meetings were held. The General meetings were conducted as last year in the form of instructional evenings. One of the main points introduced this year was the new format of instruction and examination. This alone occupied three weekends at the seminars at Little Bay in August, and September and a General Meeting of the Board on the implementation of the Examination procedure, and from results to hand this exercise was introduced and conducted successfully. The day to day events of the Board were handled by the Executive and this allowed for clear cut policy to be introduced to the rank and file members without being bogged down with extraneous matter at the General meetings.

#### **EXAMINATIONS**

Unfortunately the number of awards is down on last year, but the number of examinations remained static. Whilst the Board was happy to conduct these examinations, it is still evident that several Clubs do not take notice of the Examination procedure which was circulated earlier in the year, and consequently several foul ups occured. But all in all the conduct of exams was of a high standard and because of the Little Bay seminars all Clubs and Chief Instructors are on the same wave length as the Board Officials.

I feel that several Clubs within the Branch have let themselves and the Association down this year in the number of awards they gained and this could have serious repercussions in the future. I feel it is their duty to the public to ensure there is sufficient trained and qualified personnel available to undertake the duties we generally make known.

Facilities for our meetings were offered by the Amateur Fishermans Club, Brighton-le-Sands, Maroubra, South Maroubra, Coogee, Wanda and North Cronulla Clubs and to these we extend our sincere thanks. Two Chief Gear Stewards meetings were held culminating with the Gear Inspection in September and October, a Chief Instructors, Club Captains, Patrol Captains and Vice Captains meeting were also held to outline the role of the man on the beach in the Mobile Services structure.

#### CARNIVALS

The standard of carnivals within the Branch showed a marked improvement on last season. More Officials were available and the number of carnivals was slightly lower than the preceeding year. At present a Carnival Review Committee is approaching the Branch Clubs with a view to further improve the carnival scene for the future. Some of the thoughts that have so far been expressed should result in some first class competition and entertainment next year.

#### THE FUTURE

By now all of the Clubs within the Branch should be aware of the changes and improvements which will take place this year. Firstly there is the Surveillance Patrol system, and secondly the introduction of a proficiency testing system for all Active Patrol and competition members. Branch Officials have spent many hours explaining and helping Clubs in the introduction of these two systems and it is to be hoped that Every Club and Every Member is advised and understands their role in this very important part of our operation. If by any chance there is some misunderstanding, please contact one of the Branch Executive who will endeavour to rectify the matter immediately.

#### CONCLUSION

The 1978/79 season was a "season for change", and we coped with it very well. The Board now has an active strength of 90 members plus 24 examiners in the Mobile Services group, giving the Board of Control a total membership of 157 a substantial increase on the previous years. With all this expertise now available to the Branch, we surely must only succeed in all our endeavours if each and every one of us co-operate.

The Board of Control extends thanks to all who have assisted in its operation this year, especially the Branch Executive under the leadership of President Bill Marshall, Secretary John Vaughan, Deputy President Jim Switzer, Treasurer Bill Kingston for the many hours spent in assisting us to run our operations. To the Executive Officers of the Board, members of the Examining, Competition sections and all the members now involved with the Board, thanks for a job well done.

The Board's appreciation is extended to all Club Officials, members and Competitors who have assisted us in the many aspects of our work.

#### WALES HELICOPTER RESCUE SERVICE

It was a record-breaking season for the Sydney Branch Wales Helicopter Rescue Service.

Over the season, the Service responded to 214 calls for assistance, the greatest number of responses carried out in a single season since the helicopter was introduced in 1973.

Of these, 17 resulted in people being rescued from the surf, bush and other areas, 82 people received medical aid or were flown to hospitals, and the Service conducted 115 search and other responses.

Increased financial support from the Bank of New South Wales, Radio Station 2UE and Channel TEN allowed the Service to enter a full seven-day per week operation in March. Our helicopter service thus became the first civil helicopter operation in N.S.W. fulltime.

The fulltime operation was achieved through the employment of Crew Chief Bob Ford as the fulltime rescue crewman during weekdays, in addition to our pilot and back-up pilot.

In November, the base for the helicopter was moved from Sydney Airport to the Royal North Shore Hospital – and became Australia's first hospital-based helicopter service.

Over the season, a balance of volunteer and professional crew members and organisers maintained the reputation for the Service's efficiency in rendering community support. While Surf and coastal emergencies have remained the prime concern of the Service, assistance again this season has been rendered in many other cases. In particular, the Service was called on to render assistance with urgent medical transports from locations including Nowra, Goulburn, Orange, Bowral, Katoomba, Newcastle and Taree. Assistance was given during bush fires, boat and aircraft searches and even rescues from the Blue Mountains.

The 14 volunteer Life Savers who form the rescue crew and 10 volunteer doctors who form the medical crew members completed all required training and excelled in many and varied search, rescue and medical aid missions. When chief pilot Alan Edwards left after six years with our service to become the first Police pilot, his place was taken by Peter Howe who quickly demonstrated his ability. The support of Channel TEN has provided us with a regular back-up pilot Dan Tyler.

On the administrative side, Dr. Sue Rowley filled the position of honorary Medical Director in a most efficient manner.

The Sydney Branch was able to provide the helicopter as a community service through the support of its sponsors.

The Bank of N.S.W. continued as the major sponsor, and this season 2UE joined with Channel TEN as a support sponsor. In addition, assistance was provided from the Department of Sport and Recreation and the Royal North Shore Hospital. To all goes the thanks, not only of the Sydney Branch, but the community in general.

The inclusion of the helicopter as part of the mobile services co-ordination through the Board of Control has worked smoothly and efficiently.

This season was the UHF networks first full season in operation and I am sure that there are now many people who, having experienced the vastly improved reception and clarity of transmission, and the quality product, are now UHF converts.

I would like to reassure the Branch of the high standard achieved and the dedication shown, by the members of "Sydney Surf" Base Radio Operators.

Whilst there was still some absenteeism from rostered duty, it was insignificant when compared to previous seasons.

To the Operators' credit, there were many occasions when, because of late activities on the Beaches they were unable to close down until well after the appointed time.

I would particularly mention and commend the Bronte S.L.S.C. for its fine effort in co-ordinating the Police and our Helicopter in the recovery of a small boat found awash off their beach and the search for possible survivors until 7.30p.m. During this operation, "Sydney Surf" was manned by Dave Wilson from Maroubra S.L.S.C. who did a fine job also. I regret to say that the name of the Bronte operator is not known.

During the season a number of people obtained their Radio Operators and/or Instructors Certificates, amongst them were Lin Lascelles, Sue Pullin and Diane Urquhart all residents of the Bronte area. It is my opinion that Radio is certainly one area that Females can ease the membership shortage some Clubs are experiencing.

I would like to express my appreciation to all "Sydney Surf" operators for carrying out their duty rosters without complaint and to such a high standard.

On behalf of the No.2 district, I would thank the Branch for their Financial Assistance enabling them to purchase their. UHF Radio.

I would also thank the Management of the Maroubra Seals Clubs for their efforts in looking after our radio operators; Mr. Peter Owen of Sensolid Answerfone for the continued use of the Answering service and Barry McFadzean and the staff of Motorola Radio for advice and assistance.

#### REGISTRAR

The total number of awards gained for the 1978-79 season is a creditable 1,079. This is composed of 923 awards gained by examination and 156 gained by nomination.

Of the awards gained by examination this season, it appears that there is a slight decrease in the numbers of successful candidates for most awards. The exceptions are the Resuscitation Certificate, which has showed a marked decrease (from the previous two years), and the Qualifying Certificate, which has shown a slight increase.

As in previous seasons, various groups, such as Carlton South Parents & Citizens Assn, Bushfire Brigades and Nurses Intensive Care Courses continue to take advantage of the Resuscitation and Advanced Resuscitation Certificates.

One award - an I.R.B. Drivers award - from the 1976-77 season was also issued this season.

I would like to congratulate those candidates who were successful in their examinations, and thank Surf Club Carnival Organisers for their assistance throughout the season. Jim Connolly, Registrar.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

The Sydney Branch continued to be in a sound financial position. This situation is possible due to the many benevolent sponsors and donors, that we are fortunate enough to have supporting us. They have been recorded in the report under a separate title and we offer our sincere thanks for their continued assistance in financing the Branch activities.

The actual details of the Branch finances are set out elsewhere in the report in the Income and Expenditure Accounts and the Balance Sheet.

It is worthy to note that the participation of Amatil with the patrol screen advertising continues to be the main source of income for the Branch funds.

The funds available during the past year have been wisely used and I should point out that the bulk of our expenditure has been for the well being and assistance to the fifteen Clubs within the Sydney Branch. Life Saving activities benefited considerably. We sent representatives to Tallebudgera, financed the seminars at Little Bay, subsidised the Clubs for the costs of the New Manual and allocated large sums of money for educational equipment used by the Board of Control. Subsidies were also allocated to assist the Clubs in the following areas: –

- \* Public Risk Insurance,
- \* Higher charges for Association Awards from National Council,
- \* State Team members to the Australian Championships and the Branch Team
- Board of Control members were also assisted to participate at the Championships in Western Aust.

A considerable amount of money was required for the repair and replacement of carnival equipment during the year. Those Clubs using the gear should be mindful of the increasing costs involved in this area and make every effort to ensure that this equipment is treated with care.

The operation of the J.R.B. 3 and J.R.B. 4 are also included in the financial dealings of the Branch. Fortunately the costs involved are offset by the grants made available by the Randwick and Waverley Shire Councils respectively.

The financial activities of the Sydney Helicopter Rescue Service are also controlled by the Branch. During the season, this service was extended to a full time operation, requiring extra financial support. We extend our thanks to the Bank of New South Wales, Radio Station 2UE and Channel 10 for the funds supplied, to make this service available to the community.

The financial activities of the Branch cover a very wide area of involvement. To attend to all aspects would be difficult for one man. With this in mind, I make special mention of Kevin Quinn, who once again held the office of Assistant Treasurer. In his quiet, unassuming manner Kevin absorbed a huge amount of the workload. Behind the scenes Kevin's contribution has been of great significant importance to the financial well being of the Branch. To Kevin Quinn, I offer my warmest personal thanks.

My appreciation is also extended to the Finance Committee and fellow Branch Officers who assisted to keep the Branch financially healthy.
