A WAVE OF TRAGEDY **BALI BOMBING 02**

The bombing of the Night Club in Bali during October 2002 resulted in several members of our clubs being either killed or injured.

Each club dealt with it their own way.

The Branch for their part arranged to have a minutes silence on all beaches at midday on the Sunday after the tragedy.

The public responded in magnificent fashion. Reports from Club Patrol reveal that beach patrons stood on request from the Club PA system, faced the sea and remained that way for a minutes silence.

"Surfboats in moving tribute"

SURFBOAT rowers interrupted their opening carnival of the season at Fingal Bay yesterday to honour the Australians killed in Bali last week.

As hundreds of supporters stood silently on the beach on the national day of mourning, 24 surfboats formed a line out to sea and raised their oars in a memory of those lost.

The "hard men and women" of Australia surf lifesaving were competing in the opening round of the Peters Surfboat Survival Series at Fingal Bay, north of Newcastle.

Nearly 60 boats competed in the first round of the series designed to prepare crews from Central Coast and Hunter Clubs for upcoming state and national carnivals.

Each crew contested three rounds with the event carried over to the next carnival at points from Avoca on November 10.


Club Memberships continue to rise which is a positive trend for their future.



In March 1960 John delegated by the Branch to be on Lifesaving Techniques held in Sydney.

A move in his employment meant a transfer to Country Membership however this did not preclude him from carrying out his Examination duties. On his eventual return to the Sydney area he resumed the office of Randwick District Supervisor from 1971-77.

John was Branch Radio Officer 1975-86 and a member of the NSW Radio Panel for 7 years.

His dedicated service was rewarded with Branch Life Membership in 1979.

To his Family and Friends the Branch extends sincere sympathy.

Arguably Australia's most successful Rescue and Resuscitation coach RONALD JOHN SANDSTROM passed away on March 8th, 2003 in Calvary Hospital, aged 69 following a long battle with cancer.

Affectionately known as "Strom" he joined Wanda SLSC on February 3rd, 1953 and qualified for the Bronze Medallion the same year.

He was admitted to the Board of Examiners in the 1955-56 Season becoming involved in Award Exams and Surf Carnival Judging, eventually being elected to the NSW R & R Panel which continued from 1980. He was elected to represent this group on the National R & R Panel in 1977.

Ron commenced coaching R & R Teams in 1959 and throughout a long and illustrious career coached Wanda Teams to 10 Australian, 19 NSW State and 21 Sydney Branch Championship Titles.

He was elevated to Life Membership of Wanda SLSC in 1969 and was a recipient of an Australian Sports Medal in 2000.

It was a bitter sweet tribute that soon after his passing Ron was recognised in the 2003 Queen's Birthday Honours with a posthumous award of the Medal of The Order of Australia (OAM) for his service to Surf Lifesaving as an Administrator, Coach and Official.

The Branch extends deepest sympathy to Wendy, Grant, Kylie and their families.

CONGRATULATIONS

In the 2003 Queen's Birthday Honours ERNEST BENJAMIN STEPHENS was awarded the Medal of The Order of Australia (OAM) for service to Surf Life Saving as an Official, Instructor and Administrator.

Joining Wanda SLSC in January 1951 he has given over 52 years dedicated service to the movement.

"Solly" is currently Wanda SLSC's Patron and former Club President, Captain, Chief Instructor and Cadet Organiser, the latter position he occupied for 22 years.

A practical Lifesaver he has qualified for more than a dozen SLSA Lifesaving Awards and has patrolled Wanda Beach in the vicinity of 30 years.

For his participation in a meritorious rescue in heavy seas off Wanda Beach in 1972 he received the SLSA Certificate of Merit.

"Solly" holds Life Memberships of his Club, Branch, State and the SLSA, a World Life Saving Citation of Merit awarded in 1993 and was recipient of The Australian Sports Medal in 2000.

Sydney Branch extends hearty congratulations on his receiving this latest accolade.

The Branch also congratulates Greg Allum (Wanda) the National Director of Competition on his being honoured with Life Membership of the SLSA.


I wouldn't be honest if I said that it was an easy season. There were a number of challenges that we faced over the last 12 months but I'm happy to say that the good outweighed the bad!

It is most important to firstly recognise the active surf lifesavers that have patrolled our coastline, keeping the community safe. The good news is that drownings have decreased - the same with rescues. This has been the result of the great work we have undertaken in prevention. Rescues have decreased to 1979 while preventative actions have soared to 19320. We searched for 21 missing people and provided first aid to 1383 beachgoers. Our Duty Officers continue to respond to many calls for support from the emergency services.

It was in this part of my report last year that I wrote about the sad passing of a great mate to us all, Dr lan Mackie. The Board remembered lan through the

establishment of the Dr Ian Mackie Memorial Lecture. This year, the inaugural lecture was held at the St George Hospital Education Centre, the topic being the presentation of the last research paper that Ian coauthored. I was very honoured to present the paper. More than 80 people attended including representatives from SLSA, Royal Lifesaving, St Johns, Red Cross and even some former colleagues and patients. This annual initiative will be nationally recognised.

One of the major ongoing difficulties that continue to plague us is the ongoing operations of Sydney Surf. We all recognise its importance but we still have great problems in providing operators. I have little doubt that, unless we receive far better support, Sydney Surf will no longer be able to provide its services as we know it now.



It is very obvious that a small group of people have kept the station on air throughout the year and I sincerely thank all operators but in particular recognise, Joe White, Kerryn Briody, Jodi Tarrant, Rebecca Coats and Errol Goldberg. Jodi Tarrant has done an amazing job in managing Sydney Surf this year and her efforts were recognised at the Branch Dinner where she was named the Branch Member of the Year.

I must also thank the management and staff of the Westpac Life Saver Helicopter Service who have again allowed us to utilise the base for Sydney Surf and ad hoc storage of the Branch Jet Skis.

In conjunction with Surf Life Saving NSW, we continued to provide Lifeguard Services at Garie in the Royal National Park during the Christmas period. All going well, we should be able to maintain this contract over the coming years.

Another initiative of the Board was the One Minute Silence to remember those who lost their lives in the Bali tragedy. As a result, SLSA took this on board and every beach in Australia stood still for one minute at 11.00 am on Sunday 20th October 2003. This action was widely recognised by the community and in the media.

Bushfires seem to become part of our annual calendar - again we provided support to the emergency services with bushfire relief. Our Duty Officers and Offshore Rescue Boats were placed on standby for a number of days and were based on the Georges River to assist with evacuations.

Our Offshore Rescue Boats are an important part of our services - they continue to patrol the entire Branch and remain available 24 hours daily for emergency response.

Our Duty Officers continue to provide valuable support to our members, clubs and other emergency services. Following last year's review, a number of strategies were implemented. This will be an ongoing process but should lead to a better system overall. I was concerned with what appeared to be a major reduction in taskings by the Police Service but was advised that generally there had been a reduction in incidents - so perhaps our education programs are working!

This year saw an addition to the Branch lifesaving services - Jet Skis, properly known as Rescue Water Craft (RWC). Matt Scott took up the challenge and was appointed as the Branch's RWC advisor. He led the training of five lifesavers and set up the two RWC that were donated by the State Government 12 months ago. Following completion of training, the 2 units came on line and we commenced patrols in the Botany Bay region. This has had outstanding results which are reported on in Matt's report further on. It is most important that I publicly thank Matt Scott for the amazing amount of work that he has undertaken to get these units on

line. Matt and Greg Purvis have provided storage for us, which is greatly appreciated.

Energy Australia came on board as the major supporter of the RWC service and we have had great help from Jet 1 at Granville who have keep the machines well maintained.

Education and training is an important part of the Board's role. This year it has been a little controversial. Last year I wrote about the concerns I had in regards to so many lifesavers not being able to pass examinations on the first attempt. This still continues and I'm aware of several instances where persons have undertaken exams four or five times before they pass. This became the subject of some good discussion at a Branch Council meeting.

Procedures became established to ensure the smooth transition into the CPL program. These will be reviewed over the off-season to ensure that they continue to serve the needs of all stakeholders. It is obviously imperative that clubs have input into this if they have concerns.

My sincere thanks to all our Examiners who have worked hard this year - usually a lot harder than they anticipated! Your services to the Branch and to our clubs is really appreciated.

The Branch Education Team has trained our members for more than 800 senior or specialist awards. This has resulted in better trained lifesavers.


The Management Committee of the Board is an amazing group of dedicated volunteers - a group for whom I have the highest respect and are great to work with. Your efforts are well recognized and sincerely appreciated. Nevertheless, I intend to make some changes to the way that we operate to ensure better communication and a more strategic direction.

In closing, planning is well underway for next season already. On a national level, the launch of the new Training Manual will see sweeping changes to our education programs.

The support services will be overhauled and a conference in August will set up the Support operations Group - an integrated approach to the way we support the core patrols. Only several weeks ago, we conducted a major training and awareness day attended by members of the Police Service from Sydney, Illawarra, Newcastle and Penrith, along with Local Area Commanders from the Sydney Basin.

So, everything augers well for the next 12 months. Thanks for your support and encouragement - it really is appreciated.

The season was an explosive one, in which we had a number of hiccups, however, due to the commitment of your elected officials, we got through with everything required being done.

Our Director Stephen Leahy continued in his dual roles. Steve continued to push that we move outside the square and this was seen with the successful patrolling of Botany Bay (in conjunction with Matt Scott), the Mackie lecture and his review of Board activities through ëThe Good, Bad & Ugly' with most Management Committee members fully involved. We are indeed fortunate to have Steve at the helm.

Kerryn Briody continued to see that our standards were maintained.

Andrew Hosking had a busy season in the IRB area with changes in crewing and driving requirements that meant many Clubs have reduced capability in this area.

Ken Café continues to give assistance from afar, for which we thank him. He returned for a quick visit in January and found his way into Sydney Surf.

The problems with Sydney Surf came to a head and a Sub-Committee was formed under the stewardship of Jodi Tarrant. Jodi's committee reiterated the importance of the radio service and the need to maintain and improve the service. For us to be successful in this area we need to sell to the Clubs its importance to them. Michael Bretherton agreed to assist the Bate Bay Clubs when they lost their Education District Supervisor, whilst continuing with his duties in the Park.

Paul Booth whilst Waverley District Education Supervisor established ëProject O'Neill' which created an environment for Gold Medallion candidates to gain the Awards and experience to successfully complete the SLSA Gold Medallion.

We experimented with Assistant District Supervisors in the Waverley District with Rebecca Coats and Richard Wade both doing the job in the first half of the season. It was felt that with the increased work loads that such positions should be created for all Districts.

The Committee also formalised Keith Grima's continuing assistance through the co-ordination of resuscitation activities in the Waverley and Randwick areas, a role that he has carried out successfully for many years.

The Branch saw Kerryn Briody & Keith Grima, two of our most experienced educators involved in the editorial panel for the 32nd Edition of the SLSA Training Manual which is due to be released in August at a National Conference.

Our thanks to North Bondi for hosting the Branch Lifesaving Championships. This was well organised by Peter Agnew, with Peter George carnival referee.

EDUCATION MANAGER'S REPORT

This season has been one of the most significant changes in the history of Surf Lifesaving. The roll out of the CPL Awards Program, along with the continuing upgrading of Courses and the ongoing Surf Rescue & Bronze Medallion assessment procedures.

The small but dedicated team of Assessors, 34 in total have done an extraordinary job, a total of 640 Bronze Medallions & 240 Surf Rescue Certificates were assessed. The Part A & B exam calendar was for the most was accepted by the Clubs and the Chief Instructors planned their Courses around the Calendar, this enabled the examiners to plan their lives and other commitments.

After a slow start to the Season, the ARC Team have come through with 155 new ARC operators on our patrols. This team also was responsible for the re introduction of the OP Airways. The Branch ran skill proficiencies in each District and over the program trained 200+ members

The IRB Risk Management Enquiry and the subsequent fall out from the Report changed the manner in which we trained & assessed the IRB Awards. Over the winter prior to this season our IRB Advisor, Andrew Hosking worked on several committees at State & National involved in the preparation of much of the assessment material which is now in use nationally.

The Off Shore team once again continued to up skill their personnel an produced a total of 12 Awards

Silver Medallion Awards of Life Support, Patrol Captain once again were well attended by all clubs producing 90 capable Patrol Captains to manage the Patrols at Club level. Life Support Courses were slightly down on numbers this Season, however the Branch facilitated 44 Awards.

The introduction of the IRB Crew Certificate for 16 yr old candidates and the requirement for the trainers of this award to attend the Train Small Groups Course saw the TSG courses well attended with 87 candidates attending

Our Gold Medallion Program was run by the Waverley Team and had 9 candidates complete all components of the Award.

Our Clubs with Defibrillation Unit and those who are considering purchasing Defib Units encouraged their members to attend the Defib Courses, this produced a total of 46 new Defib Operators across the Branch.

The Branch Jet Skis were finally launched and the Branch RWC Team have gained 5 Operators Awards & 2 Facilitators Awards.

Finally the Branch held 2 Assessors Courses at the new SLSA Headquarters at Bondi. The Courses run were the trial units for inclusion into SLSA's Assessor Upgrade, the candidates who attended were taken through a new format and exposed to components of the 32nd Edition of the SLSA Training Manual.

The Branch had two of its members involved on the editorial panel of the new Training Manual (SLSA 32nd Edition) this gave the Branch the opportunity to have input into the content of the Manual.

Surf Life Saving will launch the 32nd Edition Training Manual in August this year. The new regime of training and assessing will be a challenge for us to address next season and trust that all clubs will embrace these changes at all levels of their membership.

I would like to thank the Education Supervisors, the BOL and the Branch Office Staff who have done a great job. In particular Margaret Pearce who has been the conduit between the clubs and the CPL Awards Program. The work Marg has done with the clubs has no doubt been of huge assistance to the Club Officers who have had challenges with the program.

OFFICIALS / EDUCATION


Recruitment and retention of officials still remains a high priority in the branch, with a program to further increase participating numbers undertaken for next season.


















In Summary, our 97th Season has proved to be another very successful season by any measure. This success is largely due to the efforts of: firstly, all members who contributed in many ways, secondly, the Office Bearers and Appointees who put in a large amount of voluntary time, thirdly all those who supported the club financially and fourthly to all of those non members who assisted the Club in various ways throughout the year.

The most important factor in this successful season is that no lives were lost whilst we were on patrol. This is a credit to our patrolling members and the Lifesaving committee who leads them. The fact that we saved the lives of 57 people this year, avoided 423 rescues by performing preventative actions and performed first aid on 249 people, clearly shows the value of our Club (and of course all other Clubs) to the community - a service provided entirely for free.

In my mind, the Lifesaving area of our Club is really firing. By every measure we are providing high quality Lifesavers to perform our community commitments. The number of active Lifesavers has increased this year now totalling

207 (not including Minnow water safety) of which 36 achieved their 100% Patrol attendance. This year we instructed and had pass a total of 89 Bronze Medallions, 21 SRC's and 67 other awards, a credit to Heather Morris and her Instruction Team. None of these awards would be possible without the assistance of the Board of Lifesaving and its Examiners who assessed our candidates and it is to whom Coogee says thank you to now.

A reflection (I feel) of our Patrolling quality was being awarded the Patrol efficiency winner for Sydney Branch.

None of the success in our Club as described above would have been possible without Leadership of the Club Captain Gary Bowles and his fellow Office bearers, co-operation and high morale of the membership and guidance from the Management Committee all of whom should be congratulated for their efforts.

Competitively, the Club had reasonable success considering the newness of a lot of our competitors and the starting point by which a fair percentage of them commenced the season. Congratulations to Tony Seddon for the gold in the Open Australian Board riding area - an area I feel that has a lot of untapped potential as well as all of our other Australian and State medallists. Of note here is our Women's Open R&R Team which has won this event since its exception at the State Titles - nine years in total. Coogee was also the winners of the District Carnival - the Molloy Shield as well Coogee gaining a creditable placing in the Branch Patrol Competition. A hearty well done goes to all those who donned the "two Blues" this year and thanks to those who volunteered as Office Bearers, Coaches and helpers during the year as well as Col Fitzgerald and the Board of Surf Sports who coordinated carnivals for us.

Coogee ran three special events during the year which were a great success. The Express Glass Island Challenge Ocean Swim was particularly well attended by competitors considering the conditions on the day. We once again held our Annual Carnival - an event I believe we have run continuously since time immemorial (even though it is becoming increasingly difficult to do so) as well as the Sydney Branch Nippers Championship which attracted over 3000 Nippers and was praised by all as a great event. Thanks go to the Organising Committee's of these events and the Branch personnel who assisted them.

In terms of the management of the Club, it all went relatively smoothly considering both the complexities of administering our Club and the size of the task involved. Our membership currently sits at over 1,300 members - a steady increase over previous years. There is an increasingly more complex range of State, Local and Association legislation and rules that the Club must comply with which adds to the workload of all Office Bearers. Financially the Club maintained its sound footings keeping expenditure under control whilst slightly increasing income. We also continued the maintenance programme of the Clubhouse expending a considerable amount of funds and in doing so with an expectation of the same next year.

Our Nippers, the Coogee Minnows JSLSC also had an excellent year under the guidance of Tom Carroll. Membership numbers grew to 479 (plus Minnows parents) all of which had a thoroughly good time. The important aspect relating to our Minnows was that they fulfilled all of their objectives for the year as well as exceeding in some. Thanks go to our Minnows Committee for their fine job this season.

There were some sadder moments during the year, the Bali Bombing where we lost 2 active members, the passing of another Life member, Jack Scott and the loss of other Long Service and other members during the year. My condolences go to all those who have lost loved ones during the year. I would also like to send a "Get Well" to all those members who have suffered illnesses over the season.

On a brighter note, I would like to congratulate Rob Yeldon - Sydney Branch Volunteer of the year for the 2nd Year running for his efforts as well as Rebecca Hamilton who received a Special Commendation for State Administrator of the year. I would also like to thank all members who contributed to our winning the Sydney Branch "Club of the Year". To say we have been striving to win this award for some time would be an understatement. It certainly has taken a while but it was great to win it at last.

We have an Australian made and proven produce in lifesaving, one that has been in existence for over a century and is well respected at all levels of government, business and community, but yet our future financially remains uncertain. Probably the most single important issue for surf lifesaving in Sydney stems directly from finance. The cost to rebuild or repair ageing buildings, the cost to employ staff to run the arduous task of administration within clubs, the cost of supporting lifesaving and competition with new technology and these are but some of the financial challenges.

I would appeal to those empowered to make decisions on behalf of our organization to continue to work hard in finding supporters who are prepared to address and assist with these most fundamental issues.

This year at South Maroubra we had a fantastic year with records in all areas within the club. Whilst we ran third in the Branch Club of the Year competition we are determined to take out number one, and soon. With record membership in both junior and senior and record ëreal' lifesaving awards (173) we are pleased with our progress towards this goal. We are pleased with the overall results in competition particularly our growing Ski Team.

The club is working towards a more professional approach to competition and we look forward to the success this will bring. We thank the many club sponsors who have been critical to our success including the Maroubra Seals Sport & Community Club and South Sydney Juniors RLFC, and hope for a bigger and better season next year in the sponsorship area.

Like many other clubs in the Branch, South Maroubra has been working towards a number of building projects; one of the most important improvements is to support the growing educational demands within the club. We have found that our club in it's present state is not capable of providing the dedicated space needed to house the many candidates, local schools and groups that seek an environment conducive to education, thus this improvement.

I would like to thank the many lifesavers and club officers of South Maroubra both young and mature that have dedicated their time to protecting and assisting the community. Our many friends within the community that so readily assist us when required, and the Branch

Officials that end to our needs throughout the season.

Congratulations to the following club members that were duly acknowledged, within Sydney Branch and SLSNSW, for their efforts this past season. Sydney Lifesaver of the Year - Mark Frost, Sydney Junior Lifesaver of the Year - Tara Holt, Sydney Rookie Athlete of the Year - Blake Thornton, Sydney Masters Athlete of the Year - Jacqui Robinson and Junior Rookie Female Athlete of the Year Kailah Elliott - Koloamatangi. Also to Yvette Rutherford, our Club Hon. Secretary for winning this years Surf Life Saving NSW Awards of Excellence "Administrator of the Year".

In closing, we thank the Branch Officers and Ian Toll for their assistance throughout the year.

!No Lives Lost!. During our 97th year of patrols on Tamarama Beach, a total of 136 rescues were recorded during patrol hours, together with 74 first aid cases being treated. Twenty six members obtained their Bronze Medallions during the past season, together with four Advanced Resuscitation Certificates. Eight members also gained their Silver Medallion Award. During the season, six members achieved 100% patrol attendance plus another four members who achieved the coveted100 Club Award for 100 patrol hours or more. Our thanks go to all these members.

The 2002 2003 season commenced for Tamarama with the presentation on 25 September, in State Parliament House, of a Highly Commended award in the Australian Safer Community Awards for the Science of the Surf seminars conducted by club member Dr Rob Brander. In Canberra on 9 October, Tamarama was the recipient of the National Award (Pre-Disaster category, Volunteer Organisation) from Emergency Management Australia's - Safer Communities Awards, presented by the Federal Attorney-General, Daryl Williams QC. A series of seminars were again presented by Rob Brander during the past season to over three hundred persons.

On Thursday 23 October, HG Nelson unveiled the Mambo Wonderland mural on the eastern side of the Clubhouse. Based on the Wonderland City fun park that inhabited the Tamarama beach and park from 1906 1911, the mural provides vibrancy and colour to the Bondi-Bronte walkway and has the consent of Waverley Council as a major public art project. Last season, the relationship with the Eastern Suburbs Evening College provided the springboard to increase vital active membership levels through the inclusion of the Bronze Medallion in their Summer 2003 Course Guide. For a small club such as Tamarama, the influx of members via this source adds considerably to the overall club size and lessens the patrol burden of each active member.

Another innovation commenced during the past season in collaboration with the Eastern Suburbs Evening College was the Tamarama Ocean Swim Squad (TOSS). This group has been designed to lift participation in the Club for all members. The TOSS members can be seen swimming between Tamarama and Bronte, and north to Bondi. They have competed in numerous ocean swims during the season, and even enjoyed some success. Our Junior Activity Group was again active on Sunday mornings, with a big increase in numbers. A special thanks to all the parents involved in making this part of Tamarama so enjoyable.

The Club sincerely appreciates the continued financial support and assistance from Waverley Council, McGrath Estate Agents, Bondi-Junction Waverley RSL Sub-Branch Club Ltd, Eastern Suburbs Leagues Club Limited and Mambo Graphics Pty Ltd. Without the support of our sponsors, Tamarama would not be able to offer facilities to our members and the community. Our thanks to them all.

John held many positions in Sydney Branch including Examiner, District Supervisor of Number 3 District (for more years than one would chose to remember) and Radio Officer. John was elected Patron in 1999.

In conclusion, I would like to express the clubs thanks to Sydney Branch - Ken, Ian and Margaret, for their continued support and assistance over the past season and wish all clubs a successful season in 2003/2004.

The District has continued to build on the solid foundations of recent seasons. We have led the Sydney Branch, not just in total awards, but also in the quality and success rates of the candidates from Clovelly, Coogee, Maroubra and South Maroubra. Coogee was awarded the coveted title of Champion Club of Sydney Branch. The quality of the presentations of the surf carnivals at Maroubra, South Maroubra and Coogee were a credit to all of the organising teams and the contributing officials. Clovelly chipped in with the hosting of the Molloy Shield, a traditional competition theoretically between all 4 clubs in the District. Coogee had a narrow victory over Clovelly in this year's event.

The District was proud to be able to officially launch the new Offshore Rescue Boat, ORB3 at a ceremony at Marouba on December 1st. Many thanks to Randwick City Council for their contribution to funding for this boat and to major sponsor The Coogee Bay Hotel. Thankyou to Karl Solomson, Matt Evans, Richard Lissenden and the whole Randwick ORB team for their fundraising efforts and the quality of the Lifesaving Rescue Service they have been able to deliver. The absolute professionalism and standards of medical and rescue equipment that this group are able to offer the community is not always widely acknowledged but is a tremendous credit to them and to our Randwick District.

The sense of community and cooperation between the 4 clubs was highlighted by the duration of the District luncheon held at the Beach Palace Hotel in May. Guests included Presidents and Captains of the 4 clubs as well as Sydney Branch President Ken English and CEO Ian Toll. Randwick Lifeguards were represented by Peter Halcrow and Paul Moffat. RANDWICK DISTRICT OFFSHORE RESCUE BOAT (OFFSHORE 3)

This season saw the Offshore 3 Group take ownership of a new craft. This craft, a twin hull Noosa Cat purpose built for rescue activities, replaced the 9 year old boat previously used. Thanks must go to all the members involved who put in a lot of time and effort in researching and making sure that the craft was delivered according to our specifications and the process ran as smoothly as possible.

Membership numbers for the group increased healthily throughout the season with 6 new Trainee Crew joining the group. We also had 4 members return after a leave of absence. With numbers increasing it places the Offshore 3 Group in a great position for the future.

On the award side we had Gary Pracey and Daniel Lee (both from Maroubra SLSC) gain their Crew Persons Award and Matthew Evans, Richard Lissenden, George Shales, Karl Solomonson and John Restuccia (all from Maroubra SLSC) gained their Offshore Rescue Boat Instructors Certificate. Training will take place over the off season to up skill members and assist them in gaining higher awards for the next season.

Out of the members who hold awards on the boat we had 24 gain their 100% patrol efficiency, which is a huge effort considering the majority of members also partake in regular beach patrols with their respective clubs. It must be noted that beach patrols take precedent over Offshore patrols so for all these members to gain their 100% it shows a huge dedication to Surf Lifesaving and their Surf Clubs.

Recently the Group took part in a SLSA (Sydney Branch) Rescue Services demonstration day. About 40 members from the NSW Police Service took part in the day which demonstrated the services we had to offer them in a search and rescue situation. Police Officers were taken for a run on the boat to show off the capabilities and the ruggedness of the coastline in which we operate. They were also given a talk about the 24 hour callout service we offer and the equipment and skill levels of the crews on board. This day proved to be very successful and hopefully will help strengthen the professional relationship between all parties involved.

Offshore 3, throughout the season performed 19 rescues, 8 preventative actions and 6 first aids. Of note, on the first weekend of the group taking part in patrols with the new boat they were requested 3 nautical miles East of Malabar to assist the Lifesaver helicopter with a diver suffering from the bends. Also, after patrol hours, the Groups four wheel drive was requested by the Police and Ambulance Service to help locate a missing girl in the Malabar Rifle Range, who was successfully found. Many other searches took place throughout the season for missing divers and fisherman off the coast between Sydney Harbour and Botany Bay.

I would also like to make mention of the Randwick District of Surf Lifesaving, Randwick City Council and the Coogee Bay Hotel for their continued support and contributions. Without the assistance from these organisations it would have been a lot more difficult to obtain the new boat and operate with the efficiency as with we do today.

This Season has seen the introduction of RWV's into ranks of Surf Life Saving Sydney Branch, the first half of the Season was used to outfit the units and in the training of the initial 5 operators. As journalists we experience these sorts of things almost on a daily basis, and one can be almost blase about it. But when it touches you personally it's a different matter.

One of Bronte's most popular and vibrant members, and a member of my march past team, Robyn Webster, was taken from us by that senseless act of terrorism. But from tragedy there is always a bright light and that light shone at most of the Sydney Branch competitions this past season where members from all clubs were united in their grief and at the same time more determined to show they could lift the standards of their performances in memory of their mates.

From the Juniors right through to the masters all of our Branch competitors put in a mighty effort at events such as the Branch Championships, Metropolitans and Intercities.

At State and National levels the Sydney Branch flag flew high and I was proud to be reporting on these events both for the mainstream media and the Branch office. As usual the media nut was a hard one to crack but we did succeed in getting quite a few stories in both the suburban and major tabloid papers.

And as editor of The Bronte Express newsletter more almost 4000 people a month were kept up to date with the local surf lifesaving news.

My efforts last year were rewarded with the Best Metropolitan Print Support - Surf Sports Award from SLSA. I am very proud of this award and it wouldn't have been possible without the professionalism and support of all the Branch members and officials to whom I extend a big thank you for their help.

I look forward in continuing my role as media officer for the next season.

It is pleasing to report a Profit for the Branch and that we are showing the true value of our assets for the Financial Year.





NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2003

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (NSW). The financial report covers Surf Life Saving Sydney Branch Inc. as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving Sydney Branch Inc., is an association incorporated in New South Wales under the Association Incorporation Act 1984. The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Income Tax a.

The association is endorsed as an income tax exempt charitable entity under Subdivision 50-B of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. Accordingly the association is not required to account for income

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment are carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis. The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the Association to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Cash

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand, at banks and on deposit.

d. Revenue

Revenue from all sources is recognised when received.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Statement of Financial Position are shown inclusive of GST.

Change in Accounting Policy

The Association changed its accounting policy in regard to the depreciation of the Land & Building owned. The executive committee members are of the opinion that the change will improve the relevance and reliability of the Associations financial report as the property is held for investment purposes. As it is an investment property it is not relevant to account for its replacement value at a diminishing rate. The current replacement value is far in excess of the prior years book value. The

financial effect of this change in accounting policy has been to write back to revenue the accumulated depreciation to 31st May 2002. This change recognises \$151,492 as an extraordinary item of revenue.

Prior Year Adjustment g.

Unaudited Surplus of BJA 31st May 2002

The results of the Board of Junior Activites (BJA) a subcommitte of the Association have never been included in the Audited Financial Statements of the Association. The BJA results should have been included and their books and records should have been audited. Due to this inadvertent omission their unaudited surplus as at 31st May 2002 of \$15,858 has been recognised as an extraordinary item of revenue in the Statement of Financial Performance. Their audited results are now included in these financial statements.

The Branch continues to deliver extensive administrative service to Club, State and National levels, combining a range of initiatives for all concerned.


