

#### Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the President, Officers and members of the Sydney Branch of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, I am pleased to present to you the Branch's 34th Annual Report and Financial Statement, for the 1982-83 season.

Once again, it is pleasing to report that no lives were lost whilst patrols were on duty, within the flagged area.

There were 2156 rescues performed this season by our 15 Clubs, the Helicopter Rescue Service and the Jet Rescue Boat Groups. A highlight of the breakdown of equipment used, was the high number of rescues carried out using IRB's — 476. A number of Clubs now have two or more complete units, making the role of surf life saving and patrols easier. Our Westpac Helicopter Rescue Service carried out 404 missions.

Sydney Branch has had its most impressive year for some time. In November, we relinquished our secretarial service with the NSW State Centre. We were fortunate enough to gain the full time services of Joan Vaughan to act as our Branch Office Secretary. Joan worked from home for a number of months; in February, the Directors of the Maroubra Seals Club saw fit to have our Radio Room extended to accommodate our Branch Office, and we wish to extend our appreciation to the Directors, President, John Shore, and Secretary/Manager, John McCormack, for their efforts in assisting us to get this venture into full working order.

Our other major task was the introduction of our new French AS-350B Aerospatiale Squirrel helicopter; this aircraft is being leased through the Westpac Banking Corporation, and is, without doubt, the best equipped Rescue helicopter in Australia. The Service carried our 404 missions — 40 rescues, 173 medical supports, and 191 search and

The Helicopter Rescue Service is celebrating its 10th anniversary and in that time, has flown a total of 2,436 missions since its inception in 1973. The Branch extends its congratulations to the Service's Director, Peter Mac-Cormick, Pilots Dan Tyler and David Jones, full-time crew Bob Ford and Dr. Ian Millar, and the volunteer rescue crewmen and doctors who have performed these missions. Sponsorship from the following companies is also sincerely

appreciated — Westpac Banking Corporation, Radio 2UE and TCN Channel 9. Thanks is also extended to the Royal North Shore Hospital for providing facilities for the base operations.

Our life saving activities were most active during the season, under the guidance of our Branch Superintendent, Trevor Elliott, and his Deputy, Ron Howells. The Board of Control conducted seven open carnivals, a craft carnival, the Interdistrict Championships and the Branch Championships; they also officiated at the Cronulla Club's Mazda Surf Boat Marathon, the Pier One Boat Race, the Rossfield Trophy and the State and Australian Championships.

The Board of Control conducted 200 examinations which results in a total of 1270 awards, an increase of 191 on last year. Proficiency tests were held on 12 days.

The Sydney Branch Surf Life Saving Board of Control was responsible for the efficiency of our patrols, the radio network, our mobile services — the IRB's, JRB's and Helicopter Rescue Service — and all these facets performed creditably

Thanks are extended to all members of our Board of Control for their time-consuming work, in particular the Board's Officers, and the Examination and Instruction Supervisor, Bernie Kelly.

Prior to the commencement of the season, the Branch held its annual Life Saving Seminar, in August 1982. Ten representatives from all 15 Clubs were required to attend, with the morning sessions concentrating on life saving activities, and the afternoon being given over to administration problems. The Branch appreciates the efforts of the Organising Committee and thanks to North Bondi SLSC for their help during the day.

The annual Life Saving Seminar has already been held for the 1983-84 year, taking place on July 23, 1983 at the Maroubra SLSC. This Seminar was devoted to instruction on the new Instruction and Examination Manual, due for release prior to the commencement of the 1983-84 patrol season. Once again, the Branch extends its thanks to the Organising Committee and to the Maroubra SLSC for providing the venue for the Seminar.

The Mobile Services — The IRB's, JRB's and Helicopter Rescue Service — played a dramatic part in our rescues this

season. The IRB's were under the supervision of Harry Brown and 14 Clubs have IRB's, with a total number of boats within the Branch of 23. IRB's performed 476 rescues during the season. The craft are powered by either Johnson or Mariner motors and fueled by Total Australia Ltd through a fuel grant with the National Council.

This season, we saw the 3rd Branch IRB Championships, which were held over two evenings, January 19 and 20, 1983. Our thanks to Siebers Vogels for their sponsorship and also to the North Bondi Club for providing the venue and assistance. Branch Clubs also competed in the NSW IRB Championships, which were held at Maroubra beach.

Two JRB's were in operation this season — JRB2 in the Cronulla-Sutherland District and JRB3 operating out of the Randwick District. The JRB3 Group took delivery of their new craft early in the season, and after some teething problems, have maintained consistent patrols. The JRB2 group have had a few problems over the season and are currently seeking sponsorship for fuel for the 1983-84

The JRB's work as offshore rescue boats and were under the supervision of Grant Sewell. Our thanks go to the operators of these craft and to the Sutherland and Randwick Councils.

Our radio network plays a big part in our Clubs' operations and was under the supervision of John Wardall. Our appreciation is extended to John and to the Maroubra Seals Club for the use of their premises to house "Sydney Surf Rescue". All Clubs between North Bondi and Cronulla are in contact with our Radio Room. The NSW State Centre has applied for a UHF frequency to operate a repeater radio network, which will put the Clubs in the No. 1 District, Burning Palms, Era and Garie, in contact with Sydney Surf.

Financial support of the Branch came from grants from the Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism; from Amatil (the patrol screens are supplied by Amatil and their contribution to Branch administration is to continue for a further two years); and from W.D. & H.O. Wills (Kent 25's) who supplied financial support to run and equip our Branch Gear Trailer. Thanks to you all.

The Gear Inspection Panel from the Life Saving Board of Control visited all Clubs prior to the season to inspect their rescue equipment. The Panel was again headed by Nick Dixon, and their report stated that the standard of gear throughout the Branch was the best for many years.

A competition is held in conjunction with the inspection of gear and this year resulted in a dead-heat between the Maroubra and North Cronulla Clubs; it is noted that Clovelly were highly commended. Congratulations to these Clubs.

Sydney Branch was represented in the Trans Tasman Team which competed against New Zealand at Manly on January 29, 1983, with a resulting win to Australia. Branch members in the Team were Glen Bell (Wanda), Mick Porra (Coogee) and the Coogee Boat Crew (John LeMarsney, Paul Leary, Paul Baker, Paul Beale and Philip Julian).

Bernie Kelly (South Maroubra) and Ernie Stephens (Wanda) represented the Sydney Branch in the Australian Educational Team which toured Sri Lanka.

The Branch was also involved in the Promising Country Competitors scheme and a reception was held at the Cronulla SLSC in January to introduce these members to the billetting Clubs — Cronulla, Elouera, Wanda and North Cronulla; these competitors competed in Metropolitan carnivals and gained a wealth of experience.

Our Branch Christmas function was held at the University of New South Wales and the many supporters enjoyed themselves — our thanks, once again, to John Dewey for organising this important get-together.

The Sydney Branch thanks those Clubs who have cooperated with the Branch and other levels of the Association in providing venues for meetings, functions, accommodation, etc. To our sponsors, without whose support we could not function, goes our appreciation and sincere thanks.

To our Board of Control, thanks for your dedicated service to the Branch and to the Clubs, and for your neverending drive to improve our techniques and patrols.

To the Officers of the National Council and the NSW State Centre, we thank you for supporting this Branch.

To Joan Vaughan, thank you for a job well done — the Branch truly appreciates your hours of effort.

This season has been one of drive and enthusiasm to keep Sydney Branch as the best Branch in the Association. Let's keep the effort going and we will improve even more next season.

#### REMEMBRANCE

With deep regret we record the passing of three respected Life Members of Sydney Branch and record deep condolences to the relatives and friends of:

Ken Watson, M.B.E., passed away on 5th November 1982, aged 80. He was Honorary Chief Superintendent 1945-50 and Honorary Secretary-Treasurer of National Council 1950-69.

Ken gained his Bronze Medallion in 1917 and occupied the positions of President, Secretary and Captain of Manly LSC.

Ken was also a Life Member of New South Wales State Centre and the Association and for distinguished services to Surf Life Saving was awarded the M.B.E. in 1963 New Year's Honours.

Jim McRorie, who had been the longest surviving life member of the Association, passed away on September 19, 1982 aged 90. Jim obtained his Bronze Medallion with Coogee SLSC in 1914 and soon afterwards served with the A.I.F. in World War 1, receiving the Military Medal for brave conduct.

Jim was Press (Publicity) Officer of the Association, 1922-23, and held Life Membership of Coogee SLSC, State Centre and the Association.

Recent attendances as an official guest to the 1981 Australian Championships and the 75th Anniversary dinners of both Coogee SLSC and of the Association, were fitting tributes to his long service in Surf Life Saving.

George Challis, Branch Life Member and former Boat Inspector, passed away on Spetember 24, 1982 after a long illness. George joined Cronulla SLSC in 1935 and served with distinction, to eventually occupy the Club Presidency and be elevated to Life Membership of the Club. His efforts in assisting with a rescue at Cronulla in 1948 were recognised when he was awarded the Association's Certificate of Merit.

With deep regret we record the passing of former Branch Officer Trevor Beckett, whose activities with the Board of Control are well known.

Trevor also held the position of Assistant Secretary, of Sydney Branch and was a respected Active Member of Burning Palms SLSC. He will be missed by all his friends in Surf Life Saving.

We also regret the passing of Serge Denman, a former lifeguard with Waverley Council and Champion Competitor.

The Branch notes, with regret, the passing of Ray Farrelly, MBE, former Mayor of Waverley (1969-71) who served for years as the President of the Eastern Surburbs and South Sydney Life Savers Equipment Fund.

Our condolences to his family.

## **RESCUES**

The total figure for rescues performed by members during the past season shows a decrease of 283 compared with the 1981-82 season's figure of 2,439. This was no doubt due to the bad weather conditions over the season, and, hopefully, vigilant patrols taking preventative actions before rescues need to be made.

## SURF LIFE SAVING **BOARD OF CONTROL**

The year under review, being comparatively condensed due to the early holding of the Australian Championships, has again placed a very heavy burden on the manpower of the board, both with examinations and instruction and also

with the running of carnivals.

During the season there were over 200 examinations held at which 63 members of the Board officiated, additionally, 12 Proficiency Test dates were held at which the whole of the Branch's Active members took part. It is very apparent that all the work involved in examining new members of the Branch is being borne by a dedicated few, when the whole Board membership figure of 179 is taken into account.

This year, 7 open carnivals, a craft carnival, the Interdistrict Carnival and Branch Championships were conducted for the Branch Clubs' benefit. In addition, the Board conducted the Pier 1 and Cronulla Mazda Marathon Boat Races as well as the successful Rossfield Carnival at the Bondi Icebergs. Our members also attended the Metropolitan Championships at Dee Why, 32 members went to the State Championships at Mollymook and 17 travelled to the Australian Championships at Clifton, Tasmania.

At Maroubra, after the patrol season had finished, Maroubra Club hosted the very successful State IRB Championships for 1982-83. They were held in very demanding surf conditions, particularly on the Sunday when a 4 metre

to 5 metre surf was running.

During the year there were a number of seminars organised at which the attendance of Board members was either exclusive or with the participation of Clubs. New South Wales State Centre organised a live-in weekend State Board of Examiners Conference at the Pennant Hills Scout Camp, on similar lines to the Board's successful seminar a year previous. Sydney Branch had an attendance of 14 members, at which turned out to be an excellent conference. Subjects covered all aspects of Board activities and there was ample opportunity in question and answer sessions to learn from the examples of other Branches. I thank the members who attended and brought back information relevant and helpful to the running of this Board. I recommend to other members that if future opportunities to attend conferences such as this arise, every endeavour should be made to attend.

Bernie Kelly organised 2 Examination Field days in September, 1982. One at Cronulla and the other at Clovelly. I attended the day at Cronulla along with about 20 other members and the day was a success. Topics ranged from a standardised set of questions for examinations to trying to formulate some type of entire examination format relatively standardised throughout the Branch. Input from members was positive and sometimes forthright in attitude and since this field day a number of new policies involving examinations have been implemented. The second day scheduled for Clovelly was abandoned on the day due to lack of interest! Thanks to both Cronulla and Clovelly who made their Clubhouses, facilities and equipment available and for providing their own members to organise refreshments and lunches.

State Centre organised a R & R field Weekend in November 1982 at Forster for judges - both new and experienced - competitors, coaches and spectators. Five members of the Board attended along with the North Bondi and Wanda Teams. The opportunities for both new judges and also competitors to be shown the finer points in judging has been highly beneficial and I hope that more Board members will be able to attend the weekend which will again be held at Forster on November 26 and 27, 1983. It was indeed good to see the enthusiasm with which country clubs have taken up R & R, especially 4 man competition and a little disappointing that only 2 Clubs from the whole of the metropolitan area attended.

The Branch held its Lifesaving Seminar in August 1982. The morning session concentrated on Lifesaving activities within the Branch and involved Club Captains, Vice Captains, Chief Instructors and senior Club Executive Officers. The

afternoon session this year was devoted to competition with coaches, team captains as well as interested competitors being in attendance. Guest lecturers gave talks on all aspects of training, coaching methods and competition in

In September, 1982 a Carnival Organisers Meeting was convened by Ron Day so that the whole programme of Branch carnivals could be finalised and the Carnival Poster circulated. Attendance at this meeting was poor and Ron spent many weeks chasing Clubs to ascertain their carnival events. The meeting is essential if all involved in the actual running of the carnival are to be brought together and a successful conclusion to the carnival reached. It may be that, if Clubs do not attend this meeting, events will be allocated without any Club preferences being taken into consideration.

Also, during the month of September, the Resuscitation, Research, Instruction and Medical Panel conducted ARC Updates for all Clubs in the Branch. The programme was an overall success, being marred only by a lack of examiners at Maroubra's night, however, that Club's own instructors made it a worthwhile night. A register of all those who completed Updates has been re-started and it is to be hoped that a similar programme can be arranged for the coming season and again be supported wholeheartedly by our Clubs. At the first full meeting of the Board, this same ARC Update programme saw 37 of our own members complete their updates.

The IRB and JRB Panels again held a very successful winter training and evaluation day at South Maroubra. The Sydney Branch Westpac Helicopter was in attendance and provided some very spectacular simulated rescues using both IRB's and JRB's. Lifting and towing techniques were demonstrated which proved very enlightening for the many spectators who came to watch. As well a number of different types of IRB craft were used for evaluation. Members from other Branches were in attendance and their experiences with both craft, equipment and problems encountered were very valuable to members of our own Branch Clubs.

The Sydney Branch Westpac Helicopter Rescue Service again continued to play a significant role in the Branch's emergency mobile services. The Branch at present is leasing the aircraft and a company is soon to be formed so that Branch ownership of the aircraft can be achieved. This has been made possible through the generous major sponsorship of Westpac Banking Corporation, Radio 2UE and Channel NINE. The Service now provides a 24 hour call out service, all year round and during the past season performed 404 missions, a total of 2,486 since the Service's inception in 1973. I might add, also, that a memorable 10th Anniversary re-union dinner was held at the Sheraton-Wentworth Hotel in June 1982

Both JRB3 and JRB 2 performed a worthwhile surveillance and rescue service for the No. 2, 3 and 4 Districts during the year. JRB 3 Group took delivery of their new craft and after early teething problems have maintained consistent patrols. JRB2 Group have been able to help JRB3 as both Groups now have the same type of craft. JRB2 has performed a number of spectacular rescues and is mainly responsible for the overall surveillance of the area north of Wanda. I would like to thank the crews of both Groups for their dedicated service to the Branch and I would ask for the support of all Club members in helping both maintain their valuable patrols next season.

The annual Gear Inspection of Club's rescue equipment was held in September, 1982. The very capable Panel was again led by Nick Dixon, Attendance over the 3 days the inspections took place was very good and the members of the Panel are to be congratulated on their efforts. The report of the Panel indicated that the standard of gear throughout the Branch was the best for many seasons. The result of the Gear Inspection Competition was indeed difficult for the Panel to decide, in view of the general good standard, but eventually Maroubra and North Cronulla were declared joint winners with Clovelly being highly commended. I would like to thank the Presidents and Committees of all Clubs in the Branch who have hosted Board Meetings, seminars and field days for their co-operation and for the use of their equipment and facilities. The Board is indeed fortunate to be able to call on Clubs, often with little notice and be so warmly welcomed. I would especially like to mention the Maroubra Club who, because of their location, seem to have the Board as guests more often than most other Clubs.

The forthcoming season will see no lessening of the work-load of Board Members. The introduction of new Instructional and Competition Manuals will mean all members will have to update to the new techniques if the Board is to maintain its role as the Lifesaving Administrators of the Branch. This alone is a daunting task, let alone the other activities which are also undertaken throughout the year.

To my fellow Board members, who have worked so hard this year to maintain the prestige and working efficiency of the Board and who have borne most of the hard labour involved thank you very much. Your Board Executive have strived throughout the year to keep the Board running smoothly and have succeeded remarkably well. I would like to thank the Executive for their support and would mention the retiring Officers, Harry Brown, Ron Day and Charlie Matthews especially for the contribution they have made during the past season.

I would also like to thank the Branch Executive Officers for their help and look forward to the closer relations developed during the past season continuing, even stronger, under the proposed new re-structure of the Branch. To Joan Vaughan, Sydney Branch Office Manager, thank you for your time and efforts on behalf of the Sydney Branch Surf Life Saving Board of Control.

After 4 years as Board Secretary, I will not be seeking re-election next season. These years have been extremely rewarding. I offer my successor my support and know that with the help of the whole Board his tasks will be made much easier to maintain.

# EXAMINATION and INSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

Last season 63 Examination members conducted over 200 examinations for basic awards of Bronze Medallion, Qualifying Certificates. Proficiency tested over 1,200 Club members and spent countless hours instructing squads, conducting ARC Updates and examinations. It was an imposing task and we should all feel some satisfaction. It is also interesting to note that a lot of these members are still doing patrols and hold management positions within their own Clubs.

Nine out of 14 of the Chief Instructors in our Clubs are now Board members. The 15th Club, Clovelly, at present has no Chief Instructor, however, I trust this situation will be corrected at their forthcoming Annual Meeting.

Last season the Board conducted two Examination Field Days, two New Members Nights' and an ARC Update for Board Members. Unfortunately not all of these activities were well attended.

This winter will see the introduction of a new Manual and many of our Board members are involved with its release, not only in the Branch, but throughout the whole State as well. The new Manual will be introduced at our Branch Seminar, "Lifesaving '84" at Maroubra. All Board members will have to attend this day if they are to carry out examinations next year.

Last season, some Clubs were a pleasure to have examinations carried out on their beaches. They made Examiners very welcome, but, other Clubs continually need reminding of their requirements for examinations.

Last season saw the introduction of the Branch Information Directory which detailed patrol requirements, examination procedures and emergency services in the Branch. Eight hundred copies were distributed and this year's edition looks like being even bigger and better.

I would like to thank Steve Strange and Trevor Elliott for their continued support and advice. Also the District Supervisors and their Deputies for their work with preliminary examinations. To Frank Osborne and Bruce Breadner for their efforts with Advanced Resuscitation, my thanks.

I would also like to personally thank Greg Hewett, Carl Melvey, Peter Carney, Niel Miller and Bill Gray for their enormous effort in the amount of exams they conducted as Examiners in Charge. Henry from State Centre and Peter Steenson, Branch Registrar, for their work on award figures and records are much appreciated. To Joan Vaughan, my thanks for her great help in the administrative and secretarial side and to my mother whom most people have spoken to for her help with messages and phone calls and for not kicking me out of home.

#### WESTPAC HELICOPTER RESCUE SERVICE

This season, the Helicopter Rescue Service celebrated its 10th Anniversary with a dinner at the Wentworth Hotel with the Premier of NSW, the Honorary Neville Wran, being the guest speaker. At the dinner, the Premier presented the oldest serving members with a special presentation in appre-

ciation of their contribution to the Community.

The beginning of the 1982 season saw the introduction of our new French 350B Aerospatiale Squirrel helicopter, which is being leased from the Westpac Leasing Corporation and is the first aircraft that the Sydney Branch has owned. The aircraft is, without a doubt, the most modern and sophisticated rescue machine flying in the Sydney area today. From the inception of the Service 10 years ago, the Service has continually updated its aircraft and this is now the fourth aircraft to go into service for the Helicopter Rescue Service.

I would be failing in my duty if I did not express my sincere thanks to our three sponsors, because without their generous assistance, the Service would not be what it is today. The old "Wales", which is now the Westpac Banking Corporation has been involved with the Service since its inception and if it had not been for their foresight and generosity, the Service you see today would not exist.

To the many other groups, particularly the Royal North Shore Hospital, the NSW Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism, the Rotary Club of St. Leonards and the Lions Club of Brookvale, we are forever grateful for their assistance.

The Helicopter Rescue Service completed the 1983 season with a total of 40 rescues, 173 medical supports and 191 search and support missions, making a total of 404 missions for the year and the grand total of 2,486 since the inception

of the Service 10 years ago.

In passing, I would like to record our thanks to the Ambulance Service, Police Department, Bush Fire Brigade and Volunteer Rescue Association, for their assistance and back-up in many of the rescue situations we attend. It is only with this co-operation can the benefit of our Service be utilised fully to the people of Sydney.

Because of the capabilities of our new aircraft, the training requirements and qualifications for rescue crew and doctors are being continually updated and it is pleasing to note that our standard of operation is continuing to improve. The Service purchased a new water fire bucket recently and it is hoped that this will be used when required in bushfire situations.

The Service has evolved greatly from the days where it was only involved in surf rescue work, but we are always mindful that without the continued support and assistance of the volunteer radio operators and the life savers on the beach, this Service would not be possible.

In closing, I would like to thank the Officers of the Sydney Branch of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia for their continued assistance during this last year.

### IRB SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The 1982-83 season has now closed and we can look back upon the activities of our Inflatable Rescue Boat section with pleasure in some quarters and with some concern in other quarters.

Fourteen of the Branch's fifteen clubs now operate IRB's. The last club to join being Clovelly. Most clubs participated in training programmes during the year and

their individual efforts are reflected in the IRB Activities Schedule at the end of this report.

The majority of the recommendations originally made by our Branch in 1981, which were endorsed at the National Superintendents' Conference in 1982 and will be implemented in our new training manuals.

IRB inspections were carried out by our honorary inspectors during the Annual Gear Inspection in September and it is pleasing to record that apart from some minor maintenance work being required, all IRB's were operational and ready for the start of the season.

IRB Examiners carried out examinations through last winter and the summer. The standard of driving and crewmanship was found to be very high and the IRB Instructors of Clubs are to be congratulated for their efforts.

The IRB's have been confirmed as the "rescue tool of the 80's". The Sydney Branch clubs' crews performed a total of 467 rescues (1981-82 – 600) which represents 23.6% (25%) of all rescues performed in the Branch. On many occasions the IRB's worked in co-ordination with the No. 2 and No. 3 District JRB's in carrying out difficult rescues and surveillance operations. Indeed, many IRB Drivers and Crewmen have joined District JRB's. Certainly, IRB rescue work is a good grounding for the larger rescue craft.

The laying of buoys at all Sydney Branch carnivals was accomplished utilising the National Council "Sanyo" IRB in conjunction with the local club IRB. This arrangement allowed the local crews to see how it is done and has proved very successful over the past five years. Our thanks are recorded to National Council, Outboard Marine Australia, Total Australia and Zodiac Australia for their continued interest and support.

The Branch IRB Championships were conducted as a twilight carnival on Wednesday 19th and Thursday 20th February, 1983. All events were successfully conducted and congratulations are extended to all winners, placegetters and participants.

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ining ors hat The most important fact that emerges from competition is the improvement of the crew's ability to negotiate the surf under rescue conditions. We are also grateful to Siebers Vogel Breads for their continued financial support and to the North Bondi Club for the venue.

The New South Wales IRB Championships were held at Maroubra on Saturday 30th April and Sunday, 1st May, 1983. On the Saturday the surf was 3 metres to 4 metres and on the Sunday 4 metres to 5 metres. The conditions placed a great strain on all officials and the rescue crews, but full marks to all who participated, it certainly showed what "Rubber Duckies" are all about and the skill of the drivers and crew were breathtaking to say the least. Congratulations to all Sydney Branch Officials and Competitors who participated.

On an unhappier note, there appears to be some clubs who expect too much from their IRB Captain, without any encouragement or financial help from their Committee, and on the other hand, some Clubs who elect their IRB Captain without too much thought as to whether he has the qualities to successfully conduct this most important rescue section of their Club.

Some attributes of a good IRB Captain are:—

(a) he must have leadership qualities;

(b) he must have the time to ensure (with the help of others) the craft is operational throughout the season;

he must have the membership resources to train drivers and crew to gain their awards;

(d) he must have the full support of his club committee;

(e) he must have the full support of his club captain and other qualified drivers who can assist in the training of crews.

It is imperative that every club ensures that their IRB's are properly maintained and that a realistic number of crew personnel are being trained to ensure that their IRB is effectively integrated with their surf patrols and rosters.

In conclusion I wish to extend my personal tanks and appreciation to all members who participated in our IRB activities during the past season. In particular, Graham Bruce, Gary Harte, Arthur White, John Dewey and Bill Singleton for their help and assistance at Carnivals.

Finally, to my IRB Inspectors and Examiners and the club IRB Captains and Instructors, thanks for a job well

done.

I shall not be seeking re-nomination at the forthcoming Annual Meeting of the IRB Panel and trust that my successor is given the same support that the Branch has given me over the past years in carrying out the role of Branch IRB Supervisor

During the season Clubs needing radio service were again attended to by Nathan Cohen, with his customary efficiency. On behalf of all "Sydney Surf" operators, I would like

to thank John McCormack and the Board of Directors of the Maroubra Seals Club and their staff, for their continued support and particularly for the lunch subsidy on our rostered days, which is conservatively estimated at \$260 for this season.

The completed season was marked by our Member's wholehearted participation in controlling the practical aspects of Lifesaving within Sydney Branch and contributing at wider levels within the Surf Life Saving Association.

The District Supervisors, Frank Osborne, Bruce Breadner, Barry King, Charlie Matthews and their Deputies have seen that patrols were maintained at a satisfactory level in their areas and have been of assistance in guiding Clubs to the standards required. On this point, it must be noted that the majority of Clubs recognise the "Lifesaving" in their title and have performed well during the season. On the other occasions these men have seen to the Branch's interests.

The Branch Patrol Competition, held at South Maroubra and Cronulla, was an excellent demonstration of the depth and efficiency at patrol level. Every Club participating gained from the experience and deserve congratulations for contributing creditable performances. This Competition will achieve even more prestige when patrols are supported by senior officials of Clubs on the day.

The compilation and distribution of an Information Directory to every lifesaver in the Branch was a landmark for this season. This up-to-date information, covering all Branch activities and requirements, allows the new member, new committeeman and more senior people to see and understand the concept of Lifesaving and administration

in Sydney Branch. Lifesaving in the 80's requires the back-up of the motorised services, Inshore Rescue Boats, Jet Rescue Boats, the Rescue Helicopter and the use of Radio. These groups have allowed us to extend our operation and back-up to new areas and situations. With this responsibility has come the added need for more stringent supervision and training and we, and the Association, have been most fortunate to have Harry Brown at the helm of the IRB Group since the inception of the Board under its new structure. Harry is vacating the position of IRB Supervisor this year and deserves congratulations and our thanks for this efforts on behalf of this section. The high standard and enthusiasm of IRB operators in the Branch, whether on patrol or at demonstrations, is a tribute to Harry Brown.

With Grant Sewell as JRB Supervisor, these craft continue to play a valuable role in an integrated Lifesaving system. While being the "unsung" service of the Association, these craft prove vital and gain prestige with the formulation of the envisiaged emergency service response policy.

Peter MacCormick, as Director of the Helicopter Rescue Service has kept this group to the fore and they have continued to increase their potential with the acquisition of a

larger and more versatile aircraft. The Sydney Branch Westpac Helicopter is the "flagship" within the Association and all those connected with its operation are a credit to their

The Radio Room personnel have provided reliable communications through the Sydney Surf Radio Room at Maroubra Seals Club and John Wardall has kept this Service manned during patrol hours and beyond with his small team of dedicated operators.

The examination load has again been high with over 200 examinations conducted, resulting in a pleasing increase in the number of awards gained. To every Examiner, a job well done for your efforts on behalf of the Sydney Branch Clubs and for the support you have given Bernie Kelly, the Examination and Instruction Supervisor, Bernie has led this group to maintain a standard within the Branch and encouraged many new Examiners to become involved at every opportunity. Bernie and "Solly" Stephens both represented Sydney Branch as part of the National Instructional Team to Sri Lanka this year.

On the competition side we had a successful year with Ron Day in the lead. He has moulded a team of officials that know their business and can conduct a carnival by the rules and to the satisfaction of competitors. As well as our lady examiners becoming more involved in carnival duties, we provided over 40 officials to assist at the State and more than 20 at the Australian Championships as well as assisting at the State IRB Championships. The State Superintendent, John Dewey, found time along with his other duties to hold the position of Branch Gear Steward. He, and his helpers Arthur White and Bill Singleton kept our gear at a very high standard and without them and Harry Brown, Graham Bruce and Gary Harte in the IRB's it would be impossible to run a successful carnival. The popular Gear Inspection Committee saw to it that all Club's gear was ready for the rigors of the season. Nick Dixon developed a businesslike format for this group that achieves a high-level pride in the preparedness of equipment.

All the above figures show that the JRB's fill a necessary role in the Surf Life Saving movement.

### TREASURER'S REPORT


It gives me pleasure to report that a very successful year was had, despite the economic conditions that prevailed.

To our sponsors, who are detailed elsewhere in this Report, we are indebted to you, for without your help and generous donations, a heavier financial burden would have had to be placed on our Clubs.


During the year, a complete inventory of our carnival gear and plant was set up. This shows up in the Balance Sheet and indicates Fixed Assets rising from \$3,742 to \$26,117, a far more realistic figure than has been shown in previous years.

Turning to the Income and Expenditure for the year, Income increased by \$9,120 or 20.14%. This was due mainly from increased interest received and capitation fees. In the former's case, the investments were transferred to a higher-interest bearing account, while with the latter, the fees from previous seasons were revised during the current season

The following chart shows the income:



Expenditure decreased from \$40,010 to \$33,826, or 15.4%. This was after allowing \$1,837 for depreciation and \$1,201 for bad debts written off. The main contributing factors for the decrease were Secretarial Services and Board of Control expenses.



So, whilst it has been a good year, I cannot stress strongly enough the need to keep watching expenditure.

To my fellow Executive members — President Rex, Secretary Peter, and Finance Committee Members Bill Marshall, Joe Seddon, Rex Sargeant and Trevor Elliott, my thanks for your help and guidance during my first year as Treasurer. To John Connolly, who helped with the Helicopter Rescue Service bedgets, thanks very much. For Joan, a special thanks for all her work, especially interpreting my handwriting on some occasions.

Finally, without the help and support of my family — Sandra and Kerrie — I could not have served as the Treasurer. To the two of you, many thanks.

Radio Room, and Era now has a bunkhouse available to members. Burning Palms is in the process of completing their new Clubhouse which should be at lockup stage by the opening of the season.

In the field of life saving, all four District Clubs -Cronulla, North Cronulla, Elouera and Wanda, worked diligently to enlist new members and gain a high number of SLSA Awards.

We note with pleasure that the fair sex is penetrating the instructing and examining fields and there are a greater number joining the senior club from the junior club ranks. These two factors are very important in our progress.

With the growing sophistication of rescue techniques and the current attitude in the movement against opening new surf clubs in the metropolitan area, the large crowds surfing north of Wanda's patrol area are being cared for by surveillance teams using radio and backed by Council Lifeguards with their mobile equipment and the back-up club IRB crews and IRB3.

IRB rescues continue to climb, the Cronulla crew performed a great rescue at Wanda and have been recommended by their club for consideration for a Metitorious Award.

The Jet Rescue craft has performed well with 31 rescues, two of which were in conjunction with the Branch's helicopter. 5 boats were towed to safety and there were 71 preventitive actions taken.

This year saw our clubs' competitors being successful in all carnivals both National and International. To those competitors and clubs who were successful, congratulations. You can be assured that we are all aware of the hard work and dedication that has gone into

achieving success.

Our relationship with Randwick Council has this year been most amiable and has shown us what tremendous cooperation can be achieved between Councils and Surf Clubs. We are proud of the liaison with Aldermen and Council's Officers and indeed the Mayor of Randwick, Alderman John Ford, hosted a Civic Reception for the top patrols from each club and at that reception presented a perpetual trophy, the "John Ford Trophy" together with the Mayor's Cup. The recipients of these awards were Coogee in both cases.

The Molloy Shield, the competition between the four clubs in the District, was conducted with Clovelly being the host club and South Maroubra being the outright winner. This I believe has been quite an achievement for South Maroubra as they have wanted to win this trophy but have

always been beaten by either Coogee or Maroubra.

This year we also launched a new Jet Rescue Boat at a cost of almost \$20,000. Without the tremendous assistance given to us by Randwick Council, Maroubra Seals Club and the Australian Government gear grant, it would not be possible to have purchased this valuable piece of equipment.

I feel that our District will continue to grow efficiently over the years, especially now that we have the head-quarters of the Branch at Maroubra Seals Club and the enthusiasiasm that vibrates through our clubs will see us as one of the top Districts in Surf Life Saving.
