

## FOREWORD

In commencing this Foreword, I feel the compelling need to reflect and reiterate on some important points mentioned in last year's report and which are again highlighted in this year's statistics. As a Branch we have failed to stem the decline in numbers of basic Life Saving awards gained by members.

The downward trend, over two seasons of combined Qualifying Certificates and Bronze Medallions has totalled a disturbing 20%, Instructors Certificates dropped a further 26%, making an overall decrease from 61 to 31 in two seasons and Examiners Certificates realised a pitiful total of 3, compared with 23 in 1977-78. Considering there are 15 Clubs in the Branch, averages look poor indeed.

Most certainly, with the interests of our voluntary Lifesaving Movement to the fore, Officers with the genuine support of Clubs will now have to concentrate on correcting this situation.

Rescue efficiency continued at a high level and it was again possible to report the adage, no lives lost while patrols were on duty. On behalf of the Branch, I convey congratulations to all Clubs and members for their efforts.

Obviously underlying many of these rescues was a large degree of responsibility and discipline — correctly applied and with successful results.

Surely this is a practical example which has a parallel in our "off the field" activities, where personal responsibility and self discipline, sensibly and effectively applied, can have the same successful conclusion.

A significant era has commenced — the introduction of females as Active Life Savers of this Association. Branch Clubs generally have discussed this matter and early indications are that a majority of them will make Active Membership available to females wishing to join.

Constitutional changes, separate change and housing facilities and competition rules are just a few of the matters that have to be resolved during the initial stages of this introduction.

The Branch again had marvellous financial assistance from the various sponsors who continued to support our Association and for this we are most thankful. The practical assistance rendered by Officers and staff of our seaside councils is again worthy of high praise.

Branch competitors featured prominently in Australian and State representative teams and competed with outstanding success, however, heavy seas at the Interbranch Championships, which caused nearly one third of the events to be cancelled, did not help our chances to retain this trophy and congratulations are extended to Central Coast Branch on their fine win.

During the season our Metropolitan neighbours, Manly-Warringah Branch celebrated their 21st Anniversary of formation and on behalf of this Branch, I extend best wishes for a fruitful and rewarding future in Surf Life Saving.

To all other sections of the Association, I would also extend the Branch's best wishes for a successful plunge into the 80's.

Fellow Members:-

As we proceed into the 80's the Branch has again fulfilled its basic objective and it is with pleasure that at the start of this report we can record that "no lives were lost" whilst our patrols were on duty.

This has a special significance as, this season, the Branch extended its patrol hours to include Saturday mornings.

As well as the introduction of the additional patrols the Branch conducted for the first time a standardised "proficiency" test for all patrolling members. The run-swim-run, knowledge of signals and the resuscitation test are designed to ensure that those on Active patrols are indeed "proficient" in the basics of Surf Life Saving.

All our Life Saving activities are under the supervision of the Board of Control led this year by the Superintendent, John May. John suffered illness during the latter part of the season and Trevor Elliott his deputy carried out the duties during John's absence. The Board covers all aspects of patrolling, including the Wales Helicopter, J.R.B., I.R.B., and our traditional methods of patrol.

The Wales Helicopter was again available on a 7 days-a-week basis throughout the year and flew a record 346 missions. Not only used for Surf Rescue the aircraft is available for the quick transport or medical attention and to this end, has a permanent crew of Peter Howe and Bob Ford and also has a doctor on standby at all times.

Once again our thanks go to the Bank of NSW for supplying \$140,000 to keep us airborne and to 2UE and Channel TEN for additional financial assistance. Also, our appreciation is extended to Royal North Shore Hospital and the St. Leonards Rotary Club who make very important facilities available to the Service.

Supervised by our Helicopter Director, Ian Badham, the service has served the surfing public with distinction as well as undertaking other very worthwhile community services.

In linking all our emergency services together the new UHF Radio has been of great assistance. Located at "Sydney Surf Rescue" in the Seals' Club at Maroubra it is part of the network operated by the Branch under Radio Officer John Wardall.

Radios are playing an increasing role in the effectiveness of our I.R.B. "fleet" operated by Clubs and, under overall control of the I.R.B. Supervisor Harry Brown, new techniques are being developed by the group to add to their already impressive rescue skills.

Our J.R.B. fleet was in operation and thanks go to the Waverley, Randwick and Sutherland Councils for their continuing support and to Total, Caltex and Mobil for their continued interest in our Mobile facilities.

During the season the Association approved the introduction of females as Active Members of Clubs. This took effect from July 1st and the total effect on Active strength will not be known until well into next season. Some Clubs are still deciding on acceptance or otherwise of the girls, but many of our Clubs have already had approval from the Branch to do so. Some cannot accept them at this time due to lack of facilities but steps are being taken by them to rectify this in the near future. There could definitely be a new look about the patrols on some beaches next season — welcome ladies.

As well as Local Government, the Branch, as part of the Association, enjoys the support of the N.S.W. and Australian Governments.

Grants to Sydney Branch through the Department of Sport and Recreation and its Minister, Ken Booth, assisted the Branch administration, the Helicopter Service and the South Maroubra, Garie and North Cronulla Clubs. The latter through grants for capital works. The support of the NSW State Centre by the Department of Sport and Recreation enables the Branches to function more smoothly by relieving them of a financial burden that would otherwise have to be shared.

The support of the Australian Government of the National Council has a similar effect on the Branch but support is more tangibly seen in the \$ for \$ gear grant, where Clubs received subsidies of \$13,207.16, to purchase Life Saving equipment.

The Branch thanks for support is extended to all levels of Government and it is certainly appreciated by Clubs.

Contact with our higher bodies in the Association and our neighbouring Branches has continued at a most cordial

level and our thanks go to the Officers concerned for cooperation in our common endeavours. The Association is made up of and controlled by people and to the Staff of the NSW State Centre (Ernie Davis, Joan Vaughan, Kerry McKenzie, Julie McKenzie and Henry Hendra) who supply our office facility, we would record our appreciation of their efforts for the Association in general and us in particular.

On the competition side the Branch has mixed fortunes. Our congratulations have been sent to the Southport Club (Queensland) for annexing the Association Premiership, however, our Clubs did bring back an impressive array of medals from the Australian Championships at Maroochydore and our Members were a vital part of the NSW team which again won the Interstate Competition.

We were more successful at the State Championships at Blacksmiths Beach and a perusal of the results later in the reports will demonstrate the competitive strength of our Clubs.

At the Interbranch Competition held at Elouera, big seas disrupted the events and several could not be held. Our congratulations go to the Central Coast Branch for winning the event.

The local derby, the Metropolitan Championships were held at Wanda Beach with Sydney running out winners of the 2SM Trophy. Freshwater won the new United Permanent Club Point Score Trophy and congratulations go to them and also to Wanda as the highest Point Scorer for Sydney.

Our Sponsors have a large part in the success of the Branch operation both in Life Saving and competition. Without them it would be a very rough road we travel and they are mentioned throughout this report in appropriate sections. We would, however, mention the AMATIL Company whose support of our patrol screen project over the last five years has helped all sections of the Branch.

Active this year, more than in any other, was our public education team who "preach" surf safety and resuscitation to the public at large. They also act as part of the NSW Team and were busy throughout the year. This is one area where we have no way of knowing how many lives our activities have saved by people not getting into a dangerous situation.

The season has been a significant one for the Branch. We have had to face new challenges with Saturday morning patrols and the overall proficiency testing; we have extended our public education programme; we have been looking at ways of extending our Life Saving "education" to our Members as well as the introduction of females as Active Members and maintaining all our normal services. Next season, we will again face challenges and through co-operation, work and innovation, I am sure the Branch will prosper.

## **RESCUES**

Rescues continue to be the prime cause for our existence and it is hoped that they can be minimised by our attention to preventive measures and public education.

## **AWARDS**

Awards this season were down on previous seasons and this is particularly noticable in the "basic" lifesaving awards of Qualifying Certificate and Bronze Medallions. Whilst this trend will have to be reversed the number of "mobile" awards has increased and this is necessary if we are to extend these activities in line with established policy.

Clubs will have to look at membership seriously as the Saturday and roving patrols will require trained personnel to maintain the standard required.

### **MEMBERSHIP**

Active Membership of the Branch is down about 5% and this is seen as reflecting the drop in Awards which will need to be rectified next season. The drop in Reserve Active is due mainly to a shift to other categories rather than a loss of Members. A further drop will be evidenced again next year, when the Association's "standard" requirements for the various categories of Membership have their full effect.

### SURF LIFE SAVING BOARD OF CONTROL

The year under review has been one of constant challenge to Board Members since its commencement. It has encompassed among other activities, the running of 215 examinations for basic awards and proficiency tests; the organisation and conducting of 10 carnivals including the Metropolitan and Inter-Branch Championships and the many educational nights and lectures held for both Board Members and the community.

The season saw the introduction of the Policy on Rescue Operations as adopted by State Centre and all lifesaving activities in New South Wales are covered by the Policy. It is the most important milestone in lifesaving and sets for the first time the basic obligations of the Branch towards the surfing comminity.

Saturday morning and surveillance patrols were implemented by Clubs — some for the first time. After the initial problems, all now seems to be running smoothly. It is up to individual Clubs and Districts to decide how to best use the manpower and equipment available to their best advantage and at the same time serving the needs of our beach-users.

Proficiency testing for all Active Members came under the direct control of the Board this season and brought with them the inevitable problems of conducting them on an organised and fair basis. However, with this first experience and the suggestions put forward at various meetings with Club and Board Members, there will be few problems in the future.

The emergency services within the Branch have taken a further step forward towards closer co-operation and integration. Meetings have been held between the four services and proposals put forward, including a 24 hour call-out, will be implemented during next season.

General co-operation between Clubs and the Board has again been good this season and all District Supervisors have throughout the year commented on this fact. Clubs have been willing to undertake and adopt suggestions without complaint and the Board Executive look forward during the coming season to the same good attitude from the new Club management committees.

The untimely illness suffered by John May in March this year saw much of the burden placed on Deputy Superintendent Trevor Elliott. However, the co-operation and rapport between these two men has meant that Board activities have not suffered. I join with all Board members in wishing John a speedy recovery and return to Board activities in the coming year.

To John May and Trevor Elliott and all Members of the Board Executive, thank you for your co-operation and assistance.

To the Presidents and Committees of South Maroubra, Maroubra, Coogee and all other Clubs that have hosted Board meetings and functions during the year I would thank you for your co-operation on behalf of the whole Sydney Branch Surf Life Saving Board of Control and look forward to its continuation in the future.

## EXAMINATION & INSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The past season has seen a drop in the number of awards, however, with the innovation of the proficiency tests being carried out by the Board of Control, the actual work-load of our members increased.

Whilst awards are down, I feel that the standards in most cases have improved, this coming about by most of the instruction being given by more qualified instructors.

In all there were approximately 138 Bronze and Qualifying squads examined which entailed the appointment of about 200 Examiners and it is pleasing to note the improved attendance of our Members in comparison with our previous season. As well as basic award examinations, there were 49 Advanced Resuscitation examinations carried out within the Branch. The examiners in this sphere are actually carrying out a double task, being involved with the basic awards as well. Records show that a number of specialist awards were also gained which actually brings the total of examinations to 215 for the season.

It is pleasing to note that members of our Resuscitation, Research, Development, Instructional and Medical Panel have once again been involved with the training of instructors in the field of advanced resuscitation, not only within our own Branch, but they have travelled to most Branches throughout the State. I wish to express our thanks to those Branches for the way in which we were received and the keeness shown by their members. Also my thanks go to Frank Osborne for his co-ordination of this section of instruction.

Experiments, lectures and displays in the handling of spinal and neck injuries in patients from pools and the surf have been organised by Dr. Ian Mackie and Bruce Breadner who has been elected to the position of State Educational Officer. These have involved lectures by Dr. John Yeo (Royal North Shore Hospital), Mr. Bruce Purdy (Deputy Superintendent Central District Ambulance) and Bob Ford (chief crewman Wales Helicopter Rescue Service), Dr. Philip Conroy (Prince Henry Hospital) and demonstrations by members of No. 2 District Clubs. Our thanks go to these gentlemen for their time and effort spent in this regard and to Cronulla Club for making their pool and facilities available.

In conclusion, I would like to express to those members of our Board who have played their part, and in a number of cases, more than their part, in the examination and instructional side of the Sydney Branch Surf Life Saving Board of Control.

## CARNIVAL & COMPETITION SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The Sydney Branch conducted five open carnivals, Garie, Maroubra, North Bondi, North Cronulla and Coogee, plus the "Rossfield" carnival at Bondi Pool, the Inter-District Championships at South Maroubra, Branch Championships at Bondi and the Metropolitan Championships at Wanda. As well as these open carnivals the Branch assisted with the Inter-Branch Championships at Elouera. All four districts conducted inter-club carnivals throughout the season. The North Bondi carnival was also the venue for the Trans-Tasman Test between New Zealand and Australia.

Following from the report of the Carnival Review Committee, events and the timetable were restricted to achieve a balanced programme. This was achieved for most competitors, but again, some must lose out. All in all, the restricted format proved its worth.

There were no restrictions of events at any of the championship carnivals, and with the experience gained

and further experimentation with timetables we will soon iron out most of the wrinkles.

The Branch ably assisted the smooth operation of our carnivals by the allocation of funds to maintain the carnival gear.

It is now time for the Branch to look at the possibility of purchasing two important items of gear. Firstly, a truck or caravan, or both, so as gear may be efficiently stores and transported. Secondly, the Branch should decide on purchasing its own public address system. Most of the problems at carnivals over the past two years have been caused by suspect P.A. equipment.

Many people and a great deal of equipment is needed to conduct a successful carnival and for Sydney Branch, both of these prerequisites were fulfilled.

Next year will see the introduction of more new events — mainly in the water area. R & R will now be Open 6 Man, Open 4 Man and Cadet 4 Man. The Board will endeavour to instruct Clubs and Officials in the new format for these new events for introduction in the coming season.

It has been a successful season for the Branch in conducting carnivals and this is due in so small way to the following:-

The Council and Shire beach inspectors, who advised and assisted us wherever possible, the Branch Officers who have helped in the liaison with Clubs and provided the secretarial services; the IRB's and JRB's who again played a major role; to the many Officials from other Branches who helped, Central Coast, Manly-Warringah, Illawarra, and during the Test, South Australia and Queensland, we extend our thanks.

Without the competitors, there would be no carnivals, to all these men and boys who took part go our sincere thanks for their co-operation.

Last but not least, our own Board Members. This year was a good one, our standards have improved and Clubs have appreciated this fact. The competitors have appreciated it and the Board should feel proud of a job well done.

## SYDNEY WALES HELICOPTER RESCUE SERVICE

The last season has proved the busiest on record for the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service operated by the Surf Life Saving Association in Sydney.

The helicopter and its carefully trained crews once again were on duty every day throughout the year, and responded to assist with a record 346 missions. These resulted in 36 people being resuced, 146 people were treated by the crew or flown to hospital and the Service completed another 164 search and support operations.

That brings to 1,257 the total number of missions completed by the Service since its inception in October, 1973.

On two missions, rescue crewmen and a doctor were hoisted down to boats to render emergency aid to seamen insured or seriously ill over 5km off shore. The patients where then hoisted up to the hovering helicopter in a special stretcher and flown direct to hospital.

Reflecting the rise in popularity of boating, and the lack of preparation that many undertake before heading out on the water, the helicopter was called out 60 separate times to assist boats in distress or lost.

The helicopter played a vital role with accurate aerial observation and medical support during bush fires in Sutherland Shire, and during the bush fire emergencies in

December in Warrighah and Hornsby Shires.

The level of community support was achieved through the dedicated efforts of the Service's pilots, rescue crewmen, doctors, divers and support personnel including the staff of SLSA surf rescue radio bases. Apart from the employment of one fulltime rescue crewman and the services of professional pilots, all rescue and medical crew undertake duty in a volunteer capacity.

Close liaison was maintained with all emergency authorities, and in particular the police, ambulance, hospitals, bush fire brigades, council lifeguards, boating groups, and, through the SLSA radio network, the various surf life

saving clubs.

Rescue crewmen this winter, in addition to completing their normal duty in hospital emergency wards, have been undertaking an advanced first aid certificate course organised by the Service through the Red Cross Society.

The Service and its members were involved in a wide variety of seminars, demonstrations and disaster exercises. In all, some 40 separate lectures were presented, including sessions at the Third Helicopter Aviation Medical Seminar, presented by the Aviation Medical Society of Australia and New Zealand at the Army Aviation Centre at Oakey in Queensland.

A close watch was kept on overseas developments in this specialised field of aviation. Honorary medical director Dr. Sue Rowley visited helicopter groups in England and Europe in December, chief pilot Peter Howe attended the annual Helicopter Association of America convention in the United States in February, the director Ian Badham and crewman Tony LeMarseny were selected in the SLSA'S first national helicopter study team which visited New Zealand and the United States in April and May.

The result has been continued development of the Sydney Wales Helicopter Rescue Service, voted by an overseas helicopter expert during a conference in Sydney during the season as "equal to the world's best rescue/

medical helicopter services".

Liaison within the SLSA system was maintained through Ian Badham as the Sydney Branch/Board helicopter director, Mark Fraser serving as Manly-Warringah Branch Liaison officer, crewman Peter Gard again held the post of NSW State Centre helicopter adviser, Dr. Sue Rowley was a member of the State medical panel, and Ian Badham also continued as national aerial facilities officer.

Without major sponsorship the helicopter could not operate in this efficient manner to assist the community, without cost or obligation, when life or property is

subject to serious threat.

The efforts of the Bank of New South Wales should be applauded, in contributing to all seven SLSA helicopter operations in Australia after the initial development in Sydney. The support sponsorship from Radio 2UE and Channel TEN not only contributed to the funding, but allow direct media coverage of many dramatic incidents.

This sponsorship was assisted by assistance from the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation with special items of equipment, and the Royal North Shore Hospital and St. Leonards Rotary Club for providing an excellent standby helipad, storage facility, office and medical support.

#### IRB SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

Big seas and bright sunshine provided the ingredients for many of arduous patrols carried out by the IRB's during the past season.

Statistics reveal that IRB crews performed 489 rescues out of a total of 1989 performed by members throughout the Branch, thus averaging 25% of all rescues effected. This is a splendid achievement by a truly dedicated section

At the Annual Gear Inspection all IRB's and Motors were found to be in excellent condition and full marks to the members responsible.

With the 1980-81 season rapidly approaching, now is the time for Clubs to have any major repairs effected as there could be a considerable delay if all boats were returned to the supplier for repairs at the last moment.

During the season an IRB Field Day was conducted at Maroubra, which was highly successful and we are indebted to the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service for its involvement.

A disaster exercise was conducted in Botany Bay in collaboration with the police and ambulance, simulating various methods of rescuing people out of the Bay following an air crash. The results of the exercise were very enlightening and will significantly assist the police in their future exercises.

An instructional weekend was held at Era, with a very enthusiastic team of operators and it is obvious that their new craft will provide an effective life saving tool in

Several examinations were carried out during the season which resulted in 29 IRB Crewman's Certificates, 24 IRB Driver's Certificates, 4 Instructor's Certificates and 6 Examiner's Certificates. Congratulations to all the recipients and a special thank you to my co-examiners, Bruce Gardiner, Arthur White, David Cooper, Peter Squire and John Kentwell. The record of individual Clubs' rescues and awards gained are listed elsewhere in this report and make interesting reading.

The successful operation of IRB's is dependant upon a sufficient number of qualified drivers to be available to carry out the surveillance duties required by each Club. Unless new members are being continually trained and introduced into the patrol work, the IRB performance will ultimately suffer in that particular Club.

Accordingly, each Club must review its activities and

ensure that this situation is not reached.

The Sydney Branch is currently formulating a policy on a 24 hour emergency call out system and when this is finally evolved, I feel sure that IRB will play an important role.

The panel had a good start with plenty of interest. Preseason exercises were carried out and the IRB's were involved with the air disaster simulation in Botany Bay. Participation in this exercise brought home the need for the development of night rescue operations and the 24

hour call out system.

JRB-4 made an advertisement for Mobil Oil and gained a 4,000 litre fuel sponsorship. More significantly this allowed an increase in search operations for missing persons and boats off Sydney. A number of these were performed at dusk highlighting the need to develop night operations.

### TREASURER'S REPORT

Actual details of the Sydney Branch finances are set out elsewhere in this report in the Income and Expenditure Accounts and the Balance Sheet.

As can be seen from those figures the Branch remains in

a stable financial position.

Once again the main source of income was from the patrol screen advertising arrangement with Amatil. This contract expires at the end of 1980. Branch Officers are currently in the process of negotiation with Amatil and we hope to have some good news in the near future concerning the arrangements.

The Branch funds were also bolstered by donations, sponsorships and grants from government, business and the private sectors. Details of these supporters are listed earlier in this report under the heading of Sponsors. We offer our sincere thanks to all who have supported; from the smallest

donation to the largest sponsorship.

The spiralling inflationary trends are certaintly not bypassing the administrative activities of the Branch. Funds in excess of \$12,000 were required to provide a service for the benefit of Branch Clubs. This included secretarial services, printing and stationery, postages, telephones and photocopying charges. Branch insurances cost \$2,870 this season and the replacement of carnival equipment is a heavy drag on funds — \$1,200. Board of Control equipment and expenses resulted in an expenditure of approximately \$3,000.

We extend to the Bank of New South Wales, Radio 2UE and Channel TEN our thanks for the extra funds required to make this Service available to the community on a full-time basis.

My thanks are extended to the office staff for the assistance given during the year. To Kevin Quinn, Assistant Treasurer for attending to all insurance matters and to Peter Stapleton, Honorary Auditor, for once again assisting the Branch with the Audit and preparation of the Financial Statements

My appreciation is also extended to the finance committee and fellow Branch Officers who assisted to keep the Branch finance matters in order.
