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INTRODUCTION

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



History will record the year 2020 as a difficult year for all Australians and for the World. A pandemic in the form of a coronavirus and major bushfires domestically both having a vast impact on our organisation and the community. Difficult coastal conditions on dates scheduled for some of our major events also affected our season. These environmental events impacted Surf Life Saving in Sydney economically, operationally and across our membership. While many of the affects were negative, it also initiated many historical firsts for SLS Sydney and our clubs, as we moved from following our predicable seasonal map to charting and writing new maps and ways of working.

The 19/20 season started off like many others, with high expectations and ambitions by a new management team full of ideas around increasing the capacity and capability of surf lifesaving in Sydney. A strong relationship with our Major Partner, Sydney Airport, and the opportunity to celebrate their centenary saw extra resource and funding for clubs. Additional financial support from the state government for support operations and a 12-month agreement for a new commercial partnerships manager all formed the early stages of the 19/20 season.

The early months of the season were busy with a large commitment to the Sydney Airport Centenary Runway Run. The project, the airport's major community event, saw SLS Sydney as the event host. Sydney Airport also provided an opportunity for our clubs to raise funds through members attending the terminals during December and January to 'shake the tin' and gain public support through donations. Both events were successful however both required a large stretch by the office staff and volunteer officers to

guarantee success. A changing shift from the popular 80s and 90s "bucket brigade" style of activity needs to be considered in the future when asking members to not only volunteer for lifesaving activity but to also give their time to raise funds for the equipment they use.

The management team also spent time on future focused activity between June and November with a review of our communication, information technology and strategic planning. We also focused on reviewing and aligning many of our 'business as usual' documentation. Clear role descriptions, defining stakeholders under each Director role and developing the starting phase of knowledge capturing and documenting the annual cycle of activity. The outputs of this process include the development of the early stages of the Branch operations manual and the 2025 strategic plan.

The challenges identified as part of this planning process included a recognition that the organisation still has a diffused technology process. We under utilise the existing data provided in SurfGuard and the potential to use data in other system is great. Greater formal input and prioritisation to the development road map, clearer visibility of technology pathways, greater coordination of existing systems to enhance search, access and the targeted user communication are considered key development areas. This also aligns with some of our identified administration development priorities, to make it easier for volunteers and staff to access information and systems. Finally, and most importantly, expanding our lifesaving provision and to reduce the rates of injury and drowning through more flexible and mobile methods of patrolling is seen as a future priority. Pop up patrolling, greater partnerships, extending support operations are key strategies identified.

The start of summer brought its own focus for SLS Sydney as we set in place our key programs, initiated volunteer activity and ramped up public safety services in preparation for the warmer months. Attention soon turned to scorching heat and overall dry conditions from a prolonged drought that had been affecting most of the state. These conditions accumulated in the start of a horrendous bush fire season. From September 2019 to March 2020, fires heavily impacted various regions of New South Wales. Colloquially known as Black Summer, 25 people were killed in NSW and 2439 homes destroyed with over 5.4 million hectares burnt. Many coastal communities were threatened and impacted. Fires extended across most of the peak summer period and Sydney experienced many days with a ceiling of thick smoke that turned our beaches from sunny retreats with family and friends to dark, blanketed, smoke laden stretches of sand. By January, the key fire fronts had moved from the north coast and Western Sydney regions and to the South Coast. Several clubs and communities on the south coast of NSW were the hardest hit. Communities were isolated and many of our own surf life saving clubs

rallied to provide support, turning into community hubs for the supply and distribution of goods to those affected down south. Others fundraised or provided help via additional lifesaving equipment and personnel. As we move into a more integrated emergency service the spontaneous response provided some good lessons and reflections. A greater understating of our alignment with other emergency services was identified. How we integrate into emergency plans, define our role as evacuation centres, coordination effort, raise funds and the role of the SLS Foundation are all key elements identified and developed as lessons learnt.

As the skies cleared in February our attention turned to our annual Branch Championships and our officials, trainers and assessors reached their peak activity progressing with key lifesaving and surf sports programs. Large sea conditions on several weekends in February resulted in the cancellation of our premier surf sports event, our Branch Championships.

Around the same time, the knowledge of a coronavirus originating in China started becoming newsworthy and by the start of March, Australia experienced its first death from the disease as it spread the globe. As airlines were grounded, panic buying in supermarkets started and the infection rate and death toll grew and so did the urgency for management action within Surf Life Saving. In mid March general protective information was circulated to our clubs. On the 18 March we agreed to cease award training, surf sports events and larger gatherings. On the 22 March after large numbers of people attended locations such as Bondi and other popular beaches, against public safety advice, the NSW Government closed many of the beaches along our coastline. SLS Sydney and club presidents made the historical decision on Wednesday 25 March to cease club volunteer service and close clubhouse. SLSNSW followed several days later and the organisation ceased frontline and member activity. The Sunday morning surf race, stretching out in the gym and standing around with friends at the front of the club are all things that we take for granted week to week. Things had changed and most were anxious about the challenges ahead with family, friends and work as the nation and the World ground to a halt over the ensuing weeks.

The period of March through to July, despite the grim outlook, saw new ways of working and constant proactive management under uncertainty. We also experienced financial loss with our major partner Sydney Airport virtually closed and experiencing their own hardship, pausing their financial contribution. Our back up investment properties also applied for rent relief accumulating into a significate decrease in income midseason. Connection, check-ins, and meetings moved into the virtual realm and we moved from a May gala dinner to our first ever online virtual Awards of Excellence. Surf Life Savers are a resilient lot and the club leadership and the Branch officers worked to adjust though the cessation of activity, hibernation and at the time of writing moving into the recovery and reopening phase. On the 13th of June club presidents agreed to criteria developed by the Branch to reopen surf lifesaving clubs, as infection rates decline across the nation. The cycle of lifesaving operations continues.

People are at the heart of our great organisation and despite the external chaotic world most of our members display incredible resilience. Most of our members contribute on the frontline safeguarding the public, they are our lifesavers and clubs and their management teams and I thank them for the unified commitment to SLS in Sydney and the many working through the changes over the last twelve months. While we have many operational committees that will be described in the pages ahead, I take the opportunity to thank the Board of Management, Pat, Elissa, Paul, Doug, Simon, Amy and Charlie for their dedication, enthusiasm and hard work over the past season. Can I also thank the officers, committees, assessors, duty officers, and carnival officials that all make up the core membership of SLS Sydney. A special thanks to our retiring Patron Earnest "Solly" Stevens for his 10-year tenure as our patron. Solly gained his Bronze Medallion in 1951 and is a Life Member of all levels of the organisation. To Simon Torsellini who has served in the important role of Director of Lifesaving and Education and is standing down after some eight years of service on the Board. He has made an extensive contribution to surf lifesaving as I am sure he will continue to contribute to SLS in the years ahead. Amy Somes, our retiring Director of Surf Sports, thank you for your competitor focused passion and for working hard to continually deliver outstanding surf sports events for our athletes. Thank you also to the office staff, Linda, Sarah and Karen. We are very lucky to have staff that are not just committed to the organisation but work hard every day to make a positive difference. In the absence of a CEO role much of the day to day administration of the Branch falls onto our Director of Administration, Elissa Hancock and I express my thanks to Elissa for the many hours of outstanding service provided during the year.

Recognition always plays an important part in any organisation, but I would consider it essential to an organisation predominantly made up of volunteers. While the pages of this report will highlight the contribution of our amazing membership it is worthwhile noting several life commitments to surf lifesaving identified and recognised in the Australian Honours system. Life Members Greg Allum AM, John Restuccia OAM, Richard Bignold OAM and George Shales OAM all received some of our nation's highest notations of service, congratulations.

I take the opportunity to thank SLSNSW President, George Shales and CEO Steve Pearce along with SLSA President Graham Ford and CEO Adam Weir for their support to SLS Sydney over the past season along with the other Branch Presidents. They have provided favourable advice and support to our clubs and lifesavers and we are always appreciative.

We face some difficult challenges as an organisations in the year ahead, but we also have some amazingly talented people, a history of good financial management and a strong determination to explore the opportunities that will present themselves. I commend this annual report to you and trust that you will find the detailed reports and portfolio activity interesting, enjoyable and informative.

Greg Allum OAM was awarded the "Member of the Order" of Australia (AM) on 7 June 2020 for significant service to surf lifesaving, to international federations, and to the community.

This is the second time Greg has been recognised in the Australian honours system Order of Australia awards, previously receiving an OAM in 2006 for service to surf lifesaving.

Greg is a member of both Wanda SLSC and Cronulla SLSC. He is probably publicly best known for his sporting prowess as an Australian Iron Man Champion, swimmer, R&R competitor and member of several Australian Representative Teams.

However, for many years Greg has devoted significant time and effort to all levels of Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA) initially through administration, coaching and officiating and now primarily through administration.

Greg's commitment at all times has been as a volunteer and he has also significantly broadened his involvement internationally as a member of the International Life Saving (ILS) Federation Sports Commission and Committees. Greg has been a member of SLS Sydney Sport Committees for many years as Sport Technical Adviser and also serves Wanda and Cronulla SLSCs as a member of sub committees.

On this occasion, Greg has also been recognised for his service to the community through the St Andrews Anglican Church in Cronulla, Patron of Life Saving Chaplaincy Australia, membership of the Cook Community Classic Committee and for his service as a Justice of the Peace for 35 years.

Greg is a Life Member of Wanda SLSC, SLS Sydney, SLSNSW and SLSA and an ILS Grand Knight. He was awarded the Australian Sports Medal in 2000. Greg has been inducted into the Surf Life Saving Australia, the International Lifesaving Federation and the University of New South Wales Halls of Fame.

Cyril was awarded the "Medal of the Order" of Australia (OAM) for service to Sports and Surf Lifesaving.

Cyril has been a member of the Bondi SBLSC for in excess of 62 years and has held positions of President and Club Captain.

Cyril is a 2 time Australian Champion as a competitor and 3 as a Coach, he has also swum the English Channel on 2 occasions and did so as a 70 year old.

Richard (Dick) Bignold OAM

Dick, as he is affectionately known, was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) on 26 January 2020 for his service to surf lifesaving.

Dick joined Cronulla SLSC in 1958 and held the positions of Club Captain for four years, Committeeman for two years and membership of the Executive Committee for 10 years.

He was also a foundation member of the Cronulla Jet Rescue Boat Service

Dick has made a significant contribution to all levels of Surf Life Saving, particularly at the Branch, State and National levels where he has dedicated over 50 years of service and held numerous positions.

Dick is a highly respected Surf Sports Official and is still active. He was a member of the National High Performance Squad (Official) and has been appointed to numerous senior positions covering multiple sporting disciplines at all levels of the Association within Australia and Internationally.

Dick is a Life Member of Cronulla SLSC, SLS Sydney, SLSNSW and SLSA and was awarded the Australian Sports Medal in 2000.

Richard Mailey OAM A foundation crewman with Surf Life Sax

A foundation crewman with Surf Life Saving Sydney Branch's pioneering Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service in 1973, Richard Mailey has been awarded an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for his service to the community through emergency response organisations. The award reflects a commitment to the development and operation of innovative services.

In 1960 he gained his Bronze Medallion with Cronulla SLSC and switched in 1967 to help start the then Elouera Police Citizens Surf Club, now Elouera SLSC, where he was a Management Committee member. At that time Rick served as an operator with the Cronulla district offshore rescue boat.

During 15 years as a volunteer helicopter rescue crewman Rick carried out multiple challenging missions and in 1982 received the crewman of the year award. He also took on roles of crew training and coordination with emergency services.

He was a co-founder of CareFlight in 1986, serving as company secretary and as a member of the board of directors as the charity developed from an initial single helicopter service based at Westmead Hospital to become a national specialist aeromedical organisation.



John Restuccia OAM

John Restuccia is arguably one of the most dedicated surf lifesavers in Sydney. John receives the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) following 35 years of dedicated experience to lifesaving, surf sports and member services.

After gaining his Bronze Medallion in 1984 he held almost every club management position and multiple supervisory and board positions within the Sydney Branch. An all-rounder, John has been integral in moving forward committees and programs at a club, branch, state and national level. He was named the Surf Life Saving Sydney Lifesaver of the Year in 1990-1991. In 30 years, John achieved 100% patrol attendance at Maroubra SLSC where he has been Club Captain and President. In amongst gaining numerous advanced qualifications and volunteering with the Surf Life Saving Sydney Support Operations team and as a Duty Officer and JRB/ORB Skipper and Surf Com Radio Controller.

As well as being heavily involved with the movement at a club, branch, state and national level, John sat on the national Board of Lifesaving from 2004 until 2016 overseeing many major changes to the lifesaving operations of the organisation. He was also involved in the Nutri-Grain Ironman Series as an official from 2006 until 2013 and sat on the national Lifesaver of the Year selection panel. John was previously the NSW Director of Lifesaving between 2005 and 2017 and is currently the Deputy President of Surf Life Saving NSW.



George Shales OAM

This season George Shales was awarded the "Medal of the Order" of Australia (OAM) for services to Surf Life Saving particularly through sustained and significant contribution administration and emergency support services over a period of 35 years.

George's significant contribution to emergency services includes service with the JRB and ORB operations and a major role in the Duty Officer operations, which continues to this day.

George has also made a major contribution to Branch administration, holding the major positions of Manager of Support Operations 6 years, Director of Administration 5 years and President 5 years.

During his Presidency the Branch underwent major reforms to Branch structures, constitutional reform, the expansion of Support Operations, implementation of strategic planning, encouragement of innovation, development of a communications strategy, and reform of financial management.

George is currently the President of Surf Life Saving NSW.





Surf Life Saving Sydney and SLSS Member Services are committed to ensuring that our members have access to best in class support either through both proactive and reactive initiatives. To further facilitate this commitment at an organisational level we have introduced the role of 'Member Welfare Officer' to help lead and champion these initiatives.

The Surf Life Saving movement is committed to the protection of all members and especially the Safeguarding of Children and Young People. SLSNSW provided updated advice regarding WWCC requirements and I would like to take this time to;

- Firstly commend the clubs for their positive and proactive approach to implementing and maintaining safe practices
- Secondly, affirm the position that SLSS recommends that WWCC levels among the Branch are kept beyond the minimum mandate, and finally;
- Remind clubs to be aware of and proactive in managing any upcoming WWCC's that may be expiring or may have expired over the off season.

Due to restrictions placed in response to COVID-19 Member Services had to cancel what would have been two of our flagship development events for the season. The first being our 18-25's Leadership Development Programme and what would have been a first of its kind MPIO development workshop hosted in partnership with Morgan Lander of 'Not on My Watch'. We expect to run the latter of those this season with our development programme likely returning to its full capacity in the 21/22 season. Despite these setbacks there are still some great call outs to be made from last season.

I would like to congratulate all the members who attended the Young Leaders Program and the facilitators Michael Bonnici, Jackson Towns, Mikaela Sutherland and Brittaney Banks. Over the weekend these members explored and challenged the way they viewed leadership, increased their understanding of pathways within SLS and had the opportunity to listen to keynote speakers. I would like to thank SLSA Lifesaver of the year Mat Harper and George Shales OAM, SLSNSW President and Steven Pearce, SLSNSW CEO for their presentations and ongoing commitment to our junior membership.

In addition to Branch run programs I would also take the time to commend all our members who attended state and national programs, as always our members have performed to high standards at all levels of the organisation.

This year the way in which we recognised our members was challenged dramatically and the Branch was able to deliver a completely virtual but no less prestigious Awards of Excellence which allowed us to showcase all the amazing work of our members over the last season. The other big change this season was in our Club of the year award structure. The removal of the 'Champion Club of the Year' and the amalgamation of it's criteria into current structures has allowed us to create a truly holistic award which will remain dynamic and relevant in the years to come.

Looking to the future I look forward to what next season will bring and especially look forward to the celebration, recognition and learnings that will come from our year that is '40 Years of Women in Surf Life Saving'.

Congratulations Phil Carter, Maroubra SLSC - a very worthy recipient of the prestigious award of Sydney Branch Volunteer of the Year.





Once again, our season has come to an end.

Sydney Branch Lifesavers continued to protect patrolled beaches from Sydney Heads to National Parks as well as an extensive coastline with Support Skis and Offshore Rescue Boat operations.

As my term as Director of Lifesaving and Education for Sydney Branch ends after 6 years, a big thank you to all clubs and lifesavers for a great job done this season, and past seasons.

In the 2019-20 season our statistics varied from previous seasons. With varied surf conditions throughout the first part of the season and over Christmas / NY, followed by all Sydney beaches being closed due to COVID-19, keeping our lifesavers on their toes throughout the whole season. Even so, we only saw the number of preventative actions fall slightly from last season to 70,407.

It was great to see that even though our Patrols were extremely busy on the beach this season, we still continued to maintain our high level of lifesaving standards. This was echoed by our lifesaving coordinator's throughout the season, with many clubs achieving 100% patrol efficiency results in the majority of inspections.

Our rescues were down across the Branch, but I can proudly say that there are 974 individuals out there who returned home to their families from a day out at beach because of the dedicated and highly skilled lifesavers in this Branch. Traditional rescue methods (Board and Tube) remained high, while the number of rescues being performed by IRB's increased this year. First aids dropped, with the number Marine stings and cuts and abrasions making up most of the 1,907 treatments.

As more and more members of the public enjoy our beaches, we are finding that a day out at the beach is getting longer, with many of our clubs preforming rescues outside of normal patrols times. Big thank you to all those clubs members involved.

Once again, Support Operations were extremely busy throughout the season, with the number of call outs slightly increasing. The RWC team preformed 206 rescues outside the flags, while our Duty Officers continued to provide a service throughout the lock down period. Many of the incidents the team attended to this season were extremely difficult and distressing, and I would like to thank member services for their support.

We also saw the first full patrol season for Support Ski 1, based out of Bate Bay. Congratulations to all the members that patrolled, which saw an overall increase in patrol hours and coverage for our Skis in the area. The Ski further strengthens our support operation capabilities in Branch outside the flags, plus allowing us to continue to provide support to clubs in Bate Bay while an incident is in progress.

On the Education front, the overall award numbers remained high considering many assessments were cancelled towards the end of the season due to the COVID-19 lock down. As like last season the number of members completing their proficiency in core awards increased. This is a great reflection on our clubs and education teams that we have retained our members from the previous seasons. With many Clubs and Branches in the state and country struggling to retain members, it is great to see Sydney Branch in such a strong position.

There are a number of people who need to be recognised and thanked for their contribution to maintaining our lifesaving operations and standards, firstly to Linda Perrin. Without her support in the office the last 6 years, my role as Director would have been extremely difficult. Not sure how I will manage without our daily calls. She is a key member of Lifesaving and Education team in the Branch. Thank you.

Special thanks to Matt Spooner and his team of Rescue Coordinators, Duty Officers, RWC Operators, Drone Operators and Off Shore Rescue Boat members. The team has worked tirelessly throughout the season, often in the background, to provide support and guidance to our patrol teams, including responding to hundreds of incidents within the Branch outside of normal patrol hours. Next season Matt Spooner will be moving into the Director's chair. I would like thank Matt for his contribution

not only in Support Operations matters, but lifesaving and education in the Branch as an LSE Committee executive. Best of luck Matt in the role.

David Kowald and his educational team of Facilitators, Assessors and Training Officers for all their hard work in keeping lifesaving education at such a professional level. Also, the great work the Education Coordinators did in the areas throughout the season.

To our Lifesaving Coordinators led by Lifesaving Manager Jackson Towns, thank you for your efforts working with Clubs to ensure standards were being maintained and guiding clubs through positive engagement to improve their lifesaving patrols. Good Luck and all the best in your new role as Support Operations Manager.

"We bleed Red and Yellow", thank you George Shales for your support for many years in the Branch in your many roles, and the Sydney Branch Board Management for their support this season.

Finally, the last 6 years I have thoroughly enjoyed working in my role at the Branch, meeting so many passionate lifesavers in our organisation, and very proud of our clubs and support operations teams. 




TOTAL RESCUES - 5 YEAR COMPARISON




TOTAL RESCUES 974 SEASON 19/20




COASTAL DROWNING INCIDENTS - 5 YEAR COMPARISON




TOTAL FIRST AID 1,907 SEASON 19/20




TOTAL FIRST AID - 4 YEAR COMPARISON

SECTION 05 | LIFESAVING AND EDUCATION

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SUPPORT OPERATIONS

A season like no other, and one that will not be forgotten any time soon. 2019/2020 kept the Sydney Branch Support Operations Group on its toes, from the minute it kicked off, until the last radio sign off on the 26th of April.

We started the season with two key intentions, firstly, to promote Surf Life Saving's new "Emergency Service" status, and secondly, to build the profile of, and relationships within the Support Operations Group; effectively to unite the team and deliver consistently strong performance across all of our services. In December of 2018, Surf Life Saving was officially gazetted as an Emergency Service under the State Emergency Rescue Management Act (SERM). With this designation, came a significantly enhanced funding package generously provided by SLSNSW and the NSW Government. This allowed us to boost our capability to provide 'beyond the flags' lifesaving services across the Sydney Coast. Our service capacity enhanced this season in a number of ways, including:

- 2x additional Rescue Water Craft (JetSki's),
- 5x Unmanned Ariel Vehicles, (Drones),
- Enhanced funding for our Offshore Rescue Boat, including the building of a new Rescue Base at
- Enhanced funding for our Duty Officer Team, including the provision of Emergency Response
- Mental Health First Aid training for our Duty Officer
- Duty Officer Training for our team, provided in conjunction with SLSNSW

For the first time, Surf Life Saving Sydney was also represented as a member at each Local Emergency Management Committee, as well as at the Regional Emergency Management Committee for Sydney Metropolitan. This involvement not only raised our profile as an Emergency Service, it also allowed us to develop strong working relationships with our partner emergency services, particularly the local Police Area Commands, Marine Rescue NSW and Local Government, including the Council Lifeguards in each area. We were represented at a large scale Search and Rescue exercise held with the NSW Police Force Marine Area Command, and Marine Rescue NSW in September, along with our colleagues at Surf Life Saving Sydney Northern Beaches, with whom we have also developed a strong relationship. The profile we have raised is something I am very proud of over this season, and I am thankful to all those who made this possible, especially to our officers who acted as representatives at

The season began with a forecast for hot, dry weather, with the State largely in drought. This drove high beach patronage numbers from the beginning of the season, which through up a number of challenges for our teams, including a high number of rescues, 13SURF activations and major incidents both during and outside patrol hours.

As we moved through the first months of the season, October brought with it an eerie smoke which would characterise our Summer to come, with the first ever "Catastrophic" fire danger declared for Sydney early in the month. This would be the first time that our team would really rise to the occasion as a true "Emergency Service", when we were for the first time activated as part of the State of Emergency declared by the NSW Government at the beginning of the Bushfire Crisis. For the first time, the Support Operations Group, including Club Callout Teams were called to a standby action, ready to assist should we need to evacuate coastal communities from the anticipated fire danger.

As this crisis progressed through the busy Summer months, Sydney continued to be blanketed with a thick smoke which produced a number of challenges for our patrolling lifesavers. The Bushfire Crisis began to test us as it developed, with our services called to be on standby several times throughout the December and January peak season, while we continued to deal with huge crowds along the coast, often attempting to get away from the heat in other parts of Sydney. During this time, as the crisis ravaged on, Surf Life Saving Sydney provided a number of liaison officers at the State Emergency Operations Centre at Homebush, as well as local liaison officers in Emergency Operations Centres across Sydney. These senior officers acted with professionalism, and were cool, calm and collected while the provided sound and reasoned advice, often involved in very senior meetings of the Emergency Services. Our team, and our Clubs, really rose to the occasion over the Christmas and New Year Holiday Break, when they answered the call to deploy to the South Coast of NSW to assist with coastal evacuations. Lifesavers from across Sydney packed up their IRBS and headed down the coast to assist the communities in need ravaged by fire, and made us proud.

Our team also provided assistance to the Rural Fire Service by providing relief to their teams, staffing Bushfire Crisis Information Lines at RFS headquarters throughout the months of December and January, often until the very early hours of the morning.

This crisis provided our Lifesavers with the opportunity to shine, and provided the versatility of our skillset, and I'd like to acknowledge and pay tribute to those lifesavers who gave up a large portion of their holidays to answer

We moved immediately from drought and fire to extreme rain and flooding, with a weather event so severe that it prompted the declaration of another State of Emergency while Sydney received more than a years' worth of rainfall

in just four days. I happened to be the Rescue Coordinator on duty for this period, and was consistently impressed with our membership as they braved the extreme conditions and conducted a number of rescues of those foolhardy enough to head to the beach. Duty Officer & Lifesaving Manager Jackson Towns coordinated a large scale search during this period for a missing Kite Surfer at Silver Beach, Kurnell, showing incredible leadership and

When one Crisis ended, another began, as COVID19 shook us all to the core, and ended the 2019/2020 Lifesaving Season six weeks early. When this occurred, we were faced with a challenge in terms of a desire to firstly, keep our members safe from the threat to their health, and secondly, fulfil our duty as lifesavers. The Support Operations Group was called to boost our capacity to support Local Government by providing additional resources to ensure that those recreating by the coastline were kept safe, even when the Surf Life Saving season officially finished. Our members once again answered the call. We were able to make additional resources available across all of services, including Surf Rescue 30, our Rescue Watercraft, our UAV team and our Duty Officers. The rosters were all full, and our members were quick to put their hand up to provide additional support over what was an incredibly busy period for our team.

The members of the Support Operations Group were the recipients of the "Rescue of The Month" at Branch and State level for two months of the year, with Jackson Towns, James Caterson, Matt Spooner, Brett Richardson, Carl Van Zino, Jake McDonald, Coco McCarthy, Michael Bonnici, Andi Illidge, Marcus Karozis and Max Moon taking out the September Rescue of the Month for rescuing a missing Kite Surfer at Silver Beach, Kurnell and Joel Wiseman, Jackson Towns, Rupert Agnew, Hamish Agnew, Sean Bunch, Adam Watson, Mitch Keyon, Lara Hughes, Brad Mexon and Brett Richardson taking out the December Rescue of the Month for a rescue of a missing Kite Surfer in the Cronulla Area in December also. These rescues were of particular significance given the potential loss of life involved, as well as the sound asset coordination, and interagency cooperation displayed, particularly between Surf Life Saving and the Sutherland Shire Lifeguards.

I'd like to take this opportunity to recognise a few key individuals who made this season possible:

Firstly, I'd like to thank Andrew McKellar. Andrew in my opinion, is among the hardest working lifesavers we have. "Above and Beyond" should be his middle name. Andrew provided the Rescue Water Craft team with incredible training, maintenance and coordination support over the season, while also fulfilling the role of Director of Lifesaving at Elouera SLSC. Andrew's peers recognise him as a true leader in our organisation, and he takes to all of his duties with complete humility, drive and passion. Thank you, mate - we owe you one.

I'd like to recognise our Duty Officer team, particularly our Rescue Coordinators, George Shales, Matthew Evans and John Restuccia OAM. The wealth of knowledge held by these three gentlemen has been indispensable this season, and they were always only a phone call away when they were needed. George and John also hold the roles of President and Deputy President at Surf Life Saving NSW,

and we are grateful to them especially for being truly "Sydney" at heart and always finding the time to provide us support and counsel, even with their incredibly busy

To Mat Harper, and the entire Surf Rescue 30 team, thank you. A talented group of passionate lifesavers, who embody the spirit of Surf Life Saving. Our Surf Rescue 30 group continues to go from strength to strength, and as a Branch, we are incredibly lucky to have them.

I'd also like to thank the other members of the Support Operations Sub Committee, including Brad Taylor for his fantastic work as ORB Coordinator, and Brittaney Banks for launching a successful UAV program in Sydney Branch. Britt worked incredibly hard to get this program up and running, and with the assistance of Craig Howie, has established an important capability for our Support Operations Group. I'd like to also thank all of the members who took the time to commit to this course, and also for their patience while we navigated an extremely complex set of aviation laws and regulations to make surveillance flights in Sydney Branch possible.

Finally, I'd like to thank Director of Lifesaving and Education, Simon Torsellini. Simon has an incredible and contagious passion for Surf Life Saving and has provided us all with strong leadership and guidance for the last seven years, as Director of Lifesaving. Lifesaving in Sydney Branch has come a long way with Simon at the helm, including many technological innovations and training programs. Our achievements are his achievements, and as he takes a step back this season, I'd like to pay tribute to him and thank him for all he has done. On a personal note, Simon has been an important mentor to me since I first became involved at Sydney Branch six years ago, he has encouraged me to do the best I can in all aspects of lifesaving. He is an important mentor to many of our membership and we wish him all the best. Enjoy the welldeserved break, mate, but don't go too far...

Towards the end of this season, I was contacted by a Life Member of Sydney Branch, Mr. Keith Grima OAM, kindly checking in on me after another busy weekend along the beaches. He sent me an SMS message simply reading "Surf Life Saving Sydney is strong, because of a small group of people who go above and beyond as a norm, rather than as an exception..."

That is the ethos of our Support Operations Group.

What a season... well done and thank you to all.

BRANCH RESCUE OF THE YEAR - BRONTE SLSC RESCUE CONDUCTED 1 FEBRUARY 2020



At 7.30pm on Saturday 1 February, Bronte SLSC Club Captain, James McLennan, and his wife Kirsty, were having dinner on the northern headland at Bronte outside their home. Kirsty and James spotted a group of distressed swimmers being swept out to sea by the Bronte Express, at the beach's southern end. They jumped to the rescue while tapping out a short but effective message to the Club's 'Board Skills' What's App group: 'Mass rescue. All assistance required.' Within moments group members were replying, indicating that they were on their way. James also commissioned two bystanders to call 000 to request ambulance and police assistance and also put out a call for any volunteer Lifesavers who might be in attendance at the private function being held at the Club.

James and Kirsty grabbed rescue boards, after alerting other nearby club members to assist, and paddled out to the distressed group. Conditions were nasty. At first glance suggested there were five swimmers in immediate unassisted distress with the potential for more.

James, first at the incident scene, brought five patients to his board. Other patients were spotted and many of those returned to shore required treatment - others then joined the rescue to rescue a total of 11 people from the beach - while the full story of the rescue is posted on the SLS Sydney website the follow is the final count of the mass rescue: 11 rescues performed including 9 serious rescues; 1 patient taken to hospital, recovered after 2 days in hospital, 18 volunteer Lifesavers attended; 3 offduty Waverley Council Lifeguards attended; 15 rescue boards lay on the sand after the event; and countless members of the Bronte community rendered assistance.

VISITING CLUBS PROGRAM **GARIE SLSC**

The 2019/20 season hosted another very successful 'Visiting Club Program' for Garie Surf Life Saving Club. The program uptake from the other fourteen (14) Sydney clubs, as well as the 'Lifesavers with Pride' group, was exceptional and went largely without any issues or complications. Whilst public holidays remained hard to fill due to the understandable increase in demand at their own clubs, the remaining days were easily spread and fulfilled. The visiting clubs primarily completed patrols on Saturdays whilst Garie SLSC completed patrols on Sundays.

This season was unprecedented. The Bushfire Emergency earlier in the season, saw many clubs provide even further assistance to those in the South Coast of New South Wales. Combined with the already committed assistance to Garie SLSC, I commend the clubs on their ability to not only fulfil their own patrols but continue to extend their service to other communities in time of need. However, despite their limited membership numbers, Garie SLSC was no exception to this. Garie regularly relocated their Inflatable Rescue Boats to the Rural Fire Service in Bundeena to ensure the provision of their call-out ability was not compromised by the closure of the Royal National Park in Catastrophic fire conditions.

Gilbert Olzomer, who assisted with the coordination of the program stated, "All visiting Clubs showed commitment to patrolling Garie and looking after the visiting beach goers. Patrolling Garie often presents a challenge because a lot of the visiting swimmers have limited ability in the surf and this beach can be particularly dangerous at times, however this challenge was managed well by visiting Clubs. There were a number of rescues, first aids and responses to other locations in the National Park for which all visiting Clubs should be congratulated. It was good to see a number of the Clubs using the opportunity to stay the night, conduct member training, development and socialise with other Club members".

I would like to thank Gilbert Olzomer for his continued support and management of the program, liaising with Garie SLSC and the visiting clubs to ensure the patrols were also covered and performed to operational and community expectations.

The assistance of the visiting club program has allowed for members to draw their attention to increasing their membership numbers and most notably, this occurred though the 'Vanguard' program this season. This innovative recruitment drive attracted an additional nine (9) bronze medallion members to Garie's ranks. A true reflection of the successes of both programs, the March 2020 Rescue of the Month was awarded to Garie SLSC for a rescue that was primarily performed by fresh, new bronze medallion members from this program under the experienced guidance of other senior Garie SLSC members



Whilst recognising the valuable assistance the visiting club program provided to her members, Jessika Hay, Director of Operations at Garie SLSC stated, "Garie is appreciative of the support provided to us this season. It has shown positive growth and support in the development of active members for the future. The support of the visiting patrol program along with Gilbert Olzomer's guidance has allowed Garie to further guide our club to a successful future". Jess' work over the past few seasons at Garie has been tremendous, focusing on innovative new recruitment drives to eventually wind back the visiting club program the Branch members have come to love. A true reflection of her work this season, Jessika was awarded the 2019/20 Surf Life Saver of the Year at the recent Awards of Excellence!

In closing, I would like to thank each and every member that contributed to the program this season. Whether it be organising your clubs rosters, physically attending and patrolling or covering another member on patrol at your home club whilst they attend Garie, you have played an active part in ensuring Garie SLSC remains the relevant and important service we all know it is within the Royal National Park community. I want you to be proud of the 393 preventative actions, 24 rescues and 8 first aids performed as they are all indicative of your hard work at Garie Beach this season. With a fair share of these conducted by the visiting clubs across the 159.5 cumulative hours patrolled, to say this program has been a success would be an understatement.

EDUCATION

The Education team had another busy year.

A glance at the Branch Awards Summary presents a mixed picture. Member training at the three smaller clubs, Burning Palms, Era and Garie is on the up, whereas the larger clubs had lower numbers coming through.

I know a number of clubs had squads in-progress that had to be cancelled after the COVID 19 restrictions were implemented, so would expect a strong bounce back next season in club training numbers. On that note, it was pleasing that many clubs had voluntarily suspended activities prior the mandated lockdown as it demonstrates a commitment to public safety in the broader sense.

A special mention must be made of the Garie Vanguard project, where nine new lifesavers were recruited from the western suburbs to patrol at Garie. Hopefully it is the beginning of a new direction for the club. Thanks to all who worked to get this running.

Demand for the Branch facilitated courses was strong throughout the year. Award numbers coming through the trainers (62) and assessors (18) courses were very strong, which should ease the load on our established trainers and assessors, many of whom had to carry the load during the pauses in conducting new trainers and assessors' courses in the past two years. The partnership with HBA Learning in delivering assessors courses is working very well as they continually work to improve the student experience.

HBA Learning has also been assisting SLSNSW to deliver the TAE Upgrade courses and it is pleasing to see so many trainers, assessors, and facilitators (TAF's) commit to their ongoing professional development. A clear pathway from the trainers course through to attaining the full TAE40116 Certificate IV in Training and Assessment has now been established, albeit subject to funding opportunities. Ideally the pathway could be completed across two seasons to enable new TAF's to pick up the necessary experience on the beach before moving to the next qualification. This experience also allows for recognition of prior learning (RPL) of certain activities, thereby shortening the in-class requirements.

The Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue (96) and Beach Management (108) courses were all oversubscribed and a focus for 2020/21 will be to bring on more facilitators to assist with the load.

This season also saw the introduction of the smartphone App for the conduct of assessments; the Assessing App. It was trialled this year on Skills Maintenance sessions. It is clear that when it works it will save a lot of time, with straight through processing eliminating the need to hardcopy recording and subsequent data entry of the

results. Clubs who participated in the trial have provided feedback to SLSA on where the reliability of the app needs to improve.

Looking forward into season 2020/21, new Surf Rescue and Bronze Medallion certificate courses will be introduced by SLSA. The new course content is the result of widespread consultation and follows the conduct of pilot programs in 2019/20. Three clubs within Sydney participated in the pilot programs. Although different to what is currently delivered, I fully endorse the work of SLSA and encourage all members and TAF's to support the delivery of the new courses.

The achievements of this season could not have happened without the hard work of our Trainers, Assessors, Facilitators, and Area Education Coordinators; thankyou to you all. Thanks also to members for the enthusiasm you bring to the education courses.

I would like to thank our Operational Area Education Coordinators for this season. Peter Pearce has continued on from 2018-19, and many years prior, and two new coordinators stepped up in Randwick and Cronulla Sutherland. These are difficult roles, in the sense that invariably the role of actually undertaking assessments falls back on the same familiar faces and it is a challenge to spread the load more evenly as we are all committed in other areas of life saving. Hopefully with a new pool of assessors coming through the task will be easier next season. Well done to Brett and Alejandro on stepping up this season, and continuing into 2020/21.

DIRECTOR OF SURF SPORTS REPORT



The Surf Sports Committee's (SSC) purpose is to support the running of local carnivals and ensure that competition is safe, inclusive and catering to the needs of our competitors, officials, volunteers and Sydney Branch clubs. The SSC oversaw 6 local carnivals, 4 district carnivals, the U8 Branch Championships carnival, a SOS carnival and the final round of the Nutri Grain series and Super Surf Teams. Unfortunately we did not get to run the Sydney Branch Championship weekend due to two weekends of dangerous surf and extreme weather conditions.

As in previous seasons the SSC started the season with a briefing for the surf sports community followed by "welcoming" season drinks for the officials. Thank you to South Maroubra for lending us their venue for both events

Nippers this season had the opportunity to attend 5 carnivals which included 4 local club carnivals (Cronulla Short Course, Elouera Ohana Classic, North Cronulla Junior Iron, Wanda One) and a district carnival. An encouraging trend for our nipper carnivals is that participation has generally been growing for the last two years which is a big positive for sport. We also saw an increasing number of disability events being provided at these carnivals.

A new initiative this year was to give the U8s their own Branch championship carnival this was a great success

with 395 nippers participating. A big thank you to South Maroubra for helping us facilitate the event.

BONDI SBLSC

A season of fires, cyclone storms, a flood and a pandemic didn't stop us being able to say "no lives lost" for our patrol area of the beach. It is tragic we cannot say that for the entire beach.

Our patrols were strong and vigilant this year which was rewarded by only 162 rescues during patrol hours, our lowest level in 5 years, taking our total rescue count to 27,614 since 1924. This year we worked hard to respect patrol members' time. Bondi still has one of the highest mandatory patrol hour levels of all surf lifesaving clubs, so the Lifesaving team worked in the preseason to set up the two new patrols; McDonald and Ormsby. This reduced rostered patrol hours by around 8 hours per person. We also ran a trial with Branch to identify if our hours of operation were unnecessarily long in the shoulder season. Our largest competition team ever was entered to Branch with 110 nippers, 40 open, and 64 masters who trained hard to wear the Blue and White representing the club. The teams defended the State Masters overall title. Our Champion Lifesavers were successful at Branch and State. The Education team took out the SLS NSW Service Team of the Year and continued to deliver a strong, skilled and motivated group of new lifesavers to patrols. Even though the season ended early with 2 Bronze squads postponed, the club still had the highest number of awards in the Branch, and more Bronze medallions (127) than last year. The club has now trained 3,715 bronze holders since foundation. Garie formally recognised the clubs support for the Vanguard program that delivered them a large contingent of new lifesavers. We also trialled the new pilot Bronze program for BM3 and provided valuable feedback to the development of the new curriculum to be rolled out across SLSA.

We also put effort into the Youth membership. With 200+ under 18 lifesavers we want to increase the opportunities for social interactions and club activities. We ran a number of youth nights, a Garie weekend, and some movie nights with visitors from Moryura SLSC and Port Campbell SLSC. There was also good support for our key fundraising events. Marketing was able to find new sponsors, redevelop the website, and expand the social media team. We also participated in Branch and State events over the year, including the NSW Clean Waters, and the Sydney Branch Sydney Airports Centenary Launch. Over the Bushfire period, the club received over a million online engagements on Facebook, as well as significant media coverage. Caroline Pierce took on the role of Surfer Editor, the format was changed to give short updates each week and a bumper edition once a month with lots of stories of club life, and I think this was a great success. Developing our role in the community was a focus for the year. We had planned some activities, but external influences saw the club expand its efforts with our theme of "saving lives, on and off the beach". We ran the Mental Health talks, delivered the Bondi Access! program, finally allowing people with mobility issues to be able to access the beach using matting or beach wheelchairs. We followed Coogee with a Dippers program for autistic children. Over this year, first the south coast and then



the whole world needed help in challenging times, and demonstrated that our reach for "no lives lost" stretches beyond the waterline given our iconic status and our capabilities.

With the entire Bondi community bringing the hall alive with over a hundred volunteers to support the south coast, it demonstrated we are a trusted community hub. Our promise to get supplies to where they were needed continued until April, and was recognised at Council, State and Federal levels as an extraordinary effort for the community.

During the Coronavirus crisis, Bondi led from January in adopting lifesaving protocols given the changing risk of providing lifesaving. When the beaches were overwhelmed with crowds in March, strong representations from Bondi were supported by other Waverley clubs, and led to State and Council interventions to limit gatherings on the beach. These actions were widely reported worldwide, and the closures at Bondi were echoed first at other Waverley beaches, then all Sydney beaches, as Bondi was used as an example of the need to maintain physical distancing.

After patrols ceased, the work did not stop. The club set up a range of online communication chat rooms and video Zoom cafes to allow members to interact from home. Our Veteran Outreach program directly connected with all members over 70, ensuring we knew how they were and if they needed support. This was then enhanced by the "Raise your Hand" program to provide support to our members through our MPIOs. We also led a program of care packages that were distributed by the Wayside Chapel

The club has achieved much to be proud of over the past year, and that was a result of diligent work from the Board of Directors and support from Branch. Having sat on numerous club committees over the past 27 years, I can safely say we have the most humble, diligent and hardworking set of directors I have ever seen in this club and we are all very lucky to have their support through what has been 'interesting times'.

The Age Group education program and the SRC training achieved great success this season. We also saw many parents begin and continue their education to support our program. This included

- Over 400 Nippers received their Surf Education Award
- 32 U14 Nippers passed their SRC, taking their final step through Nippers and beginning the transition into the senior club.
- 6 parents completed their Bronze Medallion course and joined our ranks as Water Safety
- 2 parents joined our Officials team by completing the course
- Approximately 70 parents attended the Age Managers Course program
- 25 U14/13 Nippers attended a leadership course hosted by Doug Hawkins. This is the second year we have offered this and we hope to be able to produce children and teenagers with great leadership skills to assist with roles at our Surf Club and beyond. Thanks to Doug for his continual support with this program.

Our Blue & White Competition team, led by Junior Coach, Laura Thurtell, worked hard to improve their skill base and increase engagement through the structured but fun training program provided for our keen competitors and upcoming stars. The team has broadened and has increased their confidence in the water, and improved their skills and abilities in each discipline. These skills will keep them engaged in our program and develop competent and confident Lifesavers in the years ahead. 2019 was our year to host the Waverley Shield Carnival in November, and with many hours of preparation, organisation and effort, we managed to pull off a great carnival. While we had four seasons in one day in regard to the weather, our Nippers toughed out some difficult surf to give it their all and had a great day of friendly competition.



With the Branch Carnival postponed, rescheduled then finally cancelled, the team headed north to the NSW State Age Championships at Swansea -Belmont. With our largest State team to date, our competitors raced hard over 3 days. The stand out result at that carnival was our Under 9 double GOLD medalist Krishna Inder who achieved 1st place in both the Under 9 sprints and flags events and Jana who made the finals of the Under 12 swim and ironperson events.

This year, our members carried out an extraordinary 6915 preventative actions which led to the need for only 95 actual rescues. This is testament to the diligence of our lifesavers and a fantastic outcome. I am so proud in the growth of our lifesaving capabilities. Congratulations to James McLennan on becoming a finalist for Sydney Branch Lifesaver of the Year.

On behalf of the Board of Management we thank our incredible volunteers and would like to acknowledge the continued support of the Waverley Lifeguards.

The Club is in a strong financial position and we are well placed to meet the challenges of both COVID-19 and our new building project. There are many people to acknowledge and thank for their efforts this year. 19-20 was a fantastic year for Clovelly Nippers. This, my first year of being Nippers President, has been full of action, adventure, achievement and most of all fun for our nippers community. A huge thanks to all our hardworking volunteers - to every Age Manager, Age Registrar, water safety, trainer, educator, officials, beach set up, BBQ, Nippers Shop, Nippers committee, senior club board member, and parents/caregivers on the beach. It is pleasing to see a 40% increase in 100% patrol proficiency numbers and that 40% of our active members are under 18 years of age. Coogee spent a total of 19,000 hours protecting our beach and local community. Great signs for our future lifesaving efforts at Coogee. In addition, our club continues to help keep Garie Beach in the Royal National Park safe with six voluntary patrols completed there this season. Our volunteers are so full of energy and professionalism as well as being highly educated nowadays. We are proud of our patrol captains and vice captains who continue to positively influence our younger members so much.

Coogee's voluntary support of our Branch totalled some 1,170 hours being spent by our members across BOM, Duty & Support Operations, ORB 30, UAV and jet ski support. We also congratulate Doug Hawkins, who beat a hot field of nominees for the Trainer of the Year at the recent Awards of Excellence. Coogee is so lucky to be on the receiving end of Doug's massive workload and enthusiasm for surf lifesaving. Coogee also received most awards in Sydney Branch (1,263) which is a credit to our volunteer Education team's work ethic. Coogee congratulates all other individuals, teams and clubs that won awards on this important night.

It is heartening to see 75 new SRC's and 98 Bronze Medallion's graduate this season, as well as very high retention rates from our Minnows ranks. As we all know, keeping our kids engaged from U6's to teens and into their twenties is a huge challenge. It is great to see our Nippers leaders, past and present, thinking strategically on this issue and delivering kids into our senior club that are growing in confidence to become valuable lifesavers and competitors. Another positive is the growing involvement of parents and the family culture that surrounds Coogee SI SC.

Coogee's involvement in the community, both local and far and wide is inspirational. Our highlights this season in this domain included thirty of our boaties providing invaluable assistance for three days to Bermagui SLSC during the bushfire crisis over the New Year's period. Successfully operating the Minnows Autism Swim Dippers program for the fourth year running and Coogee's hand in facilitating water safety courses for over 350 individuals including International students from Sydney University & UNSW, students from regional NSW high schools, refugees from Africa and Iran and local school and preschool kids. These courses save lives in one of the most vulnerable of "potential for drowning" groups – young people from non-coastal regions.

Whilst competition was cancelled suddenly post the State Titles this season, Coogee still managed to shine. Our Nippers achieved a club record 2nd placing overall at the Swansea Belmont State Championships, Masters were 5th and our Opens 8th. Our results across all levels of competition are a reflection of the sheer hard work that our coaches, mentors and managers dedicate to our



competitors.

Coogee Surf Club is undergoing extensive renovations to our top floor bar, function, training and meeting rooms throughout this year with completion due about December 2020. The 2019-2020 season has seen a continuation of the operational challenges encountered due to the building re-development that has been undertaken by Cronulla SLSC. The construction stage commenced two years ago and as to be expected with a building of its age there were various structural issues encountered resulting in delays to the project. These issues were eventually resolved, and practical completion was finally achieved in February 2020. We are yet to receive our occupancy certificate although that is expected to occur in the coming weeks. Concurrent with our development Sutherland Shire Council have been doing their own park works surrounding the Club and these too are expected to be completed this month and once finalised will no longer impede the access to our new building. For the past two years the Club has operated out of one container located in the park with a temporary office kilometres away from the beach and our members are to be commended on the manner in which they accepted the inconveniences and just got on with meeting the expectations associated with the Club. Once again Sutherland Shire Council was generous with allowing us to setup each week tents in Cronulla Park to facilitate nippers. I would also like to mention the success of our learn to swim program which is made possible

through support received from Tradies and the continued growth of our "Blue Fins" group which provides an opportunity for children with special needs to participate in a quality nippers program. Following on from the positive feedback received last year our Cronulla short course carnival again included events specifically for these children and they were well supported in participation numbers, not only from our Club but many Clubs outside of the Bate Bay area. It was pleasing to receive positive feedback from parents who travelled some distance to participate and I am certain that this will grow in support in future years.

Firstly, I would like to thank our Junior Development Committee, Age Managers, Water Safety, BBQ Crew, Coaches, Officials, Parent Helpers and Fellow Members who helped with everything that it takes to run Nippers during the season as you made it a success.

I would also like to thank Maroubra SLSC's Board of Management for its ongoing support for our junior development program, which this year saw 31 Rookies graduate as patrolling members for our club. Particular thanks for such a job well done must go to their Age Managers Lucille Testard and Megan Still who have been in the role since the Under 6s, and their SRC trainers Yasmin Grivell and Tony Grivell.

At Maroubra, we expose our Junior Development members from an early age to basic emergency response strategy (DRSABCD) and CPR. We are leaders in Sydney Branch in offering such training with full nationally accredited awards for our future life savers. We have demonstrated the value of familiarising children so early to lifesaving techniques through training outcomes and retention

This season 21 Junior members attained the Basic Emergency Care (BEC) award and 21 Junior members, predominantly from our U11's, attained the Resuscitation (CPR) award, under the guidance of Megan Still (Junior Education Coordinator) and her team of dedicated trainers and assessors. These awards carry on a proud tradition at Maroubra where our children are introduced to formal training at an early stage and given the opportunity to attain nationally recognised qualifications, which elevate them amongst their peers.

During the season, our U11's and U13's enthusiastically represented Maroubra at their respective Sydney Branch Junior Development Camps, where they had an absolute ball, earning the admiration and praise of the organisers. The performance of our camp participants in the life saving challenges is a testament to the combined lifesaving and surf sports training approach adopted at Maroubra.

These development camps are invaluable for the educational, motivational and leadership experiences that they offer junior lifesavers in training, and we are fortunate to have them. On behalf of all those Nippers who had such a great time, our heartfelt thanks go to parents and fellow members that served as minders and trainers for the camps.

This season Maroubra has excelled in surf sports across all disciplines Water and Sand, as well as the traditional events R&R and March Past. Thank you to our Water, Sand, March Past & R&R coaches as well as to all those who assisted throughout the season.

Despite Sydney Branch Championships being cancelled this year, Maroubra made the most of their opportunities and excelled at NSW State Age Championships in Swansea-Belmont SLSC.

Our State team compromised 51 Competitive Junior Members and contested most of the scheduled events delivering Maroubra our best ever results at these Championships with Gold and Bronze Medals, along with Top 10 finishes in Water and Sand Events. What was most pleasing was that there were improved performances

The engagement of our junior members increased immensely this season; this was supported by a thorough training program managed by a team of dedicated coaches.

After the success of last year the 2-day training camp was held at the club, with all the touring team members sleeping over at the club house. Tamarama SLSC was on the front page of the Star Observer! Tracey Rockwell staged the first Wonderland Art Show at the club. Ayran Shahabi-Sirjan and Ben Armitage ran fundraisers for the bushfires. We have fantastic news that we intend to start construction on our new club house in this year. We are still short of our funding target by around \$500,000, however, we have strategies in place to raise the funds before we commence construction. The Club has entered into a public private partnership with Waverley Council for the project. The Council will be responsible for tendering and project management of the build.

With the capital campaign nearing completion and our club now ready to be rebuilt my remit as President of the club is coming to an end. While I will continue on the building committee, I will not seek re-election as President. The new management committee is shaping up to be a young and diverse committee that reflects the core membership that patrols the beach.

As we transition to a new club house and management committee it is a good time to revisit our strategy and establish a new operating plan for our club. TAMARAMA NIPPERS

With 100 Nippers registered for the 2019/20 Season, the beach was busy, the weather mostly kind, and skill development for participants exceptional. As with all Surf Life Saving Clubs throughout Australia, the Junior Development (Nipper) Program targets children aged from 5 to 14 and is designed to "train future lifesavers". The training encompasses not only beach & surf skills, but surf awareness, water safety, risk assessment, first aid, environmental awareness, leadership, communication, team work and building resilience amongst many other things. A principal aim is also to have fun. The program at Tamarama is tailored to our own unique

circumstances which includes a narrow beach, often challenging surf conditions and a small number of participants (compared to neighbouring clubs). Included with this is a very enthusiastic complement of Age Managers and involved parents. Together, this makes up a very special program for all involved.

Whilst there were no Nippers that completed their Surf Rescue Certificate this season, every Nipper received a trophy, 70 received a certificate for completing the Surf Life Saving components of the Nipper program and 33 were awarded a backpack for 100% attendance. 10 Nippers either pulled out or did not finish the season. Annabelle Charters & Annabel Crabb were joint "Nippers of the Year" winners and Jade Brennan received the "Best & Fairest" Award.

This season, the Nipper program was extremely fortunate in obtaining sponsorship from Channel Ten which has allowed greater opportunities for our Nippers. Part of the funds were used for Nipper skill development at Bondi Beach with accredited swim coach Jesse Clare (Bondi Swim Coach) and his ocean & surf awareness training programs. Around 35 Nippers participated in the training sessions during Term 4, 2019 and Term 1, 2020. The skills learnt will be life long and prove invaluable for handling surf conditions at any beach, but more importantly surf conditions at Tamarama.

The final delivery of 8 new Nipper training boards courtesy of the Federal Government's Safer Communities Grant Program (thanks to former MP Kerryn Phelps) added to the training tools used by some of the older Nippers. The mid-sized boards allowed the older age groups to improve their board handling skills during variable surf conditions. These skills will be vital for board rescues and future training for their Surf Rescue Certificate and Bronze Medallion.

As has become a tradition, the club held a mid-winter "Movie Night" in July with a good turnout of Nippers and excited parents. It is not often that kids tell their parents to stop being so noisy, but this was the case that night - so the kids could concentrate on the movie.

Through the new Channel Ten sponsorship an additional "Sponsors Movie Night" was held at Bondi Junction cinemas for Nippers to get out and have some fun. For 2 weeks (and 3 weekends) in November, Sculptures by the Sea enhanced the beach environs with their usual collection of unique art installations. Providing truly inimitable surrounds, Nipper activities were held on the sand around the sculptures culminating in an educational tour and hands-on workshop delivered by participating



artists and Sculpture by the Sea staff. Many thanks to David Handley and his team for putting on the workshop enjoyed by both Nippers and parents.

Bondi hosted the Waverley Shield Carnival in November and provided a surf carnival experience for the Nipper participants. A couple of outstanding performances by Tamarama in beach flags resulted in medals for Finlay C in the U8s and Annabelle C in the U13s.

A special visitor dressed in a red suit was driven onto the beach in the club's new ATV (used for towing the IRB onto the beach) as part of the Nipper Christmas celebrations & BBQ. Santa was extremely popular as he distributed enormous quantities of sweets from his sack before disappearing into the distance leaving a trail of sugar hyped kids.

The Tamarama Clovelly Challenge was held at Clovelly Beach in late January and surprisingly won by Clovelly. This carnival is essentially a joint Nipper session allowing an appreciation of beach conditions vastly different to Tamarama. The schedule is beach and water focussed with swim and board events. It also allows Tamarama Nippers to test themselves against a friendly larger club and form Surf Life Saving community bonds.

U11 Branch Development Camp

Tamarama put forward 9 Nippers to attend the U11 Branch Development Camp held at the Youthworks Port Hacking Conference Centre in the Royal National Park in early February. Team Tamarama was an outstanding performer amongst nearly 100 participants representing the 15 Clubs from Sydney Branch (with the big clubs limited to 8 participants). Split into 9 groups, the Tamarama team made up 5 of the 9 Team Captains. Whilst based on leadership development, a lot of fun was had and friendships developed along the way with activities including dragon boating, kayaking, abseiling, rock climbing, water-sliding and a ride in the IRB. The Camp's serious side provided workshops on leadership and "being a leader", learning CPR, rescuing patients in a pool scenario and pathways within the Surf Life Saving movement. The weekend culminated in a competition to demonstrate the skills learnt in Rescue & Resuscitation. A big thank you to Kate Jackson (Maisie L's mother) who along with myself, acted as the responsible parents for the weekend.

A personal thank you to Wanda's Board of Directors for their support of the Nipper Program. To have a collaborative, one-club approach to all we do is something we are proud of.



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DIRECTOR OF FINANCE REPORT



The 2019-20 season was unusual operationally and financially for the Sydney Branch. During the season we faced challenges from the COVID-19 pandemic and unfavourable surf conditions which have both impacted on this year's financial performance.

Thanks to the generous support from our major sponsors Sydney Airport, DHL and Rotary we have had the financial capacity to resource the oversight and delivery of rescue services throughout the most populated coastal region in Australia. As part of their centenary celebrations, Sydney Airport made a special \$150,000 grant which was passed through to all clubs equally and provided additional fundraising opportunities, including the Runway Run and in-terminal collections. Unfortunately, they have not been immune to the significant reduction in domestic and international travel and have advised us that they will be suspending their long-term sponsorship due to the impacts of COVID-19. This impacts on the current year results and available cash reserves for the upcoming season.

A Sponsorship Consultant was hired during the year to expand the revenue base of the Branch and 15 clubs. The cost of the Consultant was funded from prior years' reserves with the expectation that he would provide a substantial return on investment through increasing the Sydney Airport commitment and sourcing new sponsors. During the COVID-19 disruptions, his services were suspended due to the limitation of opportunities as companies consolidated their discretionary spend.

Large surf during the dates set aside for the Branch carnival meant that this event was unable to proceed. This impacted on both carnival entry fees and the carnival running costs. The other event which had to be altered

was the presentation night which was substituted by an online ceremony; saving both venue and catering expenses that were not typically covered by ticket receipts.

One of the tenants in the Branch's two investment properties has sought rental relief in line with the Government's Mandatory Code of Conduct. This has seen a reduction in rental receipts during the last few months of the year.

The accompanying Financial Statements are in line with the approved amended budget, albeit from a combination of revenue and expense adjustments. The underlying Operating result is a deficit of (\$70,480). Operating Revenue came in at \$524,290 which was up \$67,246 on the previous year. Sponsorship \$270,917, Capitation Fees \$113,601, and Donations \$91,572 exceeded last year. Competition and Event Fees \$48,200 were impacted by the cancellation of the Branch carnival.

Overall Expenditure was \$794,151 which exceeded last year by \$157,296, primarily due to the pass-through of the Sydney Airport centenary grant of \$10,000 to each of the 15 clubs in the Branch, and the Sponsorship Consultant fees of \$57,500. Sydney Branch benefitted from the ATO cash flow boost of \$10,000 and a Jobkeeper Subsidy of \$12,000

In accordance with Accounting Standards, the properties were revalued in the previous year through the Profit and Loss which distorted the Branch's financial performance for that year when a \$1.8m surplus was booked. The revaluation is non-cash and was entered through the Profit and Loss to get to Members Funds.

In closing I would like to congratulate my fellow Board members on the way they responded to the difficult conditions with financial prudence and proactive measures which are reflected in the results. Their commitment to financial stewardship and the ongoing success of the Branch has reflected in the many hours they have put into covering all bases.

My complements to Sharon Porter of 2 Aspire for managing the financial accounting and to Linda Perrin and Sarah Webster who are always approachable and on top of our commitments.

Finally, I would like to thank Geoff Staples for his wisdom throughout the transition into my role and the support of the Finance & Audit Committee through what proved to be a difficult year. Thanks also to the support of so many; I look forward to us getting back to some normality in the 2020-21 season.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 May 2020

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are for Surf Life Saving Sydney Inc. ("the Association") as a not-for-profit individual entity domiciled in Australia.

Surf Life Saving Sydney Inc. is not a reporting entity because the Board of Directors is of the opinion that there are unlikely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of financial reports tailored to satisfy all of their information needs. Therefore this report is a Special Purpose Financial Report that has been prepared solely to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Board, the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission Act 2012.

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies described below and do not comply with any Australian Accounting Standards unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant account policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

(b) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. The income tax exemption has been claimed based on self assessment by the Association.

(c) Revenue and other income

For comparative year

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt. Member subscription income is also recognised recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is also generally at the time of receipt. If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Revenue from contracts with customers - from 1 June 2019

For current year

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Association are:

Donations

Donations collected, including cash and goods for resale, are recognised as revenue when the Association gains control of the asset

Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligations is satisfied

Each performance obligation is considered to ensure that the revenue recognition reflects the transfer of control and within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Where control is transferred over time, generally the input methods being either costs or time incurred are deemed to be the most appropriate methods to reflect the transfer of benefit.

Membership subscription income

Membership subscription income is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered and corresponds to the satisfaction of performance obligations and transfer of control to the customer.

Amounts received in advance are recognised as deferred income and credited to profit and loss on a straight line basis over the expected subscription period.

(d) Property, plant and equipment

Property Plant and Equipment are carried at historical cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the entities commencing from the time the asset is held and ready for use

Assets are depreciated over their lives utilising the following rates:

Fixed asset class	Depreciation rate	
Plant and Equipment	7.5% - 40%	
Leasehold improvements	2.5 % - 10%	

Investment property

Investment property is held to generate long term rental yields and/or for capital appreciation. All tenant leases are on an arm's length basis. Investment property is carried at fair value determined by current market values every three years. Changes to the fair value are recorded separately as an income or expense items directly in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Leases

For comparative year

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term

For current year

At inception of a contract, the Association assesses whether a lease exists - i.e. does the contract convey the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

This involves an assessment of whether:

- The contract involves the use of an identified asset this may be explicitly or implicitly identified within the agreement. If the supplier has a substantive substitution right then there is no identified asset.
- The Association has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from the use of the asset throughout the period of use.
- The Association has the right to direct the use of the asset i.e. decision making rights in relation to changing how and for what purpose the asset is used.

Lessee accounting

The non-lease components included in the lease agreement have been separated and are recognised as an expense

At the lease commencement, the Association recognises a right-of-use asset and associated lease liability for the lease term. The lease term includes extension periods where the Association believes it is reasonably certain that the option will be exercised.

The right-of-use asset is measured using the cost model where cost on initial recognition comprises of the lease liability, initial direct costs, prepaid lease payments, estimated cost of removal and restoration less any lease

The right-of-use asset is depreciated over the lease term on a straight line basis and assessed for impairment in accordance with the impairment of assets accounting policy.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments at the commencement of the lease. The discount rate is the rate implicit in the lease, however where this cannot be readily determined then the Association's incremental borrowing rate is used.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The lease liability is remeasured whether there is a lease modification, change in estimate of the lease term or index upon which the lease payments are based (e.g. CPI) or a change in the Association's assessment of lease

Where the lease liability is remeasured, the right-of-use asset is adjusted to reflect the remeasurement or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

(g) Leases

Exceptions to lease accounting

The Association has elected to apply the exceptions to lease accounting for both short-term leases (i.e. leases with a term of less than or equal to 12 months) and leases of low-value assets. The Association recognises the payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(h) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(i) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are stated inclusive of GST.

(j) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at:

amortised cost

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

(j) Financial instruments

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, foreign exchange gains or losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for the following assets:

financial assets measured at amortised cost

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significant since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Association's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Association uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

 the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Association in full, without recourse to the Association to actions such as realising security (if any is held).

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Association in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses (ECL). The Association has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost are determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

(k) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period the company determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss. Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(I) Intangible assets

Intangible assets are recognised at cost of acquisition. Intangible assets have a finite life and are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any impairment losses. Intangible assets are amortised over their useful life of 3 years.

(m) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than twelve months after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

Employee benefits are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the Association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date regardless of the classification of the liability for measurement purposes under AASB 119. Contributions are made by the Association to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(n) Adoption of new and revised accounting standards

A number of new or amended standards became applicable for the current reporting period AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers, AASB 1058 Income of Not-For-Profit Entities and AASB 16 Leases.

The adoption of AASB 15, AASB 1058 and AASB 16 has not caused any material adjustments to the reported financial position, performance or cash flow of the Association.

2 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - fair value of investment property

On 10 April 2019 the investment properties held by the Association were independently valued by Mangioni Property Valuations & Consultancy Pty Ltd resulting in a fair value increment of \$1.87 million.

An independent valuation has not been carried out during the year current year. Management are satisfied that the carrying value of investment property reflects the fair value at 31 May 2020.



DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION REPORT



It is with great pleasure to present the Surf Life Saving Sydney 2019/20 Annual Report. This report showcases the incredible achievements our members enjoyed across all areas of our organisation.

I must begin by congratulating our inspiring Board of Management, Committees, Clubs and Members for navigating and finding solutions to the abnormal and unusual events that presented throughout the season. As highlighted in the Presidents report, 2020 has been a difficult year for not only our communities but for Australia and the entire World. The global COVID-19 pandemic, combined with the devastating bush fires and the inclement weather impacted our organisation for much of our 2019/20 season. However as you would have read, these events did not halt our members from thriving to succeed and transcend.

The surf lifesaving season came to a close earlier than scheduled due to the global COVID-19 pandemic. Whilst our beaches were closed, our Lifesaving, Education and Support Operations teams didn't stop.
