

Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the President, Officers and Members of the Sydney Branch Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, I am pleased to present to you the Branch's 33rd Annual Report and Financial Statement, for the 1981/82 season.

This season has been a special one to Sydney Branch. Within the Sydney area, Surf Life Saving started in Australia and we would like to extend special congratulations to the following Clubs who have been operating for 75 years – Bondi, Bronte, Clovelly, Coogee, Cronulla, Maroubra, North Bondi and Tamarama.

Within the 75 years of Surf Life Saving we have seen a varied number of changes. These have been the upgrading of the Reel, Line and Belt; the introduction of the Rescue Tube; Inflatable Rescue Boats; Jet Rescue Boats; Helicopter Rescue Services; Radio Systems; redesigned Rescue Boats and Skis. Life Saving has entered a completely new era and imagine the thoughts of the members who were Life Savers in the early 1900's, if they could now be here and experience our motorised services we have today. This year through motorised craft within the Branch we have had 684 rescues.

Surf Life Saving today is more professional, the Clubs have grown with finances and membership to become much stronger thus supplying a better service to the public who use our beaches. The Clubs now are governed by large bodies, such as Districts, Branches, State Centres and National Council and these bodies have made the Clubs tasks easier.

The Branch extends its appreciation to the Sydney Clubs, New South Wales State Centre and National Council on its preparation and promotions for this, our 75th Anniversary.

Once again within the Branch, I am pleased to report that no lives were lost whilst patrols were on duty and congratulations are extended to the 15 Clubs for their efforts, particularly to the Clubs' patrol captains and members who, at all times, try to prevent rescues before they happen.

Our life saving activities were under the guidance of our Board of Control Superintendent, Trevor Elliott, and Deputy Superintendent, Ron Howells. Their responsibilities were well arranged, particularly our Mobile Services which comprise the supervision of Patrols, Radio Netwrok, IRB, JRB and the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service.

The Branch administration was once again quite active with monthly Executive Meeting and full Branch Meetings, J. Dempster W.A.T. Crain, M.B.E. R.M. Howells J.R. Switzer J.K. Vaughan G.B. Staunton, M.B.E. A. Moseley H.J. Brown, O.A.M.

This season saw the Branch break away from using New South Wales State Centre premises and entering into an arrangement for a secretarial service only.

At the commencement of the season, the Branch conducted a full day seminar called "LIFESAVING 82". This proved a most successful day and covered a number of life saving and administration subjects. Following this successful day, the Board of Control conducted a weekend Live-In Seminar for its members at the Baden Powell Scout Camp, Pennant Hills and it also proved to be a success.

Mobile Services played a dramatic part in our rescue operations again this season. The flag ship of these services would, without doubt, be the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service. This season it was in operation 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. On weekdays, it is manned by a full time pilot, crewman and doctor and on weekends, the hours of service were extended from 6.00 a.m. to 10.00 p.m. employing another pilot with voluntary crewman and doctor. The main missions flown by the Helicopter were 30 rescues, 172 medical assistance and 195 search and support missions, a total of 397 missions. The Helicopter Rescue Service is now in its 9th season and since its inception, it has completed 2,037 missions. The Branch extends its congratulations to the Helicopter Rescue Service's Director Ian Badham; Dan Tyler and Bob Ford and also the duty crews and doctors that have performed these missions over the years. We also appreciate the sponsorship from the following:

Without these firms' financial support, the Service would not exist and we also thank the Royal North Shore Hospital for providing facilities for the Helicopter Crews.

In conjunction with the Helicopter Rescue Service, we also have a number of mobile services that play just as big a part in Surf Life Saving. 14 Clubs within the Branch now have IRB's. These are operated by the Clubs with the help of Total Australia Limited, Outboard Marine and Mariner Outboards, who, besides supporting individual clubs, support major IRB Field Days, Motor Schools and Carnivals. IRB's performed a large part of our rescues and over the years and have proven to be a very versatile rescue craft. Most IRB's are Zodiac and at this particular time, National Council, in conjunction with the Cat existing purchas purchas the Cat, the Ca

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Zodiac, are testing a number of new craft for better performance. The Branch thanks our IRB Supervisor, Harry Brown, for his efforts towards IRB's.

This season, we saw the second Branch IRB championships which were held over two evenings, February 10th and 11th, 1982, and our thanks go to Siebers Vogel's Bakery for their sponsorship and also to Cronulla SLSC for providing the venue and their help and assistance. For the second year, Branch clubs competed in the N.S.W. IRB Championships which were held at Soldiers Beach in the Central Coast Branch.

Our JRB fleet was in full operation with the Branch having 2 JRB's . JRB 2 in the Cronulla Sutherland district and JRB 3 in the Randwick District. During the season, Waverley District, in conjunction with the Branch Executive and Waverley Council, had discussions regarding a replacement craft for JRB 4; these discussions are still continuing. Next season will see the replacement of JRB 3 which is presently under construction. Randwick Council has also agreed to a replacement towing vehicle. Both craft are housed in a separate location and supply a back-up to IRB's off-shore rescue work as well as in-shore rescues. Our IRB fleet is under the control of our Board of Control JRB Supervisor and our thanks go to the supporters of these craft:

Randwick and Sutherland Councils Total, Caltex and Mobil Oils

for their continued interests in our Mobile Services. Our radio network played a big part in our Clubs and Mobile Services under the supervision of John Wardall. Our appreciation goes to the Maroubra Seals Club for the use of their premises to house "SYDNEY SURF RESCUE"

The Branch radio system is operated on two systems, AM and UHF. The radio room is in complete contact with Clubs from Cronulla to North Bondi. The only clubs within the Branch that are not in direct contact with "Sydney Surf Rescue" are Garie, Era and Burning Palms but, by the middle of next season, through the financial support of the Department of Sport and Recreation and Sydney Branch, these Clubs will have contact through a Repeater Radio Station.

Financial support to the Branch came from grants from the Department of Sport and Recreation, which helped with Branch administration, Helicopter Rescue Service and various Clubs. Also Clubs within the Branch gained financial help from the Capital Works Grant for building extensions to their existing Clubhouses, etc. Clubs were also supported in the purchases of gear and equipment by the Herald Gear Fund and the Australian Government through the dollar for dollar Gear Grant, where Clubs received subsidies of \$9,773.12 to purchase lifesaving equipment.

Patrol screens were supplied to all Clubs by Amatil and this is to continue for a further three years. Amatil also contributed towards administration costs of the Branch. The Branch wishes to extend its appreciation for support to all levels of Government and Amatil - it is certainly well appreciated by the Clubs.

The Branch also acquired two additional trailers this season; one old gear trailer has been renovated to an IRB trailer and our thanks go to Harry Brown for his time and effort and the the sponsor of the trailer, Total Australia. We have updated to a completely enclosed trailer for gear and equipment and our thanks to WD & HO Wills for their sponsorship and our Publicity Officer Jim Parker for arranging same.

At the commencement of the season, three of our Districts changed their names and are now known as:

No. 2 District - Cronulla Sutherland District

No. 3 District – Randwick District No. 4 District – Waverley District

District reports are detailed on later pages.

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On November 28 1981, for the third time, the branch, in conjunction with Club representatives, conducted its Christmas Function at the University of New South Wales. On this evening the Branch farewelled Jim and Shirley Switzer who have moved to Kingscliff on the Far North Coast. Jim, a long time member of the Board of Control and the Branch Executive, will be truly missed. The Branch also made a presentation to Bob and Lal McKenna in recognition of Bob's service to the Association for over 50 years. The Branch thanks those who

attended to make up an excellent audience and to John Dewey for his part in organising the function.

The Branch Gear Inspection Panel from the Board of Control visited Clubs to inspect rescue equipment. This year the Don Lucas Trophy for the best equipment went to Cronulla SLSC. We extend our congratulations.

Earlier in the season, New South Wales State Centre Executive Officers visited Branch Clubs. They visited Garie, Era and Burning Palms on November 15, Cronulla to Maroubra on November 21st and Coogee to North Bondi November 22nd. In conjunction with Branch officials, they inspected Clubs and discussed any problems they had. This was a most worthwhile visit and we trust it will continue in future years. The Branch also thanks those Clubs who have co-operated with both Branch and other levels in the form of Association Officers, premises for meetings, functions, accommodation etc.

On 5th February 1982, the Branch was honoured to host the New South Wales State Centre Mid-Yearly meeting at Maroubra SLSC. In conjunction with this, the Branch held a Twilight Carnival on the night before. This was a most successful event and next season we should see more twilight carnivals.

On January 8th 1982, a "welcome" reception was held for the promising country competitors at North Bondi. The following Clubs participated: Cronulla, Elouera and Wanda.

This reception was held in conjunction with New South Wales State Centre, Manly Warringah. The five country competitors were:- Stephen Herbert (Yamba), David Shrubb (Wauchope Bonny Hills), Tim Crisp (Black Head), Peter Cochrane (Shellharbour) and Peter Lenehan (Batemans Bay)

These competitors competed in Metropolitan carnivals and gained a wealth of experience. This season, the Branch will once again support this scheme

Sydney Branch was represented in the International Test Carnival against New Zealand in January 1982. This bi-annual event known as the Trans Tasman Test, was won by Australia, at Mount Maungani. The members were Peter Pearce, Manager (Burning Palms); Mick Porra (Coogee); Peter Tibbitts (Cronulla) and John Walker (Bronte). The Branch thanks Cronulla RSL and Cronulla SLSC and the Cecil Hotel for their services and support to this Australia Team.

Another tour of New Zealand was the New South Wales Power Craft Team and the Branch had representation from Don McGroder (North Cronulla). The team left for New Zealand on February 4th 1982 and this tour was one of education and competition.

In competition we were reasonably successful and our congratulations to Southport Queensland for their success in the pointscore at the Australian Championships. The Clubs within the Branch won an impressive array of medals at the Australian Championships. Our congratulations to Moana SLSC, South Australia, the venue of this season's Australian Championships.

The State Championships were held at North Curl Curl and to all competitors that entered, go our congratulations.

At the inter-Branch Championships held at Wamberal, Sydney Branch had by far the majority of wins but it could not match the consistency of Manly-Warringah who won with 250 points from Sydney 228 points and Central Coast 226 points third. Our congratulations to the Team Members and Phil Vanny, Manager and Ron Sandstrom, Coach thanks for the outstanding effort

The Metropolitan Championships between Sydney and Manly-Warringah Branches were held at Bondi, in conjunction with the World-Wide Lions International Conference. This was a most impressive day with the colour party heading the March Past carrying 80 Lions' Flags. To Clubs that supplied members for this parade goes our appreciation. The Championships were again sponsored by the United Permanent Building Society. The Club pointscore was won by Manly LSC - congratulations.

Further details of competition appear later in this report. To our sponsors for their support, without which this Branch could not function, goes our appreciation and sincere thanks.

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To the Board of Control and its members for their neverending help and support, also goes our appreciation.

To the Officers concerned with National Council and New South Wales State Centre, our thanks for your continuous help and support to this Branch and to the New South Wales State Centre Office Staff – Ernie Davis, Administrator; Joan Vaughan, Julie MacKenzie and Henry Hendra – we also thank you.

This season has been one of celebration and hard work but I feel with the promoting of Surf Life Saving's 75th Year, the public are aware of our efforts for their protection. merch

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RESCUES

The total figure for rescues performed by Members during the past seasons shows an increase of 214 on the 1980-81 season's figure of 2,225. This increase no doubt is a reflection of the community's increased leisure time, but when it is considered the early part of the season was accompanied by adverse weather conditions during weekends, Clubs may well be concerned with this increase.

AWARDS

Award figures, as compared to last season, were slightly down, especially the figures for the basic award of the Bronze Medallion. This trend will have to be reversed and Clubs will need to give serious consideration to the recruitment of new Members and the qualification of present Members in the fields of mobile services and radio.

SURF LIFE SAVING BOARD OF CONTROL

The year under review has been one of consolidation and planning. Responsibility for two main areas of operation of the Board, namely examinations and instruction and carnivals and competition, have been undertaken by new Executive Members, Bernie Kelly and Ron Day respectively. Both men have put a great deal of time and effort into their areas of operation and this has paid off with efficient and smooth operations.

The award total of 1,079 for the current season, although slightly lower than last year (1,201) did not ease the considerable workload placed on Members' who attended both final and preliminary examinations. Overall, there were over 217 examinations for basic awards. This figure does not take into account proficiency testing and specialist award examinations such as IRB, ARC and Radio.

The Board organised and ran the competition side of 5 open carnivals (Garie, North Cronulla, North Bondi, Elouera and Coogee), the Branch Championships at Cronulla and the Branch IRB Championships held over two evenings mid-week also at Cronulla, the Metropolitan Championships at Bondi and the Interdistrict at Bronte. The Board also organised the Rossfield Carnival held at the Bondi Icebergs. As well as attending carnivals within the Branch, Members made a worthwhile contribution to running the Interbranch at Wamberal, the State Championships at North Curl Curl and 21 Board Members participated in the Australian Championships at Moana Beach, South Australia. This total number of carnivals has meant, for those Members attending carnivals only, one each weekend. This does not take into account those members who attend carnivals and who then back-up again on Sunday mornings to conduct examinations. It is evident that many members are performing an almost impossible task.

Proficiency testing remains a problem area for the Board. A re-evaluation of the number of days allocated to these tests and the number of venues allocated will have to be made before next season. The situation of 4 examiners attending a beach and examining 10 Club Members in a whole morning will have to stop. Proficiency tests have now been introduced for 3 seasons and all club members are aware of what is required of them. Clubs will have to be more cooperative in organising their members and show a little more strength by insisting their members attempt them early in the season. The fact that many club members leave it to the last minute places a great strain on the examination manpower of the Board, especially when considering that examinations of squads for their basic awards is in full swing at this time.

In August 1981, before the commencement of the surfing season, the Board conducted a live-in weekend seminar at the Pennant Hills Scout Camp. Over 35 Members attended for the full weekend to receive the information provided by the various speakers and, more importantly, to give valuable feedback and comment on various aspects of Board management and policy.

A great deal of information came from this seminar. Some policies have been implemented and others will be put into action during this coming season.

At this point, I would like to mention the Board Executives' appreciation to the Aquatic Club of Kings Cross who made a considerable donation of funds towards meeting the costs of the seminar. I would also like to thank John Dewey and his "staff" in the kitchen area for the efforts they put into organising the catering side of the weekend. I would, however, make one request. Please, no soup on the menu for the forthcoming State Examiners' Conference.

There will be no weekend seminar as last year organised, however, the Executive is putting its energies towards making the State Examiners Conference a success. This Conference, of weekend duration will be held at the Scout Camp on August 13, 14, 15, 1982. Sydney Branch will be holding 4 seperate field days to reinforce aspects of the State Conference that are particularly pertinent to our Branch and its operations. Two days will be for examination and instruction and two days will be on carnivals and competition matters.

The Branch, at the beginning of the season, held a full day seminar encompassing the Board's main areas with Club Captains', Vice Captains', Chief Instructors' and Gear Stewards' conferences all being included in the one day. The seminar, held at North Bondi, was very successful from the Board's point of view and was well attended by all Clubs, however, there were a few exceptions at the Chief Instructors' sessions. A format similar is already being planned and it is hoped that this seminar will be as successful.

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An IRB field day was held on August 23, 1981 at Cronulla which was well attended by Clubs within the Branch who have this type of craft operating from their beaches. As well as general instruction and demonstrations relating to their operation, a number of successful examinations were conducted. Our thanks to Cronulla Club for hosting the day and to Graham Bruce who did a lot to help make the day such a success.

The annual carnival organisers meeting was conducted by Ron Day early in the season so Clubs could be made aware of Board requirements to ensure successful carnivals. Timetables were arranged for each carnival and the United Permanent Carnival Programme incorporating Manly-Warringah carnivals was compiled. As a result of this meeting, all Sydney Branch carnivals were very well run and enjoyed by all competitors. One point, however, which was highlighted by increasing entries in various sections, is that there will have to be serious consideration to the timetable for each carnival in order that our Members and the competitors are not still on the beach conducting events after 4.30 p.m.

In November a field day was arranged to introduce new judges to the R & R and Marchpast events. It was hoped that a reasonably competent panel of judges would be obtained from this day to run the competition during the season. There was a dissapointing roll-up of Members, but for those who did attend, a great deal of benefit was obtained, especially in the Marchpast section where even seasoned judges learnt something new. I would like to especially thank the Wanda R & R team for their patience and understanding of the Board's objective on this day and also to the Marchpast coaches who were in attendance.

In February this year, Bernie Kelly organised a New Members' night at Maroubra. The evening was well attended by Probationery Members and formal examinations were held for those members eligible to join the Board as Full Members. Members of the Executive gave some insight to the internal workings of the Board and Branch President, Bill Marshall told those present that all who join the Board would, in the long term, gain immeasurable satisfaction for themselves and bring new knowledge to their own Clubs.

The emergency services within the Branch again performed outstandingly. The Wales Helicopter Rescue Service completed nearly 400 missions, bringing the total since the inception of the Service to 2,037. JRB2 in the Sutherland District maintained regular patrols, even though they were extremely hampered by increasing running costs and lack of adequate finance. Clubs within this District will have to seriously rethink their attitudes towards providing the necessary finance to enable this rescue facility to fully maintain viable patrols in the area.

JRB3 has again this year continued to provide surveillance in the No. 3 and No. 4 Districts. A new craft has been ordered and will be operating at the start of this coming season. It appears at this stage, there will not be a permanent JRB4 operating, but active negotiations are continuing at District Executive level for a combined funding for the JRB3 operation.

Meetings have been held of the JRB Panel and since the resignation of Rae Sorenson for health reasons from the position of JRB Supervisor, members of each JRB group have been attending Executive Meetings to report their activities. A start has been made by the Panel to formulating a whole new policy on the operations of JRB's within the Branch. JRB Groups are aware of the serious situation of not having a JRB Supervisor to represent them at Branch level and have indicated they will elect a Supervisor at their Annual General Meeting to be held this month.

During the year, further UHF radio tests were conducted in the No. 1 District both by our Radio Officer, John Wardall and by NSW State Centre. Results are very encouraging and all Clubs are able to contact Illawarra Surf Rescue in cases of emergency where the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service is needed to treat and evacuate patients. In addition, towards the end of the season, Burning Palms was able to contact Sydney Surf direct using the Branch's spare UHF radio. Negotiations are currently underway with State Centre and the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service with a view to installing a repeater radio system which will enable Clubs in the District direct access to emergency services 24 hours a day.

Membership of the Board was marginally reduced at the commencement of the season following a review of members attitudes to Board undertakings and their participation in activities during the 1980-81 season. However, with new membership nominations received, and those gaining specialist Examiner Awards, we were able to maintain and even surpass our numerical strength as compared to last season.

The year under review was especially good in terms of probationery memberships approved. A total of 22 new members joined our ranks as probationery members. Eight have since gained their Examiners Certificate and I would welcome Stewart Baily, Graham Bruce, Ron Camilleri, Bruce Fraser, Ron Hammond, Peter Murphy, Rod Silcock and Graham Smith to the Board. Fourteen probationery members are still to complete their formal examination and welcome them also: Craig Bissell, Peter Davies, John Hammond, John Lloyd, Michael Martin, Grant McMah, John Osmond, Kym Pennell, Jim Poulos, John Shaw, Alfred Smith, Brad Taylor and Bruce Tually. I would especially welcome the Board's first female member, Marion Lucas of Wanda, who has joined us and who is proving very capable on the examination side of Board activities.

The good relationships built up over many years between the Board and the Clubs of the Branch have continued during this past season. I would thank Club Management Committees for their co-operation and the implementation of Board decisions and look forward to its continuation next season. In particular, I would personally thank the management of the Maroubra Club. They have hosted all full meetings of the Board this season and as well the Board has held a number of special meetings at their Club.

EXAMINATION and INSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The Seasons' Award totals were down on the previous year's figure. However, even with the slump in totals, the outstanding efforts of 3 Clubs must be acknowledged and congratulated. North Cronulla with 179 active awards and both Elouera and South Maroubra with over 100 awards. These 3 clubs alone accounted for 35% of the total Branch awards.

There are some points from the following Award Tables that I believe are worth highlighting and an improvement made next season:

- no JRB Crewmen's Certificates were awarded
- only 4 JRB Driver's Certificates were gained
- although there were 59 Radio Operator's Certificates awarded Clubs need to improve on this figure
- Bronze Medallion awards are down 36 on last seasons total 414.

There are two other matters which disturbed me this year. The inactivity of the ARC Panel and the alarming lack of Examiners in the No. 4 District. However, with persistence I believe both these matters can be corrected during the coming season. I would like to thank all those members, who, without their assistance and experience, my job would have been impossible. In particular I would thank Ernie Stephens and the District Supervisors for their co-operation. To Carl Melvey, Neil Miller and Greg Hewett, my personal thanks for the number of examinations you have undertaken, especially on so many occasions with such little notice.

CARNIVAL and COMPETITION SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

We are approaching a new season which will involve a short and very busy schedule. We should look back at last season and reflect not so much on what we achieved successfully, but on where we had problems. They were mainly felt in the craft and water areas where the number of competitors and teams are rapidly increasing.

Although lack of Officials has been a problem, our biggest battle is time. Time taken to run events and time wasted for events which cover two areas such as taplin and Ironman events. To properly plan our programme so as we do not waste time having competitors and Officials standing around, which is unavoidable in some instances, I will be asking Clubs to commence carnival events earlier. This will probably affect the craft and water areas the most.

Five open carnivals were held in the Branch this season at Garie, North Cronulla, North Bondi, Elouera and Coogee. As well, the Interdistrict held at Bronte, The Rossfield Carnival, the Metropolitan Championships at Bondi and both the Branch Championships and IRB Championships held at Cronulla.

The Referees, Mick Berger, Nick Dixon, Jim Connolly, Ron Howells, John Dewey and Trevor Elliott and the appointed Officials gave their full support and co-operation which went a long way to making all carnivals so successful. It was however, unfortunate that the South Maroubra Carnival had to be cancelled at the last minute due to pollution problems caused by a Water Board strike.

Again, a meeting of all Club carnival organisers was held early in the season and from comments received Carnival Referees have been involved with each club's respective carnival, ensuring that the competitive side ran smoothly.

I would like to thank all Board Members who officiated at carnivals during the past season. I would make special mention of our ladies, Mary Andrews, Ann Ainsworth, Gloria Howells and Merle Sargeant for their invaluable assistance throughout the year. I know how many members appreciate your efforts and from me ladies, my personal thanks to you all.

I look forward to an exciting season coming and in closing, my thanks for their co-operation to all competitors and to our unofficial official Peter Doolan for his tremendous help in the craft area.

WALES HELICOPTER RESCUE SERVICE

The Service is now completing its ninth season of duty in what has proved the busiest on record. Over the SLSA statistical season, the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service in Sydney completed 397 seperate missions comprising:—

- 30 people rescued
- 172 people given medical assistance

195 search and support missions. Since its inception the Service has now completed 2,037 missions.

A significant improvement to quick response to emergency calls came during the season with an increase in budget funds last October. Since then the Service has engaged a second pilot and has maintained a double shift at weekends and on public holidays. This has meant a duty crew comprising pilot, doctor and rescue crewman on duty from 6.00 a.m. to 10.00 p.m. every weekend and public holiday. In addition the mid-week period is covered from 8.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. (6.00 p.m. daylight saving) with the Friday evening period covered until 7.00 p.m.

Outside these hours, the Service has been on call to respond to emergencies on a 24 hour basis. To achieve out-of-hours co-ordination the Service has an emergency telephone number which is diverted to a duty officer when the office is not staffed.

The Wales Helicopter has always held a primary function of being a rescue, search and medical back up to Surf Club patrols and mobiles. Beyond that, the Service provides community support, in particular in liaison with Police and Ambulance.

The Service's charter is "To provide a search, rescue and medical support service for the community — without cost or obligation when life is threatened — in co-operation with emergency authorities".

This showed with rescues from bush areas, boats at sea and in rivers, plus being called to search for missing bushwalkers and boats as well as transferring seriously ill patients from outlying hospitals to major treatment centres.

It was rewarding to note the saving of life when fishermen were reported swept from rocks. Helicopter crews rescued some five fishermen from this situation – two after they had spent almost an hour in the heavy seas off Royal National Park clinging to an esky.

The value of having support of a crew doctor showed in many missions where vital "intensive care" treatment was supplied in the field before a patient was taken to hospital. Where Lifesavers need such support, such as in cases of immersion, exposure or cardiac arrest, The Helicopter provides competent support crews and supplies.

Provision of the Helicopter by the Surf Life Saving Association, Sydney Branch, again was made possible through sponsorship provided by;-

Bank of New South Wales Radio 2UE Sydney Channel TEN Sydney

Additional support came from the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation — in particular with special funds to equip the aircraft with a 3.5 million candlepower Locator searchlight. Other support came from service clubs and from the Royal North Shore Hospital where the Helicopter is based.

It is anticipated that next season will be the last of duty for the current Bell Jet Ranger Helicopter, which has been chartered from Ferguson Helicopters since 1976. Provision of a more suitable helicopter will allow the Service to more efficiently provide back-up support to a wide variety of situations. From records, the Sydney Helicopter carried out some 60% of all missions completed annually by the SLSA's 10 rescue helicopters.

The appreciation of all involved in providing the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service for the community is extended to Officers of the Board and Branch, Clubs, radio room operators and the various crews of jet and inshore rescue boats with which the helicopter has linked.

Thirteen of the Branch's 15 Clubs now operate IRB's. All Clubs participated in training programmes during the year and their individual efforts are reflected in the IRB Activities Schedule.

The inaugural IRB Education Training Panel Seminar held by State Centre at Cronulla on 10, 11 and 12 July, 1981 was conducted and the following Branch members were selected onto the NSW IRB Training Panel: B. Gardiner, D. Cooper, B. Kelly, E. Goldberg and H. Brown. The National IRB Conference was held at North Cronulla on 4, 5 and 6 September, 1981 and the submissions from Sydney Branch were a significant contribution to the recommendations endorsed at the Conference.

Our IRB Inspectors carried out detailed inspections of all IRB's and motors during the annual Gear Inspection in September and it is pleasing to record that apart from some minor work all Clubs had their boats operational. IRB Examiners carried out several examinations and it is pleasing to record there were no failures. In fact, the standard of driving was quite high. Particular mention should be made of the examination carried out at Bronte with Candidates from Bronte and North Bondi in attendance. The surf was at least 3 metres high and it is to the full credit of the two Club's Instructors that all candidates passed with flying colours.

The IRB's once again showed their ability as "the Association's rescue tool of the eighties" in performing a total of 600 rescues which represents 25% of all rescues performed in the Branch. On many occasions they worked as a team with the No. 2 and No. 3 jet rescue boats. This form of search and rescue work is to be commended. Preventative actions, that is the moving of craft and people into their respective surfing areas was another important aspect of our surveillance work successfully accomplished.

All carnivals held in Sydney Branch utilised IRB's for laying of buoys and acting as the rescue boats and I would like to record my thanks particularly to Graham Bruce, Bill Singleton, Arthur White and Ron Day for their assistance and to all the IRB crews who participated.

IRB Competition is now an accepted part of our activities and the techniques of the drivers and crew have shown a great improvement due to this form of training under actual stress. An open IRB Carnival was successfully conducted at Maroubra in August and the Branch IRB Championships were contested at Cronulla Beach on Wednesday and Thursday, 10th and 11th February, 1982 as a twilight carnival. Era Club were the overall winners, however, all clubs who participated enjoyed events and we are indeed grateful to Siebers Vogel Breads for their financial support.

The NSW IRB Championships were held at Soldiers Beach in 3 to 4 metre surf and the Sydney Branch contingent of drivers and crewmen performed extremely well.

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The Total Company made a donation of \$350 which enabled the Branch to modify and old trailer and we are indeed grateful for the amount of work carried out by Bill Singleton in modifying the trailer and having it rustproofed.

Johnson – Outboard Marine conducted a motor training school on 13th February which was well attended and all members present learnt a great deal about preventative motor maintenance and we are indeed grateful for the continued support assistance of O.M.A.

In conclusion, I wish to extend my personal thanks and appreciation to all members who participated in our IRB activities during the past year. In particular, my IRB Inspectors and Examiners and the Club IRB Captains and Instructors for an outstanding job well done.

RADIO OFFICER'S REPORT

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It It is very pleasing to again be able to say that the Sydney Branch Base Radio was able to support the beach patrols to the fullest in protection and rescue of the bathing public.

The Radio Room was operational for the full patrol year of 68 days, staffed by 14 volunteers and despite the poor surfing weather early in the season, quite a number of rescues and searches were co-ordinated through Sydney Surf.

The total number of awards shows a slight increase over the previous season's figure of 66 and a significant number were of mature years and experience which will no doubt assist the participating clubs in maintaining their patrol efficiency. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The programme undertaken by the Sydney Branch Board of Control was considerable and the calls made on Members were demanding. The dedication to Lifesaving by Members, to the Branch and its Clubs is demonstrated in the hours spent at meetings, sub-committees, seminars, instructional nights, field days, up-dates, demonstrations, examinations and carnivals in and out of season.

The year has had its problems and successes. The continual failure of the Clovelly Club to reach a satisfactory standard of patrols saw the need for a select committee to be formed by the Branch and recommendations and guidelines have been formulated for the coming season. The position of JRB Supervisor was not filled for the full season which left the Groups without a direct representative to the Branch and necessitated representatives being called on occasions to Board Executive meetings.

On the success side there was enthusiasm in the activities of the Board and a continued increase in membership. The Board seminar kindled ideas and comradeship so necessary for us to progress. The re-introduction of a Patrol Competition was successful and a positive incentive to lifesavers in the Branch.

It was pleasing to see Bernie Kelly successfully complete his initial year as a member of the Board Executive with the continued enthusiasm he brought to the job of Examination and Instruction Supervisor. Ron Day also successfully completed his first year as Carnival and Competition Supervisor. John May took up the challenge in the Waverley District when he elected to stand for the position of District Supervisor for the season. His efforts and the amount of travel from Engadine involved were appreciated by those Clubs. Jim Connolly must be thanked for filling-in so ably when Mick Berger was unable to continue mid-season as Cronulla-Sutherland District Supervisor due to ill health. Mick was a loss to the District and the Board Executive but fortunately he is now recovered. Dave Popplewell the retiring Randwick District Supervisor has won the respect of the District over the last 5 years. He has honestly handled the situation at Clovelly, always considering the best interests of the Club. Ian Badham has indicated he will not be seeking the position of Helicopter Director. No. 1 DISTRICT REPORT

The No. 1 District, situated in the Royal National Park and comprising Garie, Era and Burning Palms Clubs, is the smallest district within the Sydney Branch.

Unfortunately, financial support for these Clubs is only received from individual sponsors, Sydney Branch and the Government. The Government support is received in the form of the Australian Government \$ for \$ Gear Grant and the NSW Government Capital Works Grant. The other three Districts receive financial support from their local Councils, but being in the Royal National Park, we are not controlled by a Council.

No. 1 District has been very active this season. Burning Palms Club is now building a Clubhouse, which will be 30 squares – a big venture for such a small Club. However, the big achievement is that every stick of timber, bag of cement, brick etc., must be carried for almost a mile through bushland and down a steep hill. Era is faced with the same predicament and has recently carried out major repairs to their Boat Shed, after the loss of their Clubhouse a few years ago. Garie has now completed a most modern radio room on the top of their Clubhouse and, really, it would put a number of Sydney.Clubs to shame.

In competition, the District was represented at most carnivals by – Garie Beach Sprinters, Era Boat Crews, Burning Palms March Past, and these three teams met with some success at various carnivals.

The District once again took advantage of the Wales Helicopter Rescue Service and due to our location, anumber of medical evacuations were carried out.

Due to the geographical location, no contact with the Sydney Surf Rescue Radio Network is possible. We must therefore, rely on the Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol at Wollongong to relay our messages for assistance to Sydney Surf Rescue. At the present time, tenders are being called for a UHF radio repeater system, which will give the No. 1 District Clubs direct contact with Sydney Surf Rescue.

CRONULLA-SUTHERLAND DISTRICT REPORT

To commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the Shire of Sutherland and the 75th Anniversary of the Surf Life Saving Association, we have changed our No. 2 District name to that of "Cronulla-Sutherland District".

Our four Clubs evolved in 20 year cycles – Cronulla SLSC in 1906-07; North Cronulla SLSC in 1926; Wanda SLSC in 1946 and Elouera PCBSLSC in 1966. We regard this as unique and it leads to our hope that by the year 1986, a new Club will be formed north of Wanda Beach and closer to the "Birthplace of the Nation".

Meanwhile, this unspoilt beach is catering for evergrowing numbers each summer with surfers who like the less crowded areas and whilst no flagged areas have been allowed by Council at this stage, the beach is patrolled by members drawn from the four Clubs when conditions require it and radio surveillance is manned by the Jet Rescue Craft every weekend; midweek, the Council's mobile vehicle carried out patrols.

The new JRB2 jet rescue craft, "Shire of Sutherland" is our fourth boat and, after being launched at the Australian Championships at Wanda, began its first season of operation with great success in both crewing and rescue operations.

Celebrating its 75th year, Cronulla SLSC conducted the Branch Championships and the Branch IRB Championships with great success and also conducted the inaugural "Mazda Classic Boat Marathon" from Botany Bay to Cronulla Beach. For the coming season, the sponsors have raised the prizemoney considerably.

Mr Athol Hill, M.B.E., the Shire Clerk of Sutherland Shire Council, retired this year and this very popular public figure and friend of the Surfing Movement, was presented with four wine goblets, each bearing the Clubs' emblems, at the Branch Championships. At a later function, the Sydney Branch President, Bill Marshall, and the District Executive, bade him farewell at the Council and Mr Hill was moved by the sentiments expressed by Club officials.

North Cronulla SLSC kept up their high standard and topped the Branch in SLSA awards with 179.

Wanda had another successful year and their famous "Sutherland to Surf" Fun Run, being run for the eleventh year, reached the 5000 figure for entrants. This event, which has a wide community participation, and is Wanda's main fund-raiser, is shaded only by the "City to Surf" event in Australia.

Elouera Surf Club, whilst still a relatively young Club, had a great year in competition; Sharon Muddle became the first female to win an Australian gold medal, and their Junior Association youngsters topped their State Championships pointscore.

Elouera gained 105 SLSA awards, the second highest in the Branch and conducted the Sutherland Shire's "Tri-Marathon", a very tough swim-run-ride event, which was won by Greg Reddan, for the second year. Their main fundraiser, the Elouera Beach Girl Contest was again very successful.

The District Executive met regularly and functions well, with the Chairman drawn from each Club in rotation and an elected Secretary for the season. Deliberations by the District Executive have led to a united approach to both the Sutherland Council and the SLSA on life saving matters and this will become more important in the tough times that lie ahead financially for the Clubs.

The Cronulla-Sutherland District wishes to say farewell to the Branch President, Bill Marshall, and express how much we have appreciated his actions and thoughtfulness during his term of office; his leadership and quiet dignity have lifted the Branch in the eyes of the Association and outside the Association and we offer our best wishes to Bill, his wife Faye, and their family.

WAVERLEY DISTRICT REPORT

The Annual General Meeting was held at Bronte SLSC on 26th August 1981, with Gary Shiels being elected as chairman for his third term, as was Peter Quartly who was elected as Secretary. Peter Doolan was elected Treasurer.

At such meeting the Constitution was altered to change our name from No. 4 District Executive to Waverley District Executive. This change was made to recognise the contribution to Surf Life Saving by Waverley Municipal Council.

The Executive meets once a month to discuss district matters and has over the past five years become a clear and single voice, with respect to matters affecting the three beaches in the area and the four clubs themselves. They also meet once every two months with Waverley Municipal Council Life Saving Committee, whose members are Ald. E. Page (Mayor), Ald. B. Nelson (Deputy Mayor), Ald Ray Collins and Mr J. Aiosia (Deputy Engineer).

Meetings with Council have been very fruitful to the District in both monetary terms and understanding. The Council have supported the Waverley Shield, and purchased a new trophy which was presented to Bronte, this seasons winner, also they were presented with a Rescue Board. They have supported the District Team through the outfitting of its members.

The clubs each received \$2,500 as a direct grant, plus \$20,000 for maintence. This sum is allocated by the Executive in accordance with needs. In addition an amount of \$50,000 has been allocated for the second year in succession for capital works. Both Bondi and Tamarama are looking at rebuilding programmes.

South Bondi with respect to bathers swimming in a non gazetted area, still has not been resolved and has lead to some conflict with Council, however meetings are taking place during the off season and it is envisaged the matter will be resolved prior to September.

A meeting with Waverley Beach Inspectors took place at the start of the season and the evening was very fruitful. Another meeting is planned for September, which can only lead to a greater understanding and efficiency on the beach.

A special presentation was arranged for the Hon. Sid Einfeld on his retirement from the political arena, in appreciation of his outstanding support and contributions to Surf Life Saving in the area.

Our thanks are recorded to John May who stepped into the breach as District Supervisor. John was a regular attender at our meetings and could be found on the beach most weekends, which is not a bad effort for a man who does not live in the district.

The JRB4 was not able to be resurrected due to cost factors involved with respect to its replacement, housing, associated vehicle and beach ramp, which in these inflationary times was estimated at in excess of \$200,000. The District is now looking at a co-ordinated IRB network, operating from all beaches.

A First Aid course is being arranged to commence in August, which can only benefit the District and the service provided to the public.

In conclusion, special thanks must be given to our Chairman, Gary Shiels, who has continued the professional approach of his predecessors and has indeed raised our standing in both the eyes of the Association and Waverley Municipal Council.

Last November, Council gave permission to conduct an appeals day throughout the Municipality to commemmorate 75 years of Surf Lifesaving in Australia, with our own Coogee and Maroubra Clubs, amongst the early ones.

The Executive and the Clubs wish to extend their appreciation to the members of the Professional Lifeguards employed by Council on our beaches. Over the past years the co-operation between Lifeguards and the voluntary beach patrols has been most harmonious and the Randwick Superintendent, Mr. Roger Whitmore, attended our monthly meetings and any problems that may have arisen were quickly resolved. Maroubra Seals Club Ltd. continued to be our mainstay and has supported us immensley, particularly in regards the purchase of a uniform patrol shirt for every patrolling member from each Club. The Seal's also sponsored our Inter-District Championship Team, who were runners-up to the Sutherland Shire Team.

Randwick District Executive was formed in 1972 and meetings are held on the third Tuesday of each month, with all Officers in attendance. On the second Tuesday, our Presidents and the JRB3 Captain meet Council's senior staff for formal discussions.

In concluding, the Executive desires to extend its appreciation to the Branch President, Officers and Staff, for their continued support and advice. We would also record the retirement of our own Chairman, for the past six years, who has made his mark on our area and given most worthy service to Surf Lifesaving.
