

Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the President, Officers and members of the Sydney Branch of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, I am pleased to present to you the Branch's 35th Annual Report and Financial Statement, for the 1983-84 season.

It is very pleasing to report that no lives were lost whilst patrols were on duty, within the flagged area.

There were 1,705 rescues, performed by our 15 Clubs, the Helicopter Rescue Service and the Jet Rescue Boat Groups. A large number of rescues were performed with Inflatable Rescue Boats -495 - and the Helicopter Rescue Service carried out 240 missions.

Sydney Branch has had a most active year, commencing the season in September with a Branch Sponsors' Night held at the Botany Bay Restaurant. A large number of our sponsors attended the evening, which was highly successful. A number of Officers spoke on the Branch's future, which gave our sponsors a better insight into our operation. At the commencement of the season, we considered a number of objectives. These were — increase of sponsorship; Sponsors' Night; Integration of Mobile Services; Branch Executive Conference; Sydney Branch SLSA Helicopter Rescue Service Company formation; Branch Premises; Branch Administrator.

I am pleased to report that we have completed a number of these tasks – the Sponsors' Night; Integration of Mobile Services for 24-hour call-out; and our major task of forming the H.R.S. Company. The Company comprises the Trustees, President, Secretary, Treasurer, Helicopter Director and Mobile Services Officer. Committees have been formed and are currently acting on securing our own Branch premises and Branch Administrator.

Our Branch Office is still located within the Maroubra Seals Club and has been operated by our Branch Office Secretary, Joan Vaughan. The Branch appreciates the support from the Directors of the Maroubra Seals Club and their Secretary/ Manager, John McCormack.

Once again, our life saving activities were under the guidance of our Branch Superintendent, Trevor Elliott, and Deputy Superintendent, Ron Howells. Their responsibilities included the Mobile Services, which comprise the supervision of patrols, the radio network, IRB's, JRB's and the Sydney Branch SLSA Westpac Helicopter Rescue Service. Other major factors are examinations for awards and the conducting of carnivals. The Board of Control conducted six open carnivals, a craft carnival, the Interdistrict Championships, the Branch Championships, the Metropolitan Championships, and also officiated at the Cronulla Mazda Surf Boat Marathon, the Cole Classic at North Bondi, the Rossfield Trophy at Bondi Baths, the Pier One Boat Race in Sydney Harbour, and the NSW and Australian Championships.

The Board of Control was responsible for examinations

which resulted in a total of 1,246 awards. A large number of Proficiency Tests were also carried out. Whilst awards were marginally down on the previous season, the Bronze Medallions increased by 69, from 382 to 451. Thanks are extended to all members of our Board of

Control for their time-consuming efforts.

Our Mobile Services once again played a dramatic part in our rescue operations — the services were brought together by Ian Badham in his capacity of Emergency Services Coordinator. The operation of our 7-days a week, 24-hours a day, call-out system, involves IRB's, JRB's, the Helicopter Rescue Service and the Radio Room at Maroubra. Our Rescue Helicopter is manned by two full-time pilots, rescue crewman and doctor, with voluntary crewmen and doctors on the weekends.

The main missions flown by the Helicopter were 70 rescues, 207 medicals and 188 search and support -a total of 465. The Sydney Branch extends its congratulations to the Director, Peter MacCormick, Pilots Dan Tyler and David Jones, Rescue Crewman Bob Ford, Doctors Ian Millar and Richard King, and the volunteer duty crews and doctors that have performed these missions over the year. We also appreciate the sponsorship from Westpac, TCN Channel 9, Radio 2UE and the NRMA. Without these companies' financial support, the Service could not exist and we also thank the Royal North Shore Hospital for providing facilities for our helicopter and its crew. Our IRB's played a big part and performed 495 rescues. Thirteen Clubs in the Sydney Branch have IRB's and over the years, these craft have become very versatile rescue equipment. During the season, an IRB Field Day was held at Cronulla at which evaluations were carried out on the new Rigid Hull IRB. The Branch thanks our IRB Supervisor, Graham Bruce, for his efforts over the season. We conducted our 4th Sydney Branch IRB Championships this year, which were held over two evenings at Elouera Beach - February 15 and 16. The Championships were very successful and our thanks are extended to Bud Mestern and his company, Buttercup-Vogels, for their sponsorship. The NSW IRB Championships were held at Dixon Park, Newcastle Branch, with six Clubs from Sydney Branch taking part.

Our JRB fleet was in full operation; the Branch has two JRB's JRB2 in the Cronulla-Sutherland area and JRB3 in the Randwick and Waverley areas. The JRB's provide the off-shore rescue work in the Branch, and are under the control of our JRB Supervisor, Ken Blakie. Our thanks are extended to Ken for his efforts over the season, and our very sincere thanks to the Randwick Municipal Council for their continued support of JRB3.

Our radio network played an important part in our Club and Mobile Services operations, and was under the supervision of John Wardall. Our appreciation goes to the Maroubra Seals Club for the use of their premises to operate "Sydney Surf Rescue".

The radio system is operative on AM and UHF, between North Bondi and Cronulla Clubs, including IRB's, JRB's and the Helicopter Rescue Service. Our Clubs in the Royal National Park have radio contact with each other and, in emergencies, contact "Illawarra Surf" or the Wollongong Volunteer Coastal Patrol at Angler Base. The Branch's appreciation is extended to Divisional Commander Greg Atkinson and his team at their headquarters at Belmore Basin. We are also grateful to the Illawarra Branch of the SLSA for their assistance with radio contact.

With the introduction of the Association's new "Surf Life Saving Training Manual", a mini seminar was held by the Board of Control to educate Board members on the new manual, at North Cronulla on November 5, 1983. A State Instructional squad demonstrated the teachings of the new manual in the various Branches in New South Wales and the following members from Sydney Branch were involved in that Squad – John Dewey, Peter Calder, Bernie Kelly, Graham Bruce, Ron Hammond, Ernie Stephens, Marion Lucas, Debbie Ryan, Peter Davis, Charlie Matthews and Grahame Smith. Our thanks to them for their efforts. A March Past Field Day was held at North Cronulla on December 11, 1983; this was to assist March Past Teams and Judges with the event. The day was successful, with all gaining additional knowledge of this prestige event. Financial support to the Sydney Branch came from a grant from the Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism, via the NSW State Centre, for Branch administration, for which we thank the NSW Government. Clubs within the Branch gained financial help from the NSW Government and their Capital Works Grants. These

were — ... Burning Palms SLSC, for completion of Clubhouse

- building, \$12,000
- ... Cronulla SLSC, for modifications to Clubhouse to provide facilities for female members, \$5,000 Garie SLSC, for completion of Radio Room and Ro
- ... Garie SLSC, for completion of Radio Room and Roof area of Clubhouse, \$4,600.

Once again, our thanks to the NSW Government. Clubs were also supported by the Federal Government with the purchase of gear and equipment through the Dollar for Dollar Gear Grant. Sydney Branch and its Clubs received a total of \$6,761.10 and our very sincere thanks go to the Federal Government.

Promotional activities continued with all Clubs being supplied patrol screens by Amatil and their assistance toward administration costs of the Branch is appreciated. W.D. & H.O. Wills supplied each Club with a "Kent" canopy to go over each patrol enclosure, keeping our patrol members away from inclement weather.

Wills once again sponsored our Gear and Equipment Trailer and the Life Savers Cup. Our thanks to W.D. & H.O. Wills, John Crabb and the "Kent" Brand for their continued support of the Sydney Branch and Surf Life Saving. Jim Parker, our Publicity Officer, has maintained strong liaison with W.D. & H.O. Wills and our thanks to Jim. The Sydney Branch received \$2,000 from the Estate of the Late Bessie Brundahl. At her request, this donation was used for the purchase of rescue equipment, and two Oxy-Vivas were purchased and suitably engraved.

Keeping in line with the other Districts, at the commencement of the season, the No. 1 District changed its name to "The Royal National Park Surf Life Saving Clubs". These Clubs received sponsorship from the NSW Egg Corporation of \$10,000 to assist with mobile services in the district, and for this, the thanks of the Clubs and the Branch are extended to the Egg Corporation.

On December 8, 1983, for the 5th successive year, the Branch, in conjunction with the Board of Control and Club representatives, conducted its Christmas Function at the University of New South Wales' "Square House". The Branch thanks those who attended and John Dewey for his part in organising the Function.

The Gear Inspection Panel from the Board of Control visited Clubs to inspect rescue equipment prior to the commencement of the patrol season. This year, the Don Lucas Trophy for the best equipment went to three Clubs – Cronulla, Maroubra and Burning Palms. We extend our congratulations. The Don Lucas Trophy is now an annual trophy for the gear inspection, and is donated by the Aquatic Club. Our thanks to them.

During mid-January, Sydney Branch Clubs continued to support the Carbine Club-Young Country Competitors Assistance Scheme, introduced by the NSW State Centre and now in its third year. This scheme provides the opportunity for these youngsters to attend City carnivals and join the training sessions and Club activities along with their host competitors. Thanks are extended to the host families from the Cronulla and Elouera Clubs who assisted with the accommodation of these young life savers. Sydney Branch members selected in teams touring overseas were - Ernie Stephens (Wanda SLSC), who toured Trinidad and Tobago in March, 1984; and Robert Chapman (Elouera SLSC), Ron McKeon (South Maroubra SLSC) and Len Harris, Coach (Bondi SBLSC), who are touring England and Wales in August with the NSW Team. In an endeavour to achieve general uniformity of administration protocol and procedures for the four District Executive Committees, the Branch Council requested that the Constitution Committee formulate appropriate guidelines for submission to each District. These guidelines were

subsequently accepted in principle by the Branch and, with some minor amendments, by each District Executive Committee.

The Branch is most appreciative of the co-operation which was extended by the Districts, particularly the information provided by the Waverley and Randwick Executive Committees. All parties in the matter acknowledge that the rules which have now been adopted will form a common basis on which to develop a system of domestic by-laws. These changes have been brought about by the Branch restructure, where more emphasis is put on the District level. During the year, the Branch was involved in two displays. The first was in conjunction with Apex, the Royal Life Saving Society NSW Branch, and Woolworths, demonstrating to and training the public in resuscitation at Hyde Park for two hours per day over two weeks and at the Sydney Entertainment Centre. Our thanks are extended to Bernie Kelly, Peter Davis and Frank Osborne for arranging our involvement.

The second was our participation in the Royal Easter Show, where the Helicopter Rescue Service erected a large display to promote the Service and its sponsors. Featured in the display was a mock-up helicopter and Show Bags which highlighted the newly created Chopper Club. The Branch wishes to thank the sponsors, Radio 2UE and TCN Channel 9, the organisers — Peter MacCormick, Peter Gard and John Connolly and the people who gave up their valuable time over Easter to assist on the stand.

The Sydney Branch thanks those Clubs who have cooperated with the Branch and the other levels of our Association, in providing venues for meetings, functions, accommodation, etc.

To the Board of Control and its members for their neverending help and support, also goes our appreciation. To the Officers concerned with the National Council and the New South Wales State Centre, our thanks for your continuous assistance and support.

To Joan Vaughan — thank you for your assistance over the year — it's greatly appreciated by all.

REMEMBRANCE

With deep regret, we record the passing of three respected members of the Sydney Branch and record deep condolences to the families and friends of:

Don Lucas, O.B.E., passed away on October 1, 1983; Life Member of Cronulla SLSC, Sydney Branch, NSW State Centre and the Association.

Don was Honorary Chief Superintendent from 1950 to 1953 and served as an Office-bearer with Sydney Branch for many years, being the inaugural Branch Superintendent (for three years) and Deputy President, 1958-1968.

Don was Manager of the Australian Representative Team to Hawaii in 1953 and was awarded the O.B.E. in 1971. He officiated regularly at surf carnivals up until the time of his death and showed particular interest in the resuscitation sphere.

Don served as a Councillor on the Sutherland Shire Council and was re-elected just prior to his passing; he was currently the Patron of the Cronulla SLSC.

There was a very large attendance at Don's funeral at Woronora on October 6, 1983, and his ashes were scattered off Cronulla Beach on November 19, 1983.

Bob McKenna passed away on August 27, 1983. Bob joined Dee Why SLSC in 1928 and the Board of Examiners in 1934. He regularly officiated at corrivals up to the

1934. He regularly officiated at carnivals up to the season prior to his death. He served on various Branch Committees. Bob held Life Membership of both the Sydney Branch and NSW State Centre and was also a keen competitor in RSL swimming circles. Ernie Wallbank, passed away October 27, 1983. Ernie gained his Bronze Medallion with the ERA SLSC and occupied the office of Secretary of the Club in 1945-46 and 1947-48.

SURF LIFE SAVING BOARD OF CONTROL

The year under review has been one of growth, achievement and quiet consolidation; building on the successes of previous years; meeting the challenges presented during the year confidently, handling them effectively and getting on with the task at hand.

The major challenge this season has been the introduction of a new Training Manual, which, due to technical problems, was not available before the season commenced. Credit is due to all concerned in the manner in which the problems caused were handled and the effective procedures adopted to retain Examiners and Instructors in the revised procedures.

The very slow start to the season caused considerable concern but whilst Surf Life Saving Certificates are down on last year's Qualifying Certificate figures, we have surpassed last year's excellent Bronze Medallion figures.

One unforeseen result of the new Manual has been that to conduct an adequate examination, approximately one hour has been added to the whole exam; this has, in itself, led to a reduced availability of Examiners, due to the need to roster more Examiners – particularly to mass exams.

Over the season, over 200 examinations were held for basic awards. Additionally many Proficiency Examinations were held, at which the whole of the Board's active membership officiated.

This season, six Open Carnivals, a craft carnival, the Interdistrict Carnival, Branch Championships, Metropolitan Championships and Branch IRB Championships were conducted by the Board on behalf of the Clubs. Additionally, the Pier One and Cronulla Mazda Marathon Boat Races and the Rossfield Carnival at the Bondi Icebergs Club were successfully conducted.

Members of the Board officiated at the NSW Championships, NSW IRB Championships and Australian Championships at Wollongong, Dixon Park and Kurrawa (Qld) respectively.

The Branch "Life Saving 84" Seminar at Maroubra on July 23, 1983, was judged by all to have been a success; an introduction to the new Manual was made for all present and the State Instructional Squad (comprising 11 members of the Sydney Board of a total 15), attempted in very cold, unpleasant conditions, to show us what it was all about.

Bernie Kelly organised two "Hands On" Field days for Examiners to come to grips with the new Manual, during the season. I attended the first at North Cronulla which was well attended and highly successful, getting members out on the beach to "do the exam", so that they were in a position to demonstrate correct methods when the need arose.

On December 7, 1983, the Board held a Club Captains Night at the Maroubra Seals Club. This event was well worthwhile, only two Clubs being notable in their absence. The format will be changed slightly for the coming season, but, in essence, it will remain a night for Club Captains to share information and experience, and to discuss common problems with the Board Executive.

The State Centre again organised the R&R Field Day at Forster SLSC, which was extremely well attended by teams and Board members, all of whom gained valuable knowledge and experience, which has been evident in the increasing standards both of the teams and the officials in competition.

Another Field Day organised by the State Centre was for March Past at Redhead SLSC, attended by members of our Board and, again, highly successful, particularly with its consideration of the difficulties of judging a March Past effectively with a limited number of judges.

Ken English, the Carnival and Competition Supervisor, held the Annual Carnival Organisers meeting on September 21, 1983, and suddenly found how unprepared some Clubs are when it comes to a carnival. Clubs seem to think that the carnival poster just appears — they don't realise that they must come to this meeting with their entire list of events cut and dried.

Considering that this coming season is very short (competitively) and starts early, this may be the year that unprepared Clubs get events allocated on the night; there will be no time to chase them and get the poster out before entries close for the first carnivals of the season.

The Register of current ARC holders has now been established and is working effectively. At the end of the coming season, we will be able to quote actual figures for the total number of current ARC's held within the Branch – that is, after two years, all certificates except those on the register will have lapsed.

The Resuscitation, Research and Instruction Panel has continued its work, particularly with outside groups and other Branches, in the instruction and examination of ARC candidates.

The Panel, under Frank Osborne's leadership, has become heavily involved with the Red Cross in the formulation of a Red Cross First Aid Certificate for SLSA members. Given the necessary approvals by both the SLSA and Red Cross, the first "live in" course is scheduled to be held this coming season. The new certificate will have the ARC as a prerequisite.

The IRB and JRB Panels again held their joint winter exercise and AGM at South Maroubra, which was well attended and very successful.

Graham Bruce's first year as IRB Supervisor has been fairly eventful; his concern early this seaosn was maintenance standards. Some craft were not inspected prior to the season and a rash of maintenance-related mechanical problems early in the season, caused the Panel to rethink its procedures, resulting in the appointment of a number of craft inspectors.

The Sydney Branch SLSA Westpac Helicopter Rescue Service continued to dominate the public image of the Branch's emergency mobile services. The Service has been formed as a company, owned by the Branch.

The Service's role, both in surf rescue and general emergency service within the Sydney region and surrounding areas, continues to increase as its worth and the calibre of its crews becomes more appreciated by other emergency service groups.

Significantly, the Service is increasingly being called as emergency transport in the outlying metropolitan region, to ferry critically ill and injured patients to major hospitals, allowing the patients to reach medical help faster and enhancing the efficiency of the mobile services on the ground. Our thanks to Peter MacCormick (Helicopter Service Director), Dan Tyler (Chief Pilot), David Jones (Line Pilot), Bob Ford (Crew Chief)and Doctors Ian Millar and Richard King (Medical Crewmen) for their efforts to ensure the indispensability of the Service to Sydney.

Both JRB2 and JRB3 had successful seasons; JRB2, in particular, took part in a number of rescues in the Gunnamatta Bay and North Cronulla areas which involved use of divers and, to their credit, a number of crew members have begun training to gain a rescue diver's certificate.

Both boats have had the usual minor problems mechanically during the season, but none of these has put a boat out of the water for extended periods. The JRB service has, during the season, built on success, gaining new members and increasing the effectiveness of their operations. Considerable preparation and training, plus accumulation of equipment, has taken place during the year to equip the craft so that they may be used at night when necessary. Joint exercises have been held with the Water Police, to familiarise crews with night landmarks, and this training continues. In the eventuality that a boat must go to sea at night, strict operating procedures have been laid down in the interests of safety.

Nick Dixon again led a very able Gear Inspection Panel, but the overall result was patchy. It was necessary for the Branch to demand explanation from some Clubs regarding the state of their gear; yet, overall, those Clubs who had prepared their gear, maintained the standards we have come to expect and the result was a 3-way dead-heat between Burning Palms, Cronulla and Maroubra.

The Panel is concerned about the amount of Club gear which only appears for inspection occasionally and the Board had adopted a method of registration of all Club life saving gear which will operate from the next Gear Inspection. The Board conducted the 3rd Branch Patrol Championship at South Maroubra on April 15, 1984. Bruce Breadner, aided by the District Supervisors and their Assistants, put the competing patrols through their paces throughout the day.

It is heartening to see that the overall standard has increased yet again and that competing Clubs stayed on to watch other Clubs compete — indicating that the event is being taken seriously by all concerned and that Clubs are critically assessing their performance in comparison with other Clubs.

The Branch First Aid Championships were conducted over two rounds at Cronulla to select entries to the State Championships; Both Senior and Junior teams were nominated to the State Championships and obtained placings in the competition.

The Board's sincere thanks to the Red Cross V.A.D. for organising these competitions, including patients and makeup, and their assistance in creating situations liable to be faced by the patrol on the beach.

The current book membership of the Board is 199, an increase of 20 on last season, including 29 Probationary members. The majority of these members will be eligible to sit for their Examiner's Certificate early next season and will make a welcome addition to the Board's strength.

In conclusion, the Board thanks the Branch Officers for their continued support and encouragement, both financially and administratively during the past season.

EXAMINATION and INSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

The 1983-84 season has now closed and on review, it seems that it has been one of our busiest and perhaps most exciting seasons. I think all Examiners secretly look forward to a new Manual. This year, we had a Manual presented to us with a challenge — to re-evaluate our standards and to face an increasing content of emergency services in our Bronze syllabus. I am pleased to report that we are meeting that challenge.

The new Manual was introduced in New South Wales by a State Instructional Team. The Team came from the Sydney and Manly-Warringah Branches and numbered 15 Examiners. Our Board supplied eleven of these – John Dewey, Peter Calder, Bernard Kelly, Graham Bruce, Ron Hammond, Ernie Stephens, Marion Lucas, Debbie Ryan, Peter Davis, Charlie Matthews and Grahame Smith.

My thanks, and indeed the Board's thanks, to these members for the way they introduced the new Manual to our State. Their efforts did not stop after the formal introduction, they attended the majority of exams, working hard to improve and maintain the standards of the new Manual.

The season was also a surprising one in relation to Award figures; during the season, I was concerned with the lack of Awards. However, a last minute deluge of examinations resulted in a very pleasing Award tally – only just down on last season (a record year). The Bronze Medallion tally was 451, an increase of 69 on the previous season. However, the Awards of Instructors Certificates, Surf Life Saving Certificates and Advanced Resuscitation Certificates, are lower in numbers. The various Power Rescue Supervisors have also been working hard, which resulted in an increase in Helicopter, IRB and JRB Awards.

The Board ran two Instruction and Examination Field Days, two Board New Members Nights and a new ARC Examiners Night. We also had a large involvement in the "Life Saving 84" Seminar. Unfortunately, not all these functions were well attended. The second Examination and Instruction Field Day was cancelled, due to lack of attendance.

The 1983-84 season saw the Second Edition of the Sydney Branch Information Directory, a document I hope the Branch will continue to produce and to increase in content. The 1983-84 Directory contained a full Surf Life Saving calendar, detailed patrol requirements, information on the annual Gear Inspection and conduct of the Branch Patrol Competition, examination procedures, a sample Bronze Medallion exam and important phone numbers.

During the past season, we introduced a new system of recording ARC updates, a card system with a Branch copy and a candidate's copy, the candidate's copy being walletsized and giving a requalification date.

Proficiencies last season were handled on a District basis, with Frank Osborne (Royal National Park), Greg Hewett (Cronulla-Sutherland), Peter Carney (Randwick) and Carl Melvey (Waverley), appointed Examiners-in-Charge for all exams within their respective Districts. These men did an enormous job in ensuring a high standard of Proficiency examination.

Next season should see the introduction of a surforientated First Aid Course, thanks to Frank Osborne and Peter Davis. These men are currently working with the Red Cross for the establishment of this Course.

Advanced Resuscitation training is now being conducted mainly by highly qualified and motivated Club Instructors. All Clubs now have competent ARC Instructors. These Instructors are even visiting neighbouring Clubs to assist and compare training programmes. Such a spirit of cooperation between these small Club sections is remarkable and I commend Instructors such as Pearce Biram, Dave Radford, Len Potapof, Frank Osborne, Ross Cotter, Don Smith and Bruce Tually; now the hard working ARC panel should have time to concentrate on special projects and research.

Last season, some Clubs were a pleasure to conduct examinations at. I thank the Chief Instructors of the Burning Palms, Cronulla, North Cronulla, Elouera, Maroubra and North Bondi Clubs. You have made our job so much easier.

We have a lot of hard working Examiners on our Board; I thank the District Supervisors and their Deputies for their work with preliminary exams — Frank Osborne, Glenn Thomson, Bruce Breadner, Mick DeLuca, Barry King, Garry Bennett, Stewart Bailey and Trevor Perrin. Also, Len Potapof, Peter Davis, Charlie Matthews, Greg Hewett and Peter Calder for their hard work and reliability in examinations; Frank Osborne and his ARC Panel; our members who acted as Examiners-in-Charge and all our members who officiated at Surf Life Saving Certificate and Bronze exams, proficiency tests, IRB, Radio, JRB and Helicopter exams, and those who gave up their week nights for ARC exams.

I also wish to thank Henry Hendra from State Centre and Joan Vaughan. Joan has taken over an enormous amount of my workload and has done it in such a cheerful fashion. Thank you, Joan, you have made my job so much easier.

The passing of Don Lucas, O.B.E., left a major gap in the beach arena; however, the response by Board members to assist in the area was pleasing.

R&R competition increased greatly during the season and more members of the Board will be needed to mark R&R cards; similarly, this requirement arises in the March Past event.

To Graham Bruce and his team of hard-working IRB drivers, a "well done" is proferred for the excellent way in which the buoys are placed, moved and recovered.

With my first season now completed in the position, it is my intention to revise the format for appointments for the coming season, a decision which has come about from the constructive criticism received from members.

In conclusion, I would extend a general thank you to all Board members who officiated at carnivals, the Clubs who ran them and their Carnival Organisers.

To the Superintendent goes my sincere thanks for his assistance and guidance.

WESTPAC HELICOPTER RESCUE SERVICE

The last tweleve months have seen the Helicopter Rescue Service continue to increase its workload, finishing the season completing 70 rescues, 207 medical missions and 188 Search and Supports. Our new helicopter, the 350 Squirrel, continues to prove its worth, especially in winching, ambulance and medivac work.

This year has seen a rapid increase in media cover from all areas of the media, but in particular from TCN Channel 9, Radio 2UE and News Limited (Telegraph/Mirror).

Our sponsors continued to support the Service, with the Westpac Banking Corporation providing over \$267,000 and TCN Channel 9 and Radio 2UE giving \$63,250 each.

Recently, the N.R.M.A. became one of our newest sponsors and this year, we have been fortunate to obtain the continued sponsorship of the Yellow Pages and Edward O'Brien Pty. Ltd. for the 3rd Annual Bridge-to-Breakers Fun Run, to be held on August 26, 1984.

The launching of "Project F.L.I.R." last year continued to attract donations and it is hopeful that sufficient funds will be raised by October, 1984, to produce this much needed equipment.

The donation of the Furno/Washington Stretcher by the Lions Club of Brookvale and the purchase of the Canadian "Bambi" Fire Bucket, have increased our rescue capabilities.

Over the last 12 months, the Service has undertaken to increase its P.R. capabilities and this has been achieved on two fronts. The first by undertaking talks to Service Clubs and various groups about the Helicopter Rescue Service and its obligations, and, secondly, by undertaking our first Royal Easter Show promotion.

The Easter Show project proved very successful, with our 300,000 people visiting the exhibition and looking at the specially prepared Channel 9 video on the Service's history. In conjunction with Channel 9, Radio 2UE and the City Mutual Insurance Company, we launched the "Chopper Club" at the Show and this Club is also being further promoted by Radio 2UE and Sammy Sparrow.

This June-July I will be travelling overseas, primarily to look at other Helicopter services in America and Europe, so that we can stay abreast of all the new developments in rescue techniques.

In February, 1984, our Service was responsible for providing some of the funds for sending Bob Ford, our Crew Chief and full-time rescue crewman, over to New Zealand to train the Auckland-Winfield SLSA Helicopter crew and we hope to increase this exchange of personnel and ideas in the future.

My thanks to the crew and in particular, to Branch President, Rex Sargeant, and to John Connolly for their support and help over the last year; my thanks also to the Staff and the Board of the Royal North Shore Hospital.

IRB SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

This past season, I am pleased to report, has been a challenging but successful year for the Inflatable Rescue Boat section. At the outset, I would like to extend my personal thanks and appreciation to all those people who gave me their support throughout my first year — in particular, Harry Brown, Peter Pearce, Joan Vaughan and the members of the Board of Control Executive.

All Clubs participated at the annual Field Day held at Cronulla and, as reflected in the IRB activities schedule, most Clubs have put a large amount of work into their own training programmes.

IRB inspections were carried out by our honorary inspectors during the annual Gear Inspection in September. It is pleasing to report that all IRB's and motors which were presented, were ready to commence patrol duties. Unfortunately, it was disappointing to note that a couple of Clubs did not present their IRB's for inspection until after the commencement of the season.

IRB Examiners carried out a large number of examinations throughout the year. I cannot report that there were no failures; however, the general standard of driving and crewmanship was found to be quite high. I would like to congratulate all Club members who were successful in gaining an IRB award over the past season and also thank the Club Instructors for the time and effort that they have put in.

The IRB's once again showed what an effective rescue craft they are in performing a total of 495 rescues, which represents 29% of all rescues performed in the Branch. On numerous occasions, the IRB's worked in co-ordination with the Jet Rescue Boats from the Cronulla-Sutherland and Randwick/Waverley Districts and also in conjunction with the Sydney Branch SLSA Westpac Helicopter Rescue Service. Preventative actions, another important aspect of IRB surveillance work, were also successfully carried out.

The Sydney Branch IRB Championships were conducted as a twilight carnival at Elouera on Wednesday, 15th, and Thursday, 16th February, 1984. All events were successfully conducted and congratulations are extended to all winners, placegetters and participants. North Bondi were the overall pointscore winners, with Cronulla and Bronte taking out second and third places respectively.

The Championships were once again sponsored by Buttercup-Vogels, and I offer my sincere thanks for their financial support. Personnel from Outboard Marine Australia were present at the Championships, assisting crews with mechanical problems; the company donated a number of products which were presented to the event placegetters. Our thanks to them also.

The New South Wales IRB Championships were held at Dixon Park, in the Newcastle Branch, on Saturday, 5th and Sunday, 6th May, 1984. As frequently happens, the conditions were poor and placed a great strain on all officials and crews. The Sydney Branch contingent of drivers and crewmen performed very well in the 3-4 metre surf, Bronte gaining equal third place in the overall pointscore.

The laying of buoys at all Sydney Branch carnivals was accomplished using the National Council "Sanyo" IRB, in conjunction with the local Club's IRB. This Branch is very fortunate to have a person such as Harry Brown, who willing provides all his expertise in this arena. My appreciation is extended to Harry and also John Dewey, Arthur White, Bill Singleton, Gary Harte and Craig Smith, for their assistance and to all the IRB crews who participated.

On a sadder note, I am displeased to see that some Clubs have been utilising their IRB's for other purposes during patrol hours; for example, as a support craft to a surf boat marathon. Guidelines have been issued to cover the use of IRB's and should be followed.

In conclusion, I would like to thank Ken Brown and his staff from Zodiac Inflatable Boats (Australia) Pty. Ltd. and Outboard Marine Australia for their assistance and backup throughout the year.

Finally, to all members who participated in our IRB activities during the past season, to the officials at the IRB Championships, IRB Inspectors and Examiners, the Club IRB Captains and Instructors, thanks for a job well done.

Branch IRB Championships

JRB SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

I believe that this season, we have seen the Jet Rescue Boats in this Branch move into their true 80's role, thanks to a lot of people who supported the objectives I laid down at the close of the 1982-83 season.

Gone are the days of JRB's carrying out individual beach patrols or continuing the old role of Jet Jockeys of the past.

Today we see these valuable, integral parts of our life saving system fulfilling the long needed rescue role of overall back-up for groups of beaches and stretches of coastline which may not have been previously patrolled, where many accidents have occurred in the past.

The speed of these craft and the fact that they are manned generally by specialist operators and crew, has meant that they have been able to get to the scene of accidents, sometimes at real distances from their base, in a matter of minutes, and have then been able to carry out full rescue operations along with excellent patient care when required.

These factors, also with the thousands of dollars worth of craft that have been saved from being wrecked by the quick action of the crews and ability of these JRB's to tow such stricken craft, certainly says a whole lot for this group of dedicated life savers and their rescue vessels.

Yes, JRB's are expensive to purchase and reasonably costly to maintain and run and I am only too aware that our knockers are quick to seize on this point, but I believe a few points should be clarified or highlighted.

We know that "life" has no real dollar value that can be attached to it. We know that the \$120,000 worth of craft towed from probable wreck scenes doesn't put money directly in our pockets.

We know that the public who witness a JRB in full action don't necessarily then write out a cheque and post it off to the SLSA in recognition of services given or rendered, but in the overall picture of public and sponsor support, can anyone say JRB's have not been responsible for a fair proportion of donated moneys or funds granted from Federal, State or Local Government to the SLSA of A as a whole?

The JRB Group members are only too aware of the difficulty of funding and that is why literally hundreds of manhours each year are given by those members to maintenance and care programmes for their boats and equipment. All this on top of their rostered patrols, plus their roles they carry out for their own Clubs, whether it be as competitors, administrators, IRB crewmen or general patrolmen.

In my thirty years of surf life saving, I have yet to meet a more dedicated band of men and women. If all other sections of our Movement put the effort and hours into their own Clubs that these people do, we would, I am sure, have a total rescue organisation that would be truly cost effective and short on critics.

I referred earlier to the number of operations carried out by the two JRB's, I now expand on these and other statistics.

In addition to these statistics, crews have gained 41 SLSA of A Awards throughout the season, bringing to 287, the total awards held amongst 60 crewpersons.

At this point, I should emphasise the fact that five of these crewpersons are female, who are fully qualified JRB crewman award holders and carry out complete rostered patrols and duties.

I am sure you will agree this is a great contribution to the standard of surf life saving in Sydney Branch.

Both crews have upgraded their required roles as a full operating part of the 24-hour call-out system. This has meant the purchase of special equipment and funds for this have been raised by each group from special sponsors and/or collections. Appropriate training has been carried out to ensure that the standard applicable to meet such call-outs has been instituted and is ongoing.

We have worked in exercises with our Clubs, sister groups, rescue organisations such as Police and, to further expand our capabilities, approximately 12 crewpersons have, at their own expense, trained, sat and passed the Scuba Diver Basic Course, as the first step in becoming underwater rescuer divers.

As we face the challenge of the mid-80's, changes will continue to place problems before us, but I am sure that with the ongoining training programmes I have in mind, and with the enthusiasm that the group has, these challenges will be met with confidence.

In closing, I wish to extend our sincere thanks to the Randwick Municipal Council and Sutherland Shire Council for their continued financial support. It is great to know that they fully acknowledge the role played by Jet Rescue Boats. Our appreciation is also extended to our sponsors in particular, Gus Liu – UD Nissan Diesel Truck and Rapid Transport Industries, and to Buttercup-Vogels, who have assisted financially and to Sydney Branch, our District Executive Committees and Clubs for their support. Thank you.

"Sydney Surf" was open throughout the full Patrol Season of 68 days, plus the Gear Inspection period for a total of 1,332 hours.

A now very experienced staff of fourteen is made up from seven Branch Clubs, and includes three lady associates, and it is pleasing to report that their operational efficiency is of the highest standard.

On the debit side, it is disappointing to have to report on the reluctance still exhibited by some Clubs to recognise Radio as a lifesaving aid.

This may be seen from failure to obtain any Radio awards for proficiency, to very poorly equipped Radio Rooms.

It was very gratifying to see at the start of the Season, both the Waverley Council and the Sutherland Shire Life guards recognise the benefits of U.H.F. Radio equipment.

On the subject of equipment, the Branch can be assured that all the Branch Radio gear continues to perform at the highest level, as of course it must, if the Control Room is to perform its prime function of Rescue co-ordination.

Late in the Season the Branch was finally advised by State Centre that the Repeater Frequency had at last been granted, and very importantly, it is the National frequency that the Branch has held out for, for the last two years.

Information to hand indicates that the Repeater Base equipment should be in place during July/August, leaving the Branch only the job of modifying the existing equipment, to be on air for the 1984/85 Season.

Once again, on behalf of all "Sydney Surf" operators, I wish to thank the General Manager of the Maroubra Seals Club and his Directors for their continued support in granting of our lunch subsidy at the Seals' snack bar. A Branch "Thank You" is also extended to the Executive

A Branch "Thank You" is also extended to the Executive Management of the Bronte Inn for the continued use of their site, as without them our whole U.H.F. System would be off the air, with very wide ranging repercussions.

In addition to the Branch my own personal "Thank You" to the Branch Radio Personnel for their efforts as listed, and request Club Secretaries and Registrars to please note.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

This season was marked by change with the introduction of a new Surf Life Saving Training Manual and the Restructure (on trial) of the Sydney Branch as well as consolidation within the Board of Control with a gain in the number of members. There was an increased awareness of emergency services and the ground laid for the improvement in radio access through the imminent introduction of the radio repeater network particularly for 24-hour radio communications for the Royal National Park Clubs.

The Examination and Instruction area of the Board is to be congratulated for providing eleven members of the panel set up to introduce the new manual to New South Wales and their participation in the "Lifesaving 84" Seminar which introduced it to the Branch.

The mechanics of introducing a new manual and the delay in their availability caused the work load of examinations to be concentrated later in the season. A good effort was made by Bernie Kelly and the examiners to handle this situation. However, the overall award figures were eventually slightly below those of last season, but the number of Bronze Medallions has overcome the trend for this award to drop in the year of introduction of a new manual. The District Supervisors, Frank Osborne, Bruce Breadner, Barry King and Stewart Bailey bore the responsibility of overseeing lifesaving in their areas. We should all take notice that our way of Club life and the viability of the Association can only be maintained while patrol obligations are put first. Credibility with the public and our privileged recognition within all levels of government depend always on the effectiveness of our Association. Clubs must take the first step and be prepared to put 100 percent into lifesaving.

Helicopter, JRB, IRB and Radio Room under the umbrella of Emergency Services performed creditably. The Helicopter, as the flagship service under Peter MacCormick, maintained a high professional standard and improved their access to and recognition within other rescue and emergency transport organisations.

Ken Blakie and Graham Bruce have strived to consolidate the areas under their supervision. The JRB Groups are proceeding towards 24-hour callout proficiency and have developed further skills by undertaking Rescue Diving Courses. IRB's have maintained their position as the prime method of rescue on our beaches and the Branch Radio Room has been manned, as we have come to expect, by a dedicated band in a very worthwhile operation. Ian Badham and John Wardall have represented the

Ian Badham and John Wardall have represented the Branch's interest in discussions with State Centre on the workings of the repeater network, and are formulating improved call out responses with the emergency groups to back-up this improvement in communications.

The Carnival Season was successfully conducted under the leadership of Ken English. Carnival Officials again supported a heavy programme within the Branch and made major contributions to the running of the State and Australian Championship Carnivals. Our Carnival Gear under the Stewardship of John Dewey assisted by Arthur White was again of excellent standard, a factor, along with the committment of the "Sanyo" IRB and its dedicated crewmen, that contribute to the successful running of carnivals.

The Branch Championship Patrol Competition moved into its third year and is now well established as playing a vital part in recognising the efforts of the 'lifesaver' within the Branch. Wanda's patrol with Doug Iredale, Patrol Captain, put up an excellent performance and must be congratulated for their efforts in winning on the day.

I would like to thank, the officers of the Board, the Deputy Superintendent, Ron Howells, the Secretary, Glenn Thomson and Joan Vaughan for their efforts during the season. We all have the task ahead to see that Sydney Branch lives up to its responsibilities and potential.

EMERGENCY SERVICES CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT

The reappearence of this position for the first time under the Board of Control restructure came during a season in which the SLSA mobile units in the Sydney region came under greater pressure, from both within and outside the Association.

Operations of the Branch's jet rescue boats, radio division and helicopter division are covered separately, outlining their support to surf club patrols and the wider community.

One function of the ESC is to provide on-scene coordination of SLSA rescue units, and this was done twice at missing person situations in the Cronulla area in February. At Gunnamatta Bay, a combined effort between divers and members of the Helicopter Rescue Service and Cronulla-Sutherland JRB with IRB support, resulted in the recovery from murky water of a swimmer. At North Cronulla Beach both helicopter and jet boat divers quickly backed club patrol efforts during a search for an object thought to be sighted in the surf by a swimmer.

Another function is to provide support to specific sections, such as in the planning for the UHF repeater radio network within the SLSA which will have a dramatic effect on rescue co-ordination within the metropolitan area when finally introduced.

- Specific activities undertaken during the season included: (a) An opening of season media demonstration of modern lifesaving, staged at Maroubra beach.
- (b)Allocation of pagers to JRB, radio and co-ordinator personnel for quicker activation outside SLSA patrol hours.
- (c) Progress towards uniforms for senior Sydney Surf radio operators.
- (d)Attendance at a number of meetings re the UHF repeater system.
- (e) Attendance at NSW Health Department Helicopter Monitoring Committees, and overall liaison with the NSW Ambulance Service.
- (f) Assistance in co-ordination of a number of missions, including on-scene co-ordination, and in subsequent analysis of missions.
- (h)An investigation into the rescue hazards imposed by sailboards on beaches.
- (i) Simplified emergency callout procedures for JRB2 during beach patrol hours.
- (j) A consideration for Royal National Park clubs to investigate their offering surveillance/rescue support at Wattamolla.
- (k)A revised listing for the SLSA in the Sydney Telephone directory.
- (I) Participation in boating safety seminars and lectures. (m)Liaison meetings between Sydney and Manly-Warringah
- branch SLSA mobile services groups. (n)Attendance at police meetings regarding search and
- rescue co-ordination.

Apart from the provision of a repeater network, to give all SLSA units access for emergency communication outside club patrol hours, the major aspect of planning during this winter will be a combined Sydney and Manly-Warringah Branch emergency services field day in early September. This will take the form of field afternoon, discussion and night exercise. The location at Shelly Beach, near Manly, will allow participation of all units.

While much has been achieved during the season — in planning, liaison and rescue support — a major frustration has been the failure by Sydney Branch to have its mobile sections JRB, IRB and radio) directly represented via the Emergency Services Co-ordinator on the Branch Management Committee. This denied these groups vital participation in the policy side of SLSA activities, and limited their voice to only operational aspects at Board of Control executive meetings.

Much of the real function of a Branch Emergency Services Co-ordinator hinges on policy and in my opinion it will be impossible for this officer to function effectively next season without being included in the Branch Management committee team.

The various mobile services are a vital, and highly visible aspect of modern SLSA functions. There is a void in coastal rescue which only an alert, capable and keen SLSA function can provide. If the SLSA is to fulfill its potential in the complete coastal environment, it must combine both the policy and operations aspects of its divisions in its management plan.




TREASURER'S REPORT

The season past has not been without its trials and tribulations. The year finished with a loss of \$4,504, which saw income rise 65% from \$45,269 to \$74,560, while expenditure rose a staggering 134%, from \$33,826 to \$79,064, after providing \$4,669 for depreciation. The following charts show the variations -

INCOME







The large rise in income is due to our kind sponsor, W.D. & H.O. Wills through the canopy allocation which is reflected in the expenditure item of Distribution of Grants. To W.D. & H.O. Wills, we say thanks.

The most disappointing aspect of the income was that there was no increase in the Government grant. In actual fact, the Government grant has risen from \$4,970 in 1981-82 to \$5,469 in 1983-84, or 10%, well short of C.P.I. figures for the corresponding period.

Turning to expenditure, I think my opening remarks in this report will suffice, and the Finance Committee at its June meeting has taken steps to rectify the situation. To my fellow Executive Officers – President Rex, Sec-

ROYAL NATIONAL PARK DISTRICT REPORT

The three Royal National Park Surf Life Saving Clubs have had a successful 1983-84 season and I take pleasure in reporting 'no lives lost' whilst patrols were maintained on our beaches. Total rescues for the Clubs were marginally lower than the previous season, which is, in part, explained by the continuing cold water temperatures and bad weather conditions during the first half of the season.

In December, 1983, the Clubs learnt of a generous sponsorship from the NSW Egg Corporation. Mr Ken Baxter, Managing Director of the Corporation, inspected the Clubs and it was later announced that, along with other Clubs in New South Wales, the District would receive \$30,000 over a three year period. The sponsorship fund is to be applied exclusively towards the emergency services of the District, including IRB fuels, maintenance and motor repairs, upgrading of our radio communication system and for first-aid equipment and facilities. A portion of the sponsorship is to be used towards the furtherance of resuscitation and first-aid standards of both Club Members and the general public. I would like to thank the N.S.W. Egg Corporation for their sponsorship and particularly Mr Baxter's interest in the District.

The National Park Clubs faired well in open competition this season. All Clubs participated in the Branch, State and Australian Championships. The Era Boat Crew came first in the Open Boat at the Interdistrict Carnival; Burning Palms Member, Wayne Vaughan, won a Silver Medal in the Junior Flags at the Metropolitan Championships and Garie Cadet, Robert Cooper's performances in sprint and flag events indicated he is a force to be reckoned with in the future. The Inter-Club competition was held at Burning Palms Beach and resulted in the Era Club winning both the Pymble Shield and Bobby Liddle Trophy.

Awards gained by the three Clubs were down on the previous season. This, in part, can be attributed to the introduction of a new training manual; however, increased training of new members during the latter part of the season could not surpass the record of 116 Awards gained during 1982-83. All clubs are presently recruiting new members and squad training will commence early in the coming season.

Burning Palms will complete the construction of their new Clubhouse this year and Garie is completing renovations to their Clubhouse and installing security grills to help prevent vandalism. Both Clubs obtained a State Government Capital Works Grant and I would like to express appreciation to the Department of Sport, Leisure and Tourism for making these funds available.

Regular meetings of the Royal National Park Surf Life Saving Clubs' Executive were held during the season under the Chairmanship of Burning Palms President, Anthony O'Loughlin. All meetings were attended by delegates from the three Clubs and many positive decisions for the District have been made. Next year, the Chairmanship will rotate to the Garie Club with President Bill Tapp in the chair. The trial Branch re-structure is seen to be working well for our Clubs and all have subscribed to a District Constitution.

During the season, the three Clubs had occasion to call for the services of the Sydney Branch S.L.S.A. Westpac Rescue Helicopter for evacuation of seriously injured patients. On behalf of the Clubs, I would like to sincerely thank the Service and their sponsors, Westpac Banking Corporation, Radio 2UE, Channel TCN 9 and N.R.M.A. Also, during the season, the Service transported building materials and equipment to both Era and Burning Palms Clubs.

Our Lifesaving Supervisor, Frank Osborne and his deputy, Glenn Thomson, have worked well with all Clubs and, to my knowledge, all directions and suggestions towards better patrol management have been implemented.

An informal visit to review radio procedures with the Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol at Wollongong was made early in the season. Through their 'Angler Bases' the R.V.C.P. provide emergency radio communications between the District and the Westpac Rescue Helicopter. A revised All Clubs are looking forward to the new UHF Repeater Radio Network which is due to be installed this coming season. It will mean, for the first time ever, our Clubs have a direct radio link with Sydney Surf Radio Base. As well, direct access to the Branch's Emergency Services Duty Officer, on a 24-hour basis, will be possible for any emergency that might occur outside regular patrol hours.

Next season, the Executive will address itself to the question of some form of surveillance at Wattamolla Beach. During past years, there have been a number of serious accidents involving picnickers using this area. Although these accidents are not surf related, they have caused concern and Surf Lifesaving involvement will be investigated. The need for some form of full-time lifeguard service at Garie Beach during high summer will also be pursued with the National Park and Wildlife Service for implementation next season.

Finally, on behalf of all three Clubs, I would like to thank the Branch for their continued interest and involvement with our District and I would also thank all Sydney Branch Clubs for their keen competition, friendship and help during the past season.

CRONULLA-SUTHERLAND DISTRICT REPORT

The four Clubs in the Cronulla-Sutherland District – Cronulla, North Cronulla, Elouera and Wanda – have completed another season maintaining their high standard in patrols, examinations, competition and administration.

The number of SLSA awards gained this past season were 468 — more than 37% of the total for Sydney Branch, with Cronulla leading with 137. Wanda won the Sydney Branch Patrol Competition for the third consecutive year and Elouera gained second place.

Further in the field of life saving, Wanda gained second place in the First Aid Competition at the State Titles at Wollongong and that gadabout, "Solly" Stephens, returned from his second overseas tour, spreading the gospel of life saving to the West Indians.

The four Clubs' IRB crews have performed well and their tally of rescues points the way in the future. On the subject of rescues, Cronulla totalled 100 - 36 by IRB, with 303 First Aid cases; North Cronulla totalled 204 - 82 by IRB, with 43 First Aid cases; Elouera rescued 117 people, 43 by IRB and had 148 First Aid cases; and Wanda rescued 115, 42 by IRB and had 230 First Aid cases.

The patrolling of the area north of Wanda was maintained and the Clubs are negotiating with Sutherland Council to have another life saving tower erected and the use of a 4-wheel drive vehicle for emergencies.

The overall supervision of the beaches from the SLSA point of view, was in the capable hands of the District Supervisor, Bruce Breadner, whose constant attention to duty and informative reports to the District Executive Committee, left nothing to be desired.

We thank Bruce and his assistant, Mick DeLuca, for their efforts.

Jet Rescue Boat 2, "Shire of Sutherland" performed well, with a very dedicated crew, led by Doug Sorensen and their tally of 12 rescues, 3 searches, 243 preventative actions and \$90,000 value of boats towed to safety, is indicative of a busy season and, as well, they trained in night manoeuvres for the 24-hour call-out techniques and raised their own funds to pay for fuel. No doubt details of their rescues will be mentioned elsewhere in this report.

In competition, Cronulla SLSC reigned supreme in Sydney Branch with the following great record – 2nd, Sydney Branch Championship Pointscore; 2nd, Metropolitan Championship Pointscore; 1st, New South Wales Championship Pointscore; and 1st, Australian Championship Pointscore. The four District Clubs came in 1, 2, 3 and 4 in the State Championship Pointscore and Robert Chapman of Elouera won his third Iron Man Title, won the Over 24 Surf Race, was a member of the winning Open Teams, and gained a silver in the Open Surf Race, to be "Tooheys Man of the NSW Championships".

The District had three men in the victorious NSW Surf Team at the Interstate Championships at Kurrawa, Qld, and we are happy to report that we have six men in the Australian Trans Tasman Test Squad – Steve Warren, Peter Graham, Tod Peachey, Robert Chapman, Stuart Taylor and Rick Pallister. These great competitors are heading for New Zealand and the Australian Games in Victoria in 1985.

North Cronulla and Wanda met with reasonable success last season in all events, but North's senior boat crew came of age and trounced the opposition in boat marathons — Pier One, the Mazda Marathon and the George Bass, are just some of a great season of rowing successes. Swept by Steve Swaine, the crew expects to repeat their record next season.

The District Executive Committee has worked extremely well and the Clubs enjoy a harmony and co-operation which is a great asset in keeping surf life saving in its true perspective before the eyes of the community and the three arms of government, which we serve.

Our best wishes and thanks to the Branch Management Committee, the Board of Control and the Helicopter Rescue Service for their assistance during the past season.

To our colleagues and mates in the other three Districts, may we wish you the best in life saving and competition in the 1984-85 season.

The Waverley Shield saw North Bondi return to the winner's stand after a memorable afternoon's events at Bronte Beach. Placegetters were Bronte 2, Tamarama 3 and Bondi 4.

All in all, the District had a successful season with NO LIVES LOST.

The life saving standard in the District has once again been high and I would like to acknowledge the respective Club Captains and the District Supervisor, Barry King, and his Assistant, Garry Bennett.

In conclusion, thanks to the Branch Executive for their work on behalf of all Clubs in the Branch this year, in particular, in the areas of fund-raising, Helicopter Rescue Service administration and dealings with the State and National levels of administration.


