

Honorary Secretary

This season was a great one seeing many challenges met and overcome. We saw a number of changes in both personnel and how we performed. As with all changes not everyone was happy and needless to say improvements can still be made.

Our major concern must be the small numbers we are attracting to enter our ranks. I wrote to all members on the subject in September and I again bring the matter to your attention. You are our best advertisement, so don't be afraid to promote the Boards position within your club and the benefits of being a part of it. Remember the more members the better able are we to equally distribute the work load and in turn assist clubs within the Branch be it Life Saving, Competition or Education.

Although the constitutional changes flagged at the AGM and on which officers were elected have not been ratified by the Branch, I have been advised this is not an impediment and to continue to follow them and they will be ratified in due course.

With the advent of monthly meetings and all members of the Executive being on the Branch Management Committee (which met monthly instead of the Branch Executive) the Board Executive did not meet during the year. My position was as a non voting member however Peter Pearce's format allowed me to fully participate for which I thank him. Both Peter and Ken English continued to support the Board fully and gave valuable assistance.

We saw John Restuccia step down after one season as the Director of Life Saving and Peter Davis accepting the challenge and nominating when the position was left vacant at the AGM. Unfortunately he is unable to continue in the coming season. This changing must have a negative impact on the Board, as most individuals irrespective of how good they are, perform better after the first year is under their belt and a continuity starts to flow (we only have to look at Peter Agnew's years in recent times).

Peter Davis endeavoured to inject enthusiasm into the monthly meetings and although he obtained two excellent speakers, numbers did not warrant their continuance and they were changed to specialist meetings alternating between Education and Competition.

Brad Taylor continued to be a tower of strength. He does a mountain of work for the Board with a minimum of fuss. Brad's continuity with the Board his great knowledge of it's workings and his ability to get on with everyone continues to be a great bonus and reflects well for the future.

The proposed seminar for the Branch did not eventuate and a very successful Instructional and Examination seminar was held at Maroubra SLSC on 28 September 1996, under the stewardship of Dianne Lovell, which set the tone for that area of our activities for the season. Dianne in her first year did an excellent job.

It's always good to have an infusion of new blood and Dick Bignold our Competition and Coaching Manager, breathed new life into this area, which I believe will start to really bear fruit in the coming season.

Michelle Phillips although retiring last season, with the very real possibility of the IRB Supervisors position remaining vacant, stepped into the breach, and fulfilled those duties plus her State Powercraft obligations.

Congratulations are extended to Keith Grima, Ron Pears and Stephen Strange on election to Life Membership of the Branch and hence the Board.

Keith Grima after many years service advised at the start of the season he was retiring from doing Bronze examinations. He felt that only members doing patrols should do examinations. Although we must respect Keith's view I believe it behoves us to suggest that it is wrong and many non active members are excellent examiners and so long as you are up to date on what is examinable and have a feel for the beach and patrols that is all that matters. Keith with free time next season I hope for the Boards sake you reconsider.

Bill Singleton continued to give assistance with the Branch Gear and held a successful working bee in July, (It's almost that time again!).

The innovation of the Club Patrol Competition was great and as a Patrol Captain I was disappointed not to see it in action first hand.

Train the Trainer is a prerequisite for applicants who want to do an instructors certificate, however, this will be waived if the applicant has a tertiary teaching qualification from a recognised institution.

Permission was granted to Bondi for their proficiency test results to be computerised after representations to Surf Life Saving New South Wales Inc.

The Maroubra SLSC continued to support the Board through the use of their facilities for our various meetings for which we thank them. The Maroubra Seals club continues to assist with allowing us to hold our AGM on their premises and providing a very reasonable supper.

It was pleasing to see the Branch support Bondi with its policy that drinking and surfing do no mix on Christmas day or any other day for that matter and eventually will lead to a tragedy. The tragedy did not eventuate although the drink area was right in front of the dangerous rip area sign.

Steven Leahy at the August meeting provided an excellent incite and overview of the "Beach Management Plan". David Armstrong (SLS NSW) attended the November meeting and gave a very interesting talk on Surf Ed which was well received.

Long time friend of the Board Dr Ian Mackie was granted life membership of Surf Life Saving Australia. Ron Howells was honoured with an OAM.

There has been a lot of controversy about what radios can and can not be used on the beach. It was resolved if they comply with the relevant Australian standard they are acceptable patrol equipment. The membership list is being upgraded and thanks must go to the two Bill's, Gray and Singleton, for their assistance. Such upgrading has not been included in this report, however, next season only those members who are active, long service, absent or life shall have their names recorded.

Second to last *Communication*. This is an area where we have endeavoured to lift our game and saw some five circulars from me and others from each of the officers. This is an area of great importance especially to those who do not attend meetings, however, to be effective it must be a two way street, so please provide your feedback.

Finally to my fellow executive, thanks for your patience and support. To Liz in the Office who had to read my writing or listen to my tapes a special thanks for your assistance in a job that requires you to be more than just a juggler with everyone wanting work done yesterday (me included). To all Board members thanks for a job well done and to an even brighter future in 1997/98.

I would like to start this report by thanking everyone who assisted me throughout the season. With special thanks to the District Supervisors, Margaret Pearce, Roanna Harris, Errol Goldberg and Peter Agnew and Assistant District Supervisors, Craig Williams, Wendy Fitzgerald, Patrick O'Neill and Suzanne Young without whose help it would have been impossible for me to look after the life saving needs in each district. The

next group of people who deserve special thanks are the Duty Officers, George Shales, Steven Leahy, Tony Graham, Greg Purvis, Ron Camalleri, Matt Scott, Peter Fuller, John Restuccia, Peter Cleary, Marcus O'Donohue and newly appointed Greg Morris. These people put in countless hours to ensure the emergency services side of the Branch, remains the best in Australia. I would also like to thank each club for their support throughout the season. Without the cooperation of the clubs the life saving side of Sydney Branch would not function.

The season started off with another successful gear inspection, which took place on the 14th & 15th of September 1996, for all Sydney Branch Clubs and the Offshore boats were inspected on the 21st of September, 1996. The gear panel all agreed that, except for two clubs , all clubs in the Branch put a great deal of effort into the preparation and presentation of their gear for this year's inspection. It was a pleasure to go around and inspect it. First place was fought out between two Royal National Park Clubs with Garie narrowly beating Era. There is a full report included in this Annual Report.

This season saw the introduction of a Patrol Efficiency Competition. While there were some initial reservations about this competition, the Club Captains decided to give it a go. Once it was under way and clubs had a chance to see it work, everyone gave it their full support. Prizes were to be awarded in the categories as follows: First in the Branch, first in each District and second in each district with a proviso that there would only be one prize per club, ie if you were first in the Branch you could not get first in the District. Unfortunately a sponsor could not be obtained for this competition and a plaque will be presented to first in the Branch and first in each District. If there are any potential sponsors of this event please contact the Branch Office so that this event can be given the recognition it deserves.

Waverley Council, in conjunction with Bondi and Nth Bondi Surf Clubs, came up with a plan to control the Christmas Day crowds that descend on Bondi Beach at that time of year. In past years crowds of intoxicated people swarmed onto the beach straight into the water. This caused enormous problems for Life Savers and Life guards alike. The plan involved the introduction of security on and around the beach. It controlled alcohol consumption through restricted sales and Council provided a band to keep people off the beach. Then at dusk the plan provided transport to move people from the beach into town. This innovative idea proved successful in keeping the intoxicated swimmers out of the water and the Branch is looking forward to working with Councils in the future to solve these types of problems.

The Life Saver of the Year competition was not very well supported this season. There were only nine nominations received from the following six clubs, Nth Bondi, Coogee, Wanda, North Cronulla, Cronulla and Garie. The finalists were Dianne Lovell of North Cronulla, Peter Cleary of North Bondi, Greg Smart of Coogee, Jason Madsen of North Bondi and Chris Giles of Cronulla. The winner was Jason Madsen of North Bondi. The judging panel suggested that next season the Branch should hold this competition prior to the Branch Championships. This way the winner could be announced at our Championships and it would also enable us to give further weight to our nominees for the State Lifesaver of the Year. To this end the nominations for the Life Saver of the Year will now close three weeks prior to the Branch Championships each season. This now being a fixed date, clubs will be more prepared for the competition and we should therefore receive more nominations.

The nine nominations received for the Branch Life Saver of the Year were forwarded on to the State Life Saver of the Year and I am pleased to say that out of six finalists in the State, three were filled by Sydney Branch. Unfortunately we did not take out State Life Saver of the Year this season.

Rescues throughout the Branch were up on previous years. Many of these rescues are not called through Sydney Surf Radio as they are normal day to day rescues. However, with the advent of Rob Barnes "Surf Toll" it has been possible to monitor the amount of rescues happening on the beaches each weekend. Of special note this Christmas day at Nth Cronulla where the patrols carried out three hundred and Five (305) rescues without any major incidents occurring.

During the season there were one hundred and fifty five (155) incidents handled by the Branch's Emergency Services section, this is a 82.4% increase on last year. Of these calls eight two (82) came through the Sydney Surf radio and the remaining seventy three (73) were through the 24 hour call out system. These calls were varied in their make up as can be seen from the figures over:

The season also saw the Branch looking towards the future and new ways in which it patrols our beaches.

Examination and Instruction Manager

Season 1996/97 has been a major learning experience for me, in terms of adjusting to and establishing what is required from the Examination and Instruction Manager. It would be remiss if I did not thank Peter Agnew for his guidance and support throughout the season, without Peter's support I am certain I would have had more errors and problems to sort out during the season.

Following the endless search and numerous drafts of trying to pull dates and venues together during winter, the season opened to the start of the Examination and Instruction Seminar "Between The Flags "which saw 35 Examiners and Chief Instructors attend a half day meeting at Maroubra SLSC to discuss the direction to which Surf Life Saving Sydney Branch will format and conduct examinations and proficiency tests for the season ahead.

The seminar was mainly used as a ice breaker to stimulate the grey matter as the summer surf season is only a few weeks away. Topics and workshops conducted were guidelines to conduct examinations, the introduction of the examination flow chart and work cards, resuscitation, duty of care, and examiner accreditation updates. To Paul Cooper, Steven Leahy, Peter Seeto, Suzanne Young and Peter Agnew, thank you for your efforts and presentations you delivered on the day.

The Board of Control met monthly this year with attendance from Examiners being a little poor. Thankfully with an Examination Meeting called in February, a good attendance was attained. Feedback and constructive criticisms on the direction of Surf Life Saving Examinations were discussed.

Point to note and keep in mind:

As Board of Examiners we must have a better understanding as to the assessment criteria for Patrol Rescue Scenarios, continue to investigate the improvement of human resources in the examination of Part B Water Examinations for the forth coming

season. The Board Members present at this meeting suggested a seminar on mock scenarios be preformed and points on how to examine be highlighted in the exercise. This is a project the Education Panel can work on through winter.

Bookings of examinations requires some adjustment as the paperwork and work cards are being misplaced or mishandled in the system at present, thus on certain days not enough examiners were present at venues.

Scenario kits to be inspected at the Branch Annual Gear Inspection to ensure every club has the correct resources available to train candidates. This season clubs with scenario kits standards improved two fold compared to the clubs who are still trying to resist or fight the changes which occurred to the examination format over two and a half years ago.

Train the Trainer courses were held on seven (7) occasions during the season with candidates becoming accredited prior to gaining their Training Officers Certificate. This course becomes the introduction into the Bronze Lesson Plan book with forty (40), one (1) hour lesson plans under the current Train the Trainer format, the booklets are a great teaching aid which helps and gives guidance to training a bronze squad in a certain time frame.

The Board Education Panel had a large influence in the area of Examination and Instruction at the start of the season, comprising of Suzanne Young ,Peter Seeto, Robert Modein and Peter Agnew. The Panel was responsible for the formulation and procedures for the season and they put in a large work load during the normal quite time of winter. Many thanks to you all.

Peter Agnew has put in a large contribution to the Train the Trainer and the Examiner's Accreditation programs co-presenting all courses with me over the season. Peter Seeto has for the later part of the season started to help and co-present these courses as well, which will strengthen Sydney Branches training resources for the future.

The District Supervisors and Assistants wore a large burden of the Part A LAND examination and to their credit did a great job.

To Branch Executive, The Board Officers and Liz, thank you for your advice, assistance and support.

The Board would not be able to function without the Active Examiners that are committed to Surf Life Saving in Sydney and give up their time in examining the numerous Surf Life Saving awards over the year, thank you.

What happened during the year:

- The completion of over 106 separate Examinations with a total of 1050 candidates.
- 2784 members being examined in 55 separate proficiency tests.
- Half day Examination and Instruction workshop seminar.
- · Seven Train the Trainer courses ran with the

attendance of 37 with Training Officer's and Instructors accredited.

- Two Examiners Accreditation Courses.
- · Examiners Work Card introduced.
- · Club Scenario kits introduced.

Competition and Coaching

This season has proved to be very satisfying for both competitors and officials alike. Results from the State and Australian titles show that Sydney Branch was certainly the most successful. As well as this, a substantial number of officials were appointed to the major titles, many in senior positions.

Particularly pleasing were the results of our two Branch representative teams. The Open team won the Inter-Branch Championships and the Under 18 team ran a close second. Members from these teams were selected in both the State and Australian teams. To Stuart Dutton (Coach), Bob Johnson (Manager) and selectors, congratulations on a job well done.

Seven (7) senior carnivals (including the Branch Championships) were held as well as Twilight IRB events, Junior carnivals and special events. All events were conducted in a competent manner with good numbers entering on most occasions.

The dearth of competitors in Under 18 events is a major concern. This is not just in Sydney Branch, but across Australia as a whole. Perhaps the time is right to consider raising the age limit to 20 or under 21 to maintain or increase competitor numbers. This would also benefit these competitors before competing in open events.

During the winter recess a number of issues in relation to carnivals will be addressed. High on the priority list will be time tabling of events, this is crucial as many competitors and families become disenchanted in having to sit around for a considerable length of time before events. Also, reviews will be conducted for:

- · Number of events being held.
- · Upgrading of equipment.
- · Computerised results.
- · Finishing times for carnivals
- · Computerised entries for clubs.
- · Sponsorship for Officials.

While these reviews are not exhaustive, regular reviews of all areas of operations along with fine tuning of procedures can only result in the promotion of professional and enjoyable Carnivals for all.

All our carnivals on a whole, ran smoothly while "mother nature" at times stretched our resources to the limit. This was in no small part due to the very experienced officials that we have available. General observations

Another season comes to a close and an opportune time to thank the four Club Captains and Chief Instructors with their teams of patrols and instructors, for their usually high commitment to the Waverley District.

In reviewing the season, examinations have been quite effective following minor changes at the start of the year. The overall statistics for the Waverley District include a 85% pass rate on the written paper, and a 76% pass rate on the resuscitation section leaving an overall pass rate for Part A after the signals and radio sections of approximately 60%.

Problems I feel we need to address in relation to these areas are the number of candidates per instructor ratio, with a huge failure rate being experienced with a number of mass groups presented within the district. I think a more pro-active role by clubs in putting preliminary checks in place for squads will hopefully help raise the standard. We can all have a role in assisting Officers in this process.

Patrols ran rather smoothly throughout the year to the credit of the Club Captains and their deputies with only small problems arising that were dealt with by the clubs on recognition.

Areas that the Clubs and the Board will need to address during the off season include the patrolling hours and the methods at Tamarama beach. A more tactful rostering system is needed so that members are not staring at an empty beach for hours on end.

The use of an IRB as a compulsory piece of rescue equipment under the new guidelines of Surf Life Saving NSW is not practical or conventional at both Tamarama and Bronte beaches and in some cases could be seen as more dangerous than a helpful aid in rescues at these beaches. Patrol planning in the Bondi and North Bondi areas is required particularly when more than two sets of flags are used, patrolling in parameters also needs to be addressed.

The Patrol Efficiency Competition was conducted for the first time during this season with most of the response from patrols being quite positive. It is hoped that clubs will take up this concept in preparation for the competition and as a form of inservicing lifesavers so that the burden of proficiency testing may be pealed back further. Congratulations to North Bondi in gaining the highest score in the District in this competition followed by Bondi, Bronte and Tamarama.

Thanks is extended to those who assisted and conducted Part A examinations within the District: Suzanne Young, Peter Seeto, Jason Madsen, Alex O'Hara, Peter Thorne, Darren Palmer, Darren Ottaway, Joakim Valsinger, Jacob Watt, Peter Murphy, and Graham Ford. Your commitment is much appreciated and on behalf of the Clubs may I thank you.

To Brad Taylor the Rescue Services Manager and Dianne Lovell the Examination Manager thank you for your advice and assistance throughout the season in keeping us organised and on track. It has been much appreciated. Liz, thanks for all your help with the administration and support that you have given to me and the Officers within the District, who have given nothing but praise for your efforts.

Gear Inspection Report

Gear Inspection took place on 14th and 15th of September for all Sydney Branch Clubs and the Offshore boats inspection was held on the 21st of September. The Gear Panel all agree that, with the exception of two clubs, all clubs in the Branch put a great deal of effort into the preparation and presentation of their gear for this years inspection. It was a pleasure to go around and inspect it.

Following the poor attendance at the gear officers meeting on the 2nd of August, I was concerned that clubs were not taking this years inspection seriously. I am glad this was not the case.

This season the Gear Panel met to discuss future inspections to ensure we are going about our work in the correct manner. The main points to come out of this meeting:

- 1) It was important to vary the starting location each year. For example, the following could be adopted.
 - Saturday 1997/98 Cronulla, North Cronulla, Elouera, Wanda, Burning Palms, Era and Garie.
 - Sunday 1997/98 North Bondi, Bondi, Tamarama, Bronte, Clovelly, Coogee, Maroubra and South Maroubra.
 - Saturday 1998/99 North Cronulla, Elouera Wanda, Cronulla, Burning Palms, Era and Garie.
 - Sunday 1998/99 Bondi, Tamarama, Bronte, Clovelly, Coogee, Maroubra, South Maroubra and North Bondi.
- It was important to have one panel do the entire Branch.
- 3) The role of the Gear Inspection was to ensure that all Life Saving Equipment was in safe and workable order for the season. Gear would not be inspected to competition scrutineering standards.

- 4) Clubs should refer to any manuals or circulars in relation to equipment (eg IRB Manual), to ensure the equipment meets current SLSA specifications.
- 5) Surf Life Saving NSW be requested to have any relevant circulars pertaining to gear out to clubs prior to the end of July. This would enable clubs to prepare their gear to the correct standard.

During the inspection it was noticed that new IRB fuel cells did not have a carry handle fitted. This matter is to be raised with Surf Life Saving NSW.

Finally, the winner of the Gear Inspection for the 1996/97 season was Garie with Era a very close second. It is recommended that both offshore boats be congratulated on their excellent effort.

The season 1996/97 has been one of achievement based upon planning and structure of previous years.

To list these achievements:

- Successful Club Captain and Club Training Officer Seminars have been completed.
- The use of scenario in examinations for Bronze Medallion and Surf Life Saving Certificates has been extended to cover the Branch.
- Train the Trainer is seen as an essential part of developing the Training Officers of our Clubs.
- Patrol inspections may include a scenario assessment which contributes to the Patrol Efficiency Competition.
- An increasing trust has been placed with Clubs to manage issues within their respective Patrol structures.
- Positive measures have been adopted to ensure a greater number of "approved" radios are available to the Clubs and Offshore Groups.
- A majority of Clubs are developing Life Saving (Beach) Management Plans with appropriate assistance from the Board and Branch.
- Most Clubs are now running Patrol Captain Training and Accreditation courses and recognising the important role of the Patrol Captain in Life Saving.
- The major Carnivals of Sydney Branch continue to be best planned and managed within Australia; and
- Members of the Sydney Branch Board of Control continue to hold senior positions at all levels of Surf Life Saving.

This success has been tempered by awful attendances at the meetings of the Board of Control, at times so small as to believe that any resolutions taken would not be representative of the interests of the Board or the Branch. Steps have been taken in recent months to restore an enthusiasm for meetings by focusing the

meeting on a specific discipline and largely to a specific topic.

However, these measures will be for nought if the membership of the Board continues to abandon this most important forum for exchange of ideas.

It has also been found that a review and detailing of procedures and expectations for Clubs in their interaction with the Board is due. This review would cover a broad range of topics ranging from Examination requests, to Competition Official requirements at carnivals and onto Patrol Default procedures.

All these expectations and procedures currently exist but with time recollection of the best procedure has been watered down and it is now time to reconfirm and develop so that a level field is presented to all Clubs.

It is disappointing that no Competition Coaching courses were held in the Branch this past year but this is no reflection of the sterling efforts of our Competition Manager, Dick Bignold. Rather the resources available through State Centre to the development of Competition remain restricted.

I am glad to report that not only Dick, but all Board Officers have completed a year which they can look back on with pride. Particularly, I would like to congratulate Brad Taylor and Dianne Lovell on their work and encourage them into more of the same. I would also like to thank the District Supervisors, Assistants and helpers for a season of results.

To all Board Members who have participated and contributed to the activities of the Board, a very big thank you and a request to attend Board meetings and to encourage other Surf Life Savers to join the Board.

Lastly, I must thank Peter Pearce and Ken English for their untiring support of the Board under relentless workloads. 
