# HONORARY SECRETARY

This season has been one of considerable change. The Annual General Meeting saw a number of positions not being filled, including the Director of Life Saving which did not auger well, for what turned out to be a most productive and successful season and the last in our current format.

Peter Seeto subsequently nominated and was elected. Peter is our fourth managing director in four years and filled the role very capably. He was in the mould of a young Peter Agnew who led by example and gave everyone their head to perform to their potential. Mid-way through the season we went back to meeting as an extended executive, with monthly meetings as against meeting as part of the Branch Management Committee. This was a mixed blessing as it meant we spend more time on Board matters and included all of our officers in the meeting. The full spectrum of our activities was able to be fully explored and debated.

The negative aspect is we lost valuable participation with the Branch Executive and this was further compounded when the Rescue Services Manager was informed at the March meeting he was not a member of the Branch Council although he had been attending for a number of years and delivering reports as part of the formal agenda. I believe the Branch was the poorer in this regard as his role and his knowledge of life saving within the Branch is second to none.

We have in reality operated as two Boards for some time, with separate meetings being held for Competition and Examination.

Your Executive felt that this situation should be formalised and it was put to a Special General Meeting on Saturday, 16th May, 1998 where it was carried as was a name change to Sydney Branch Board of Life Saving and Sydney Branch Board of Competition. Each Board will operate separately and will be responsible to the Branch Council. The changes will take effect from the AGM.

As an old time Board member, I believe in this day and age of specialisation, limited time and resources, it is a positive step and will continue to encourage the ongoing revitalisation of our organisation.

The change will mean that members can specialise, however, if they wish to be a member of both Boards, they may do so and this will be encouraged.

A simple organisation structure of each Board is found further on in the Report, as is the basic job descriptions of the officers concerned.

Dick Bignold continued to work hard on the Competition side and his diligence saw many positive results. With the restructure, his job will be made easier with the right support and this will in turn lead to greater strides in 1998/99 and beyond. Dick, in effect, has been a one man band in many instances where there should have been at least a quartet playing.

Dianne Lovell maintained her high standards and, with key personnel, saw examinations run smoothly throughout the Branch. She continues to struggle with high numbers of candidates being put up on the same day and having to find enough examiners to do the job and not penalise either the examiner or candidate. Dianne's performance is something we should never take for granted and we are indeed lucky to have such a talented member holding the position.

Brad Taylor is another outstanding official who did an excellent job in some trying situations. Brad is all about what the movement was founded on life saving. He puts it first and ensures the Branch's standards on the beach are met with a minimum of fuss.

During the season we lost three outstanding members in Bill Gray, Bernie Kelly and Nick Dixon. They are and will be missed on the beach. They exhibited a love of our Association that was felt by all. Their contributions speak for themselves.

In last year's Annual Report I spoke about communication. To this end, four Circulars were produced to keep members appraised of our progress, current issues and future events. I hope that you found them informative. I appreciated the feedback.

There was a lot of debate about the adequacy of the written paper, with members recommending it not be used. This aspect of exams is being currently reviewed in total by a sub-committee to formulate suitable alternatives to the current situation.

The one man drag was withdrawn from the BM and SLSC and we have recommended its reintroduction. One of the big problems is what to do if you are on your own, for whatever reason, and you have to remove a casualty from the water.

The Board's active members now have uniforms. If you have not already received yours, it will be provided when you are next on Board duty.

Paperwork continues to be a problem and even with our improved requirements, we are getting knockbacks from SLSNSW with respect to awards. We can not be too careful when checking names, etc.

Board member Stephen Leahy on 26th July, 1997 successfully used a defibrillator which highlights where Surf Life Saving is headed and the professionalism of our organisation. Well done Steve.

We had a number of meetings at clubs and we record our appreciation to North Bondi, Bronte, Clovelly, Cronulla, Maroubra, North Cronulla, South Maroubra and Wanda for their hospitality. Maroubra Seals Sports & Community Club continues to provide great support to us and the Branch generally, for which we thank them. Patrol tents continue to be a problem with most clubs advising they are heavy and difficult to put up and take down. Due to problems with skin cancer, clubs need to provide shade and will continue to need some form of tent. Alternatives are being investigated, however, they will need to be acceptable to the Branch's sponsorship requirements and adequate to meet health concerns.

Ted Brooker was elected to Life Membership of the Branch. Such honour reflects on the many years of service he has provided, for which we congratulate and thank him.

We held two Club Captains' meetings and especially from the May meeting, it was evident clubs appreciated our position within the Association and the delicate line we tread. They were satisfied with our performance and there were no complaints with respect to the patrol competition inspections, which involve a scenario.

This competition highlights a club's strengths and shows where they need extra work, irrespective of how good they are.

For the first time in many seasons, there was not any request for a review of patrol hours and next season they will remain as is.

Bill Singleton was certainly in the news. Firstly, he was made a Life Member of NSWSLS Inc. for which we congratulate him. To top off an outstanding season as a leading competition official, his efforts were recognised with his winning the NSW Masons Surf Life Saving Award of Excellence as Competition Official of the Year. Bill's enthusiasm and love of our Branch is a continuing inspiration to all.

It is important to remember that the smooth running of the Branch, in essence, is in our hands. We are about to witness a major change in our activities in the coming season. For it to work, it needs all our enthusiasm. It will be easy to criticise, however, nothing is perfect and with your assistance and support, we will move forward in leaps and bounds.

In conclusion, to my fellow Executive and officers, thanks for your assistance and support. To Liz, and more recently, Gail, in the office, my appreciation for your understanding, patience and assistance.

Most importantly, to you, the members, for performing so magnificently over the season. Your standards have been high and I am sure you will continue to maintain such standards as we meet the new season as two new Boards, each an integral part of Sydney Branch and its future.

# **COMPETITION & COACHING MANAGER**

Season 1997-98 proved to be extremely hectic with some great carnivals and special events. A number of changes were introduced following reviews of various areas. Results from the changes ranged from outstanding to acceptable. Further fine tuning is required to those which were only "acceptable".

Prior to the commencement of the season a very successful Level I Officials accreditation course was held at Cronulla. Some thirty four (34) people participated. The success of this course can be attributed to the excellent lecturers and the enthusiasm of the participants. Twenty (20) participants have fulfilled all their requirements and are now accredited as Level I Officials.

On top of the Level I course, five (5) Branch members completed their final assessment during the season, for a Level 3 licence. The graduation ceremony was held at Parliament House, Sydney in May where all fifteen members of "the class of '97", lecturers and partners had a most enjoyable evening. Congratulations are extended to Sydney Branch graduates Peter Burst, Reg Francis, Stephen Strange, Geoff Martin and Dick Bignold.

Early in October, two (2) special events were held - Shell Surf

Life Saver Relay at the Olympic Rowing Course, Penrith and Shell Surf Craft Challenge from the Harbour Bridge to Parramatta. Although numbers for both events were less than anticipated, competition was tight and, as a spectacle, proved to be exciting. The concept of taking Surf Life Saving to the "west" was a first for the Branch. Congratulations are extended to all the officials and to Harry Brown who spent many hours promulgating rules and conditions. To Shell, thanks and our appreciation for provision of some \$10,000 for prize money.

November saw Burning Palms holding their River Run for boat crews. This event along the Georges River continues to grow and is always conducted in a professional manner.

Carnivals commenced in earnest from December onwards – while most were successfully conducted, both Coogee and Bondi carnivals suffered from a lack of officials. Notwithstanding these minor problems, the introduction of a separate Under 16 area was an outstanding success. Emanating from this success, it is acknowledged that time tables require addressing for next season and they will be given a high priority during the "off" season.

Other successful innovations for carnivals were fluoro shirts for Marshalls and Starters (competitors can easily identify the official), specific black/white striped shirt for the Carnival Referee and next season Sectional Referees' shirts will have reflective lettering for ease of identification.

It was pleasing to see our officials at the Branch Championships outfitted with shirt, shorts and cap – thanks to our sponsors. Comments received have been very positive.

A set number of events for carnivals was introduced this year so that carnivals would run over a specific time span. Core events were held with clubs having to select a number of optional events to make up a sixty five (65) event programme. In doing so, there were no core events for Under 18 competition (past records reveal poor entry response). The optional events held were at the discretion of the **host club**, however, complaints were received regarding lack of events for Under 18's. No apology is forthcoming for taking this direction as facts supported this decision but it was pleasing to see the tree of apathy at some clubs shaken. It is hoped that competition managers of all clubs become pro-active rather than reactive – only then will all competitors be winners. A review of core and optional events will be held during winter. The concept of the Twilight IRB competition series is great. However, lack of starters is worrying. Dedicated officials give willingly of their valuable time only to be rewarded with a limited number of teams. Serious consideration is required if these events are to be held next season.

Similarly, the Life Saving Premiership requires in-depth review. Continued poor entries can only place in jeopardy this worthwhile competition.

On the brighter side, close competition was encountered at most carnivals. Congratulations are extended to the placegetters of the Open Point Score – Cronulla 1st, North Bondi 2nd and North Cronulla 3rd on a countback and North Bondi 1st, Bondi 2nd and Maroubra 3rd for the Handicap Point Score.

Two Branch Representative Teams competed this year. The U18 team competed against other Branch teams in the metropolitan area. The standard was extremely high and whilst we did not improve on last season's results, sterling performances were evident in a number of events, given the fact that the host Branch selected events that were aimed at their strengths.

The Interbranch competition was held at Byron Bay on the Far North Coast.Again events were altered from the previous season. Competition was fierce and the point score was not decided until the final event. We were in the running but a number of injuries impacted markedly. Nevertheless, our team performed well.Analysis of results revealed we achieved more first places than any other Branch but the combined team events were our downfall.

Fortunately, the entire competition is being reviewed by State Centre and it appears that there will be a new format for the coming season.

Three official craft scrutineering days were held. Bill Singleton and Graham Evans are to be commended for organising these days. While large numbers of craft were presented, especially by the Juniors, some of our bigger clubs were noticeable by their absence. Forewarned is forearmed – Next season **no Branch stamp – no start at the State!!!** 

A large number of our officials were appointed to positions at both State and Australian Titles. They carried out their duties in a most professional manner. The State Titles were beset with huge seas and all events, with the exception of the beach area, transferred to another location on the Sunday. This logistical nightmare was handled competently by the Referee and Organising Committee, culminating in one of the better run championships. Congratulations are extended to all our officials in the way they conducted themselves during this difficult weekend.

The past season has been punctuated with highs and lows. Possibly the pinnacle of the highs was at the NSW Awards of Excellence Dinner. Our Branch annexed three (3) awards being Athlete of the Year, Daniel McLellan, Cronulla; Event of the Year, Shell Surf Life Saving Relay and Competition Official of the Year, Bill Singleton.

The successes of the past season could not have been achieved without the support of all Board Members and clubs. Thank you for your assistance, constructive criticism and, above all, your dedication and sense of humour.

As in the past there is no hibernation during winter. Rather, projects seemingly increase. On the agenda is a Level 2 Officials

accreditation course to be held in Sydney metropolitan area; review of competition areas; compiling next season's calendar; arriving at a workable time table for carnivals, etc.

To fulfil these projects adequately requires the assistance of more than one person. Fortunately, the Board of Control recently held a Special General Meeting for all members to discuss a proposed restructure of the Board. It was approved that the Board be separated into two groups – Board of Life Saving and Board of Competition.

The Board of Competition structure will finally allow time for proper review, introduction and investigation of matters relating to competition. It will also provide the necessary opportunity for forward planning, the luxury of which was not available in the past.

Finally, my sincere thanks are extended to Harry Brown, whose infinite knowledge of competition and Bill Singleton's never ending work in maintaining gear and arranging all needs for IRB events, as well as the "behind the scenes" assistance of Steve Strange, has resulted in an enjoyable and productive season.

It would be remiss of me not to place on record the efforts of Liz and Gail for ensuring all paperwork is distributed timely, arranging for the hire of equipment and the "fox terrier" manner in which competition matters are pursued – Well done!

Looking forward to the coming season and the challenges that lay ahead,

# EXAMINATION & INSTRUCTION MANAGER

Whilst it is easy to wax lyrically about a successful season, it would be folly not to alert members in all fifteen clubs to the warning lights flashing ahead. There are problems in the education fields of life saving. Problems of this nature require attention. Now! Whilst we have members undertaking training over this season, the numbers in all awards are down on previous seasons. The specialist awards of ARC and IRB drivers have suffered dramatically and both awards play an integral part in day to day life saving activities in Sydney Branch Clubs.

For better or worse, the season has seen lengthy discussion from candidates, parents, training officers, examiners and general club members on the direction life saving is heading. The Bronze Medallion and Surf Life Saving Certificate are too in depth and time consuming for the introductory awards into the movement.

I would like you to think about the following statement – "Are we training people to save lives or are we training people to be academically sound in the practices to think they can save a life?" A lot of work is necessary. All responsible in the area of education need to address these problems, as too many candidates and parents alike have become disenchanted with the Surf Life Saving movement. During the quieter time of winter, a review on the direction Sydney Branch will be taking for the forthcoming season, will lie in the hands of a specialist panel. This panel will consist of two representatives from each district. The task of this panel will include areas such as:

- Review of the written paper and the alternatives we have in the form of verbal questioning.
- Development of an in-service program for all Chief Instructors and Examiners on the new training manual.

The season ahead must be one we all approach with a positive attitude to change, for which will be revolved around the release of the 31st Edition Training Manual and the curriculum's requirements of modular learning.

The new Board structure will see Education being an integral part of the Board of Lifesaving for the forthcoming season. The focus to become a functional autonomous unit in all areas of education and examination will be the number one priority which will see Sydney Branch lead the way in educational practices in Surf Life Saving.

To Liz and Gail, thank you for compiling and distributing of paperwork and handling of all other tasks in a pleasant and cheerful manner. The Branch Executive and Board Officers, thank you for the guidance and assistance during the season. Finally, it would be remiss of me not to thank the active examiners who give up countless hours examining the numerous Surf Life Saving awards over the season.

- 1945 members being examined in 58 separate proficiency tests.
- \* Two (2) 1/2 day Start of Season Examination and Instruction Workshops.

- \* One (1) Examiner's Accreditation Courses.

The three finalists for the Branch Life Saver of the Year were forwarded on to the State for the State Life Saver of the Year and I am pleased to say that two of these nominees made the State final. These finalists were Michael Hodsdon of Garie and Chris Giles of Cronulla. Unfortunately, we did not take out the State Life Saver of the Year this season.

This season saw the Volunteer of the Year contested at Branch level for the first time. Again the standard of nominees was high. The two finalists were Geoff Philips of Burning Palms and Brad Taylor of Garie. I was selected as the Branch winner. The Branch finalists were forwarded to the State Volunteer of the Year. Of these, I made the State final and was unsuccessful at that level.

# WAVERLEY DISTRICT SUPERVISOR

Thank you once again to the club captains, chief instructors and examiners, along with their teams of patrol captains and instructors, for their commitment to the Waverley District during the season.

Examinations have run smoothly within the district and I would take the opportunity to thank those examiners who backed up each week to conduct Part A examinations, particularly Alex O'Hara, Joakim Valsinger, Jacob Waks, Jason Madsen, Graham Ford, Kerry Visch and Cameron Miles.

A slight decline in candidates achieving competence on the first attempt has been experienced within the district, with 76% competent in the written paper on the first attempt (down from 85% last season). An overall competency rate for the PartA examination of 55% on the first attempt was experienced (compared with 60% last season). Generally, from the figures presented, standards have increased slightly in the resuscitation, radio and signals section but decreased in the theory paper component. This result, I believe, can be directly related to the additional questions presented in this year's theory examination paper. I believe that most clubs and examiners within the district are in favour of this type of assessment tool, but the relevance to the course content of some of the questions contained in the paper could be debated at great length.

Congratulations to Bronte SLSC on winning this year's patrol efficiency competition and running 2nd within the Branch.While Alex completed most of the competition inspections, simply passing Bronte Beach on a patrol day, one could see from the club's patrol activities, the very high commitment to patrolling. From member deployment to the use of resources, including the constant commitment to erected the Coca Cola tent, the club has shown to be an extraordinarily well organised outfit – this is something of which the club executive should be justifiably proud.

Thank you to Peter Seeto, Brad Taylor and Dianne Lovell for their advice and assistance during the season. Liz, thank you for keeping us on track and in control with your support of the District and its officers – it has been much appreciated. Alex O'Hara has looked after much of the lifesaving duties within the District and has also found time to attend most of the exams – an outstanding display of commitment, thank you!

On to exams, as always many hours and late evenings were spent examining squads. I consider the No. 2 District is very fortunate in having such an active and dedicated group of examiners. A very special thank you to all the examiners and Chief Instructors who made it all possible. It would be very remiss of me not to single out Tony Coffey. Tony was always on hand and turned what could have been a very onerous task into an enjoyable one. I am very impressed with Tony's dedication as an examiner and look forward to his company next season.

One must make the observation that very few awards for instructors and ARC were obtained this season. I also feel the quality of the squads could be better. It is interesting to note in the 1996-97 report, Peter Agnew's comments of the need for "a more pro-active role by the clubs in putting preliminary checks in place for squads". This was obviously not taken up by the clubs and I feel the suggestion has merit. If the clubs cannot fulfil this role then there is a very strong case for going back to the trial system. There was a definite improvement between trial and final exams when this system was in place.

The contentious issue of written exams was finally thrashed out at the Examiners' meeting with a definite **NO** to the written format. Regardless of one's position regarding the motion, this was a most positive step forward for the Examiners' meeting. The debate was good, attendance was impressive and examiners once again have a definite input into the direction of examination policy. I am sure this can only encourage members to come to the meeting with the knowledge that their opinion will indeed have an effect on examinations.

# **RADIO ROOM SUPERVISOR**

This is the time for clubs to have their radios checked and serviced. Don't leave them until the week before gear inspection. I would like to thank Cheryl Hormann, Sue Morris and Susan Puddifer for manning the radio room over the weekend to enable each club's radios to be checked – Their assistance lightened the workload.

Once again the start of the season experienced problems with manning levels. Most of last season's operators returned with the exception of a few who for reasons such as commencing new jobs which include weekend work or taking on positions with their clubs. As you can see, we have 9 new operators, 3 of whom gained their 100% Radio Patrol Efficiency Award for the season. To be eligible for this award, an operator must carry out 20 hours prior to 31st December and 20 hours after 1st January or 50 hours total for the season. This year, after much discussion, it was decided that new operators who joined after 1st December would only have to carry out 20 hours patrol to achieve this award.Thirteen (13) operators gained 100% which was a great effort. A special mention should be made regarding Sue Morris and Sue Puddifer, each carrying out close to 40 hours for the first half of the season and then 5 hours after 1st January, unfortunately falling short of their 100%.

From the above it can be noted that some clubs are not represented and it is hard to believe that each club does not have at least one member prepared to perform Sydney Surf patrols. I realise that some clubs find it difficult getting a patrol on the beach at times but if the smaller clubs are able to find members for radio patrols, the larger clubs should have no trouble. I would like to take this opportunity to thank each one of the clubs mentioned above for supporting the Radio Room during the season.

During the season Sydney Surf operators called 70 ambulances and the Police were contacted on 12 occasions. Offshore 2 was contacted on 27 occasions and Offshore 3 on 28 rescue jobs. They despatched or notified the Westpac Lifesaver Helicopter to 14 jobs and had the Wollongong Aerial patrol assist in 9 searches for either sharks or missing boats and 23 other calls to different services or organisations such as club IRB's, duty officers, WIRFS, etc.

At this time, I would like to thank Paul Newland and all the crew at the Westpac Life Saver Helicopter, Ben and all the crew from the Wollongong Aerial patrol and also the crews from Offshore 2 and Offshore 3 as well as the duty officers for being so helpful towards the radio operators.

During the season, as with previous seasons, we seemed to experience the same ongoing problems with communications in the National Park. The saddleback repeater is starting to get "a bit long in the tooth" and from the first weekend of the season, we had problems. When the repeater was up and running some clubs were blocked out by other clubs on the same channel or other clubs being on repeaters on the same frequency – some of these clubs being at the other side of Gosford. For this reason, we have been trialing a new repeater for use by the National Park clubs at the Coast Guard station located at Port Kembla.

Port Kembla is a location closer to the National Park than Saddleback and is on a point where it is almost line of sight with the three clubs in the National Park. A repeater was loaned to us by Bel-Pacific Radio. This was a very low powered repeater but was found to work quite well with only a few minor problems, mainly due to the temporary location of the aerial being half the height of a permanent aerial.

During the season there were a number of rescues performed in and around Wattamolla which is down in a valley and, in this area, all types of communication are virtually non-existent. The only thing that seems to work are pagers. This has caused us some headaches during times of rescues. The duty officer or the Sydney Surf operator on duty has to try and arrange an extra person to sit at the top of the hill and relay all radio communications for all involved in the rescue, including the Police.

The National Park, for several years now, has had trouble with communications. For this reason, Bel-Pacific Radio and I have put out heads together to come up with ways to improve communications. This will include the three beaches and Wattamolla. This is done by installing a permanent repeated with an operating power of 25 watts, an aerial at a proper height and a relay that runs off solar power. This is just one of the ideas in the pipeline but like most things, it comes down to money. I feel that the money needs to be found and quickly because it may only be a matter of time until something happens due to the communication system now in place failing.

The Bronte repeater once again was at Bondi Junction, due to renovations being carried out to the Bronte Inn. This has caused some problems with radio communications, especially with Tamarama, Bronte and Coogee clubs. With the renovations now completed, the repeater will be returning to Bronte over the winter months, ready for the start of the next season. Whilst the repeater was at the Bronte Inn, it covered the area from Cronulla to South Head with no problems. The area now covered will be even better now that the Bronte Inn is five stories higher. The Bronte repeater will be playing a very important part in the overall plan in the pipeline for communications within the Branch.

During the season my job could have been a lot harder if it wasn't for Peter Seeto, Brad Taylor, Michael Hodsdon and especially Peter Fuller, for taking under his wing a lot of new Sydney Surf operators and training them. I would like to congratulate Peter Fuller on receiving Radio Operator of the year. A very special thanks also needs to go to all the Sydney Surf operators, especially the ones who filled the roster for me without me having to ring around each weekend.

Wishing everyone the best for the winter and for the coming season.



# 5. IRB Officer


The IRB Officer shall:
